### NONE HURT IN TWO CAR ACCIDENT

**EAGLE RIVER:** There were no injuries in a two car accident which took place last Saturday on the New Glenn Highway at the Artillery Road connector.

James E. Stevens, of Eagle River, driving a 1970 Chevrolet pick up apparently was preparing to turn onto Artillery Road, and turned into the path of another southbound car, a 1960 Chevrolet sedan, driven by Lionel E. Deal, of Old Chugiak.

Damage to the pick-up was estimated at \$400. The sedan also sustained an estimated \$400 damage.

The Alaska State Troopers cited Stevens for failure to yield.

### CHS STUDENT INJURED IN LAB EXPLOSION

**BIRCHWOOD:** Doctors stated on Monday that John Schimpf, Chugiak High School student who was injured last Friday in a chemistry class accident, would be released from Providence hospital in four to five days.

Although the youth is listed in satisfactory condition, he will not regain normal vision for four to five weeks.

John is suffering from burns sustained from a phosphorus explosion which took place in the prep room of the Chemistry Lab during the fifth period.

The explosion came as a flask of chemicals which Schimpf, a senior Lab Aide had been holding.

John was holding the flask at arms length when the explosion took place. Pieces of glass were imbedded in his arms and chest, and phosphorus was blown into his face and eye.

Quick thinking on the part of Jaul Gibbs, who kept water sprayed on Schimpf, the phosphorus burns were kept to a minimum.

Gibbs, also a lab aide and a senior was in the prep room at the time of the explosion, but did not sustain injury from the blast.

### BEGICH CALLS FOR FISH COOPS

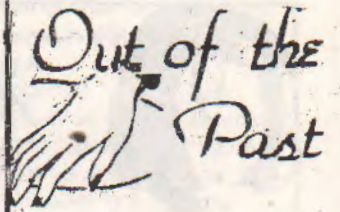
Democratic congressional candidate Nick Begich called Thursday for developing fish-processing cooperatives "to provide the kind of competition needed to break the stranglehold that some canneries have over local economies in various parts of Alaska."

Begich said the state, with federal assistance, should set up a program "where fishermen may enter the processing and marketing phases of the industry."

"It is only in this way we can avoid the type of situation that we see in Dillingham, where the only cannery that all the shots, decides who they buy the fish from, sets the prices and places a limit on the number processed," he said.

Begich made his comments following last weekend's Legislative Council hearings on the 1970 Bristol Bay salmon season. He was particularly critical of the alleged cannery preference for catches of nonresident fishermen.

"Millions upon millions of fish have been taken from Alaska's waters, and still our fishermen lose money—even in peak years," he said.

### UNIQUE COURSE OFFERED AT SHELDON JACKSON

**SITKA —** An outdoor education course with definite Alaskan appeal is being offered this semester for the first time at Sheldon Jackson College in Sitka. Feeling the need for a really practical course that deals specifically with out-of-doors activities, the college administration has developed a series of classes to make up the curriculum of the course outdoor recreation.

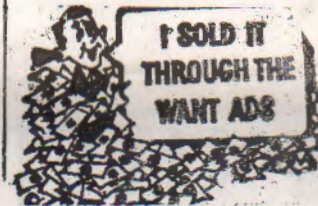
Students in the course find themselves under the privilege of a number of different

instructors including the business manager and captain to the college's coach, and skipper of the institution's 54-foot vessel. There is heavy emphasis on hiking, mountaineering, boating and cooking. Cooking classes include planning, cooking with tinfoil, cooking over an open fire, and cooking with dehydrated foods. Several hikes and overnight trips have been planned to put the theoretical into practice in remote areas. The course even offers instruction in fishing, hunting and hunter safety.

Sheldon Jackson College, a two-year co-educational fully accredited institution, is located at the edge of the Tongass National Forest in southeast Alaska.

The First Presbyterian Church of Anchorage has made possible the purchase of a process camera for the Sheldon Jackson College print shop through a sizeable donation. The Gateco Camera with accessories, which cost over \$1,000, was needed to make negatives for use in the lithographic process, which the college uses to print most of its materials.

The college estimated that the camera would allow enough savings to pay for its initial cost every three years in materials alone.

### RCA GRANTED DELAY IN GIVING REPORT

RCA Alaska Communications, Inc., has been granted a delay by the Alaska Public Utilities Commission in submitting a report on its spending and planning for communications system improvements in Alaska.

The improvements report was required as part of RCA's certification as a long lines communications operator in Alaska. RCA is purchasing the Alaska Communications System from the federal government and plans to upgrade the system.

The commission granted a delay until 30 days after the original tariff is filed by RCA with the commission.

The commission, also in regard to the RCA certification, denied motions for reconsideration and clarification filed by Alaska Telephone Association, Fairbanks Municipal Utilities System, Matanuska Telephone Association, Inc. and the owners of Alyeska Pipeline Service Co.

The commission held the filings by the utilities were not timely and that the filing by the owner companies of APLS was invalid because the companies, although they had a chance to become parties to the case at the time it was under consideration, had failed to do so.

The commission also denied a reconsideration and clarification motion from the City of Anchorage which indicated the city feared RCA Alascom may misconstrue the commission's order. The motion was denied by the commission on the basis that it has continuing jurisdiction over the RCA authority and that a delay for reconsideration at this time would not be in the public interest.

## UNIVERSITY OF ALASKA OFFERS STUDY IN JAPAN

**COLLEGE** — How would you like to see Japan and earn three college credits at the same time? It's being made possible through a tour to Japan being sponsored by the Division of Statewide Services at the University of Alaska.

