SURVIVOR TELLS DETAILS OF AIR CRASH



EAGLE RIVER: A former Air Force fighter pilot, who had recently returned from Vietnam, experienced his first airplane accident when he cracked up a rented Cessna 150 in the Eagle River Valley last Monday.

Orville Hett, of Marion Kansas, was visiting his brother Don of Eagle River, and decided to take Don on a sight seeing flight. He rented the aircraft from Chugiak Aviation of Birchwood, and was flying approximately eight miles up Eagle River when he experienced carburetor ice.

Hett said that when the engine quit, he headed for the only cleared spot he could see on the side of the mountain and stalled the plane into a wooded area at the edge. He said the altimeter registered 2700 feet when he hit.

Neither Hett nor his brother were injured, but the plane sustained considerable damage.

The men hiked down the mountain until they found a "cat" trail which they followed to the homestead of Ted Foss on the South Fork. Foss then drove both men back to Eagle River.

The crash had been observed by a resident of the area and reported. A helicopter was dispatched to fly over the wreck, and seeing no survivors in the vicinity, the helicopter pilot had assumed they might have been killed and had notified the State Troopers. All concerned were relieved when the pair showed up unharmed.

Hett, who holds a commercial pilots license, had flown Air Force F4 Phantoms in combat. These are the same type aircraft which the Thunderbirds recently flew in a demonstration of precision flying at Elmendorf last week.

Although the Hett brothers walked away from the crash without a scratch, they are still picking out the thorns from the devils club bushes they had to wade through on their walk out.

Ralph Doyle, owner of the rented aircraft has not yet heard from his insurance adjuster on the extent of the damage to the aircraft, but in his opinion, it is a total loss.

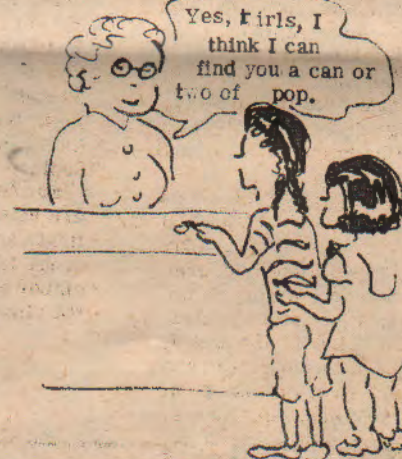

CHUGIAK HOLDS FIRST ALASKAN STEEPLECHASE

BIRCHWOOD: The first steeple chase race ever held in Alaska took place at Chugiak High at the newly completed course. This was an intrasquad race in preparation for the Cross Country season. The race is 2 miles (8 laps on the cinders) with 4 regular hurdles per lap (for a total of 32 regular hurdles) and one water jump per lap (for a total of 8 water jumps.) On Friday, September 12th, Chugiak High School will host the first Alaska High School Steeple Chase Championships on the home track.

Several mishaps which took place during the intrasquad event will lead Coach Andy Kirk to make some improvements at the water jump. Phil Best, one of the first three finishers in the event, slipped on the barrier and went head first into the pool. He went completely under, but surfaced in a few seconds

(minus his glasses). Kirk now plans to glue sand to the top rail of the barrier for better traction. He will also line the concrete top edge of the pool with sand bags for added safety. The water is 2 feet deep at the near edge of the hurdle, and slants up to nothing at its farther edge, which is 12 feet from the barrier jump. Kirk said that someone suggested a lifeguard at the water jump.

Kirk added that the Chugiak High School Cross Country team is getting into shape. He said that 5 of last year's 7 lettermen are returning, (Steve Jordan, Junior; Bob Shepard, Sophomore; Phil Best, Sophomore; Byron Matlock, Junior; and Bob Towne, Senior.

Jordan, Shepard, and Best are already in fair shape. The first race is with West Anchorage High this Friday, September 5th at the new Chugiak "A plus" course.

TERRY SIMPSON WINS CABBAGE CONTEST

BIRCHWOOD: A 21 pound cabbage took first prize in the "Big Cabbage" contest sponsored by H&H Nursery Supply of Birchwood this summer.

The young gardener who won first place, is Terry Simpson, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Simpson of Birchwood.

Terry received a \$25.00 savings bond as his prize.

Second prize, went to Debra Lathrop, also of Birchwood. Her cabbage weighed 17.3 lbs. Second prize was \$10 in savings stamps.

Third place winner was Teri Samuelson, another Birchwood youngster. Teri's cabbage weighed 13.7 pounds. Her prize was \$5.00 in savings stamps.

All the cabbages were of the same variety. The contestants had been given two free plants last spring by H&H. Each youngster was to plant and care for the plants himself, and keep an accurate record of the gardening method listing type of fertilizer etc.

Judges of the contest were Mr. Paul Swanson and Mrs. William Tissington. Rules for judging were observed which took into consideration appearance and condition as well as firmness and weight. This disqualified the heaviest cabbage which was grown by Mary Frie. Mary's cabbage, which weighed 26.6 pounds, had unfortunately split.

Mr. Al Hildman, of H&H was very pleased with the results of the contest and plans to make it an annual affair.
