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CHS STUDENT INJURED IN LAB EXPLOSION

BIRCHWOOD: Doctors stated on Monday that John Schimpf, Chugiak High School students who was injured last Friday in a chemistry class accid nt, would be released from Prov idence hospital in four to five days.

Al hough the youth is listed in setisfactory condition, he will not regain normal vision for four to five weeks.

John is suffering f om burns sustained f om a phosphorus explosion which took place in the prep room of the Chemistry Lab during the fifth period,

The explosion came a flask of chemicals which Schimpf, a senior Lab Aide had been holding.

John was holding the flask at arma length when the explosion took place. Pieces of glass were imbeded in his arms and Omest, and phosphoras was blown unto his face and eye. Quick thinking on the part of)aul. Gibbs, who kept water sprayed on Schimpf, thephos phorus burns were kept to a minimum.

Gibbs, also a lab ald- and a senior was in the prep room at the time of the explosion, but did not sustain injury f om the blast,

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CANDIDATE MEET AT CHS THIS FRIDAY NIGHT





First aide was administer-ed 9y k teacher, Mrs. Callaway and student Mark Blair, who picked out some of the glass, and helped bandage the injured youth.


The Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance arrived and transported John to Providence Hospital, while State Troopers questioned the witnesses.

BEGICH CALLS FOR FISH COOPS

Democratic congressional candidate Nick Begich called Thursday for developing fish-processing cooperatives "to provide the kind of competition needed to break the stranglehold that some canneries have over local economies in various parts of Alaska."

Begich said the state, with federal assistance, should set up a program "where fishermen may enter the processing and marketing phases of the industry.'

"It is only in this way we can avoid the type of situation that we see in Dillingham, where the only cannery calls all the shots, decides who they buy the fish from, sets the prices and places a limit on the number processed," he said. Begich made his comments

following last weekend's Legislative Council hearings on the 1970 Bristol Bay salmon season. He was particularly critical of the alleged cannery preference for catches of nonresident fishermen.


"Millions upon millions of fish have been taken from Alaska's waters, and still our fishermen lose money even in peak years," he said.

RCA GRANTED DELAY IN GIVING REPORT

RCA Alaska Communications, Inc., has been granted a delay by the Alaska Public Utilities Commission in submitting a report on its spending and planning for communications system improvements in Alaska

The improvements port was required as part of CA's certification as a long lines communications operator in Alaska. RCA is purchasing the Alaska Communications System from the federal government and plans to upgrade the system.

The commission granted a delay until 30 days after the original tariff is filed by RCA with the commission.

The commission, also in regard to the RCA certification, denied motions for reconsideration and clarification filed by Alaska Telephone Association, Fairbanks Municipal Utilities System, Matanuska Telephone Association, Inc. and the owners of Alyeska Pipeline Service Co.

The commission held the filings by the utilities were not timely and that the filing by the owner companies of APLS was invalid because the companies, although they had a chance to become parties to the case at the time it was under consideration, had failed to do so.

The commission also denied a reconsideration and clarification motion from the City of Anchorage which indicated the city feared RCA Alascom may misconstrue the commission's order. The motion was denied by the commission on the basis that it has continuing jurisdiction over the RCA authority and that a delay for reconsideration at this time would not be in the public interest.





Approximate cost will be \$800. This will include all transportation, tips, sleeping accommodations and meals, with the exception of lunches. Accommodations will be made in Japanese-style inns as much as possible.

The course of study offered will be "religions in Japanese History" and will take in Buddhism and Shinto as well as Japan's 'new religions.' Throughout the tour, the travelers will be exposed to religious centers and lectures by leading religious leaders, professors, and scholars.

The study-tour will carry a 493 course number and can be applied to graduate or undergraduate work. The tour is limited to 20 people in order to ensure a quality seminar. It is necessary, however, for at least 15 to enroll in order for the tour to go ahead as planned.




the Interior Walter J. Hickel, Miller said that "The reindeer industry should be a vital part of Alaska's red meat program carried out by the state's agricultural division."



PRISON PROGRAM TO REDUCE REPEATERS

A new program called "Zzooommm" which is supposed to help reduce the number of prison repeaters is being tested in Alaska on a group of 10 men at the Adult Conservation Camp near Palmer.

The group meets for an hour a day for 12 weeks and led by one of its own members, called the "key person."


The daily program consists of 20 or 30 minutes of a tape or record on one of any number of subjects ranging from "The Basic Factors of Success" to "As a Man Thinketh." The there is an open discussion in-30 minutes with each size alloted three minutes by egg timer to tell what lesson meant to him.

The program attempts improve the men's attitudes towards life, and has apparently been well received by the inmates at the camp.

The project, costs \$1,500 for each of the 10 men who go through the 12-week course, which includes a guide and orientation manual, eight cassette tapes, a tape recorder, a record book, two three-minute timers, 20 name tags, two manuals, one blank tape, two paperback books, five records, a record player and 11 certificates of completion.

Each man is also given two manuals, five records, two paperback books, and a specially packaged book called The Greatest Salesman in the World.'

The program is distributed through Leadership Motivation Institute, nation-wide concern, and is funded by the State Department of Education.