According to Lary Schefer, parttime instructor in history, who will lead the tour, and division dean, Dr. Charles Ferguson, the tour will leave Fairbanks Dec. 27 for Tokyo, returning Jan. 10.

Approximate cost will be \$800. This will include all transportation, tips, sleeping accommodations and meals, with the exception of lunches. Accommodations will be made in Japanese-style inns as much as possible.

The course of study offered will be "religions in Japanese History" and will take in Buddhism and Shinto as well as Japan's "new religions." Throughout the tour, the travelers will be exposed to religious centers and lectures by leading religious leaders, professors, and scholars.

The study-tour will carry a 493 course number and can be applied to graduate or undergraduate work. The tour is limited to 20 people in order to ensure a quality seminar. It is necessary, however, for at least 15 to enroll in order for the tour to go ahead as planned.

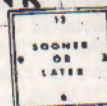

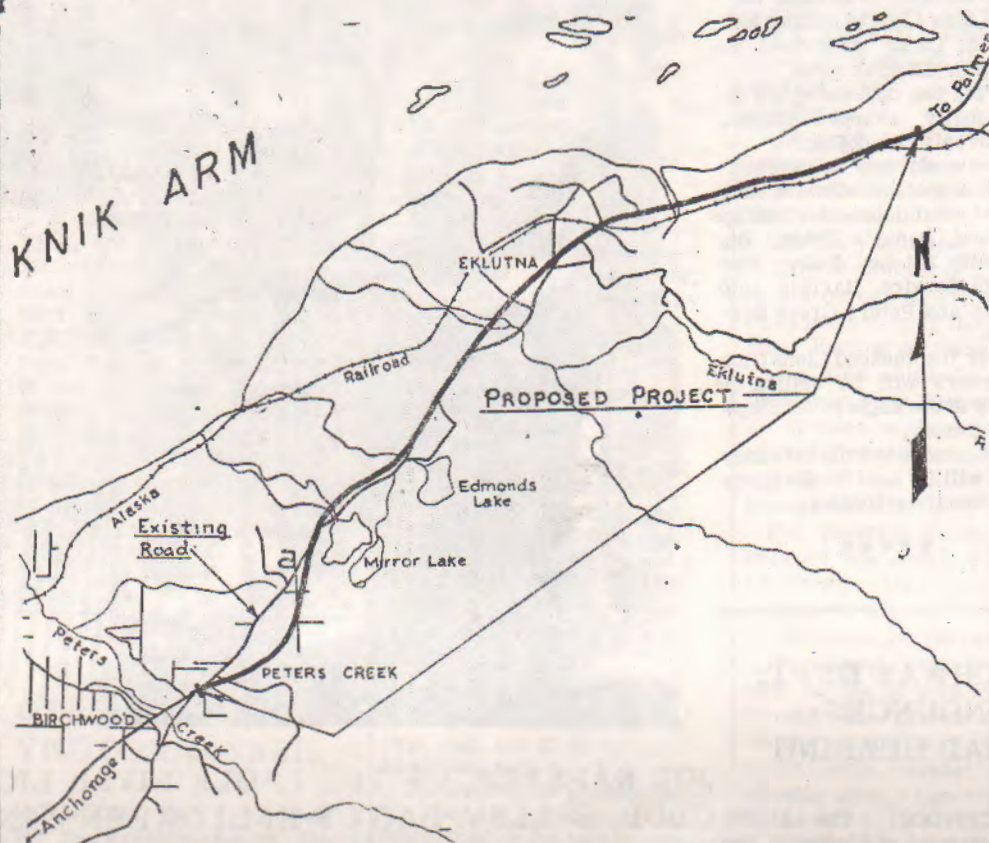

## PRISON PROGRAM TO REDUCE REPEATERS

A new program called "Zzooommm" which is supposed to help reduce the number of prison repeaters is being tested in Alaska on a group of 10 men at the Adult Conservation Camp near Palmer.

The group meets for an hour a day for 12 weeks and led by one of its own members, called the "key person."

The daily program consists of 20 or 30 minutes of a tape or record on one of any number of subjects ranging from "The Basic Factors of Success" to "As a Man Thinketh." There is an open discussion for 30 minutes with each man allotted three minutes by an egg timer to tell what the lesson meant to him.

The program attempts to improve the men's attitudes towards life, and has apparently been well received by the inmates at the camp.

The project, costs \$1,500 for each of the 10 men who go through the 12-week course, which includes a guide and orientation manual, eight cassette tapes, a tape recorder, a record book, two three-minute timers, 20 name tags, two manuals, one blank tape, two paperback books, five records, a record player and 11 certificates of completion.

Each man is also given two manuals, five records, two paperback books, and a specially packaged book called "The Greatest Salesman in the World."

The program is distributed through Leadership Motivation Institute, a nation-wide concern, and is funded by the State Department of Education.

## STEVENS ASKS WAIVER FOR STATE FERRIES

Republican Senate nominee Ted Stevens has proposed a waiver for the M. V. Wickersham and tax deferred construction funds for state ferry system construction to lower cost to the state for its ferries.

"The need for additional modern ferries in this system is clear," Stevens said. He made the statements in a position paper released today on the ferry system.

Stevens also suggested allowing servicemen to ship personal automobiles on the ferry system at government expense, in lieu of highway or rail transportation, which he said "would substantially increase the year-round income of the ferry system."
