EAGLE RIVER: A former Air Force fighter pilot, who had recently returned from Vietnam, experienced his first airplane accident when he cracked up a rented Ces-

sena 150 in the Eagle River Valley last Monday. Orville Hett, of Marion Kan-sas, was visiting his brother Don of Eagle River, and decided to take Don on a sight seeing flight. He rented the aircraft from Chugiak Aviation of Bir-chwood, and was flying apchwood, and was flying ap-proximatley eight miles up Eagle River when he experienced carburetor ice.

Het: said that when the engine quit, he headed for the only cleared spot he could see on the side of the mountain and stalled the plane into a wooe

wooded area at the edge. He

wooded area at the edge. He said the altimeter registered 2700 feet when he hit. Neither Hett nor his broth-er were injured, but the plane sustained considerable dam-

age. The men hiked down the mountain until they found a "cat" trail which they followed to the homestead of Ted Foss on the South Fork. Foss then drove both men back to Eagle River.

The crash had been observby a resident of the area ba and reported. A helicopter was dispatched to fly over the wreck, and seeing no surviv-ors in the vicinity, the heli-copter pilot had assumed they might have been killed and had notified the State Troopers. All concerned were re-lieved when the pair showed up unharmed.

Hett, who holds a commer-cial pilots license, had flown Force F4 Phantoms in Air combat. These are the same type aircraft which the Thunderbirds recently flew in a demonstration of precision flying at Elmendorflast week.

Although the Hett brothers walked away from the crash without a scratch they are still picking out the themes from the devils club bushes they had to wade through on their walk out.

Ralph Doyle, owner of the rented aircraft has not yet heard from his insurance adon the extent of the justor damage to the aircraft, but in his opinion, it is a total loss.
