EKLUTNA COUNCIL TO BLOCK HIGHWAY

LOCAL MAN NAMED AWF&SC PRESIDENT

FAIRBANKS: Edward A. Bellringer, a residents of the Chugiak Area was elected the new President of the Alaska Wildlife Fed ration & Sportsman's Council at their 17th annual meeting held last week at Fairbanks.

This is the third time that Bellringer has held this office the first time in 1960 and again in 1968.

Bellringer, who has lived in Alaska going on twenty years, is a past president of the Matanuska Valley Sportsman, is presently a member and trustee of the Alaska Big Game Tropby Club, is an official scorer for the Boone and Crocket Club, is Secretary for the Anchorage Area Fish and Game Board Advisory Committee, is a life member of the National Rifle Association. He works at Elmendorf Alr Force Base as Wildlife Program Advisory for the Alaskan Air Command, and is Conservation Advisor for the Alaskan Command.

Bellringer makes his home in the Peter s Creek area with his wife and three daughters.

The Council at this meeting
re affirmed their stand objecting to political interfer-

The Council at this meeting re affirmed their stand objecting to political interference in Fish and Game managment. They also went on record to recommend that the State of Alaska adopt the National Rifle Association's Hunter Safety Law.

Also resolved was to have the State Highway Department seek a waiver from the Federal Department of Transportation on requiring of fencing both sides of Federal Aid Highways in Alaska. It is their belief that these fences interfere with the normal movement of moose herds. Action was taken at this meet

Action was taken at this meeing to change the name of the organization from the Alaska Sportsman's Council, to the Alaska Wildlife Federation & Sportsman's Council. This is to reflect the Council's affiliation with the National Wildlife Federation. The Council is made up of Sportsman's groups from all over the State Club representatives from as

far away as Juneau attended the meeting in Fairbanks.

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EKLUTNA: The Eklutna Village Council, at their Monday meeting resolved to take legal action to hold up the const ruction of the extension of the Anchorage to Fairbanks High way from Peters Creek to Eklutna until the settlement of the Native Land Claims. Acting on a protest which had

Acting on a protest which had been filed in 1951, the Council unanimously resolved to block the ef orts of the State to acquire Right of Way through certain protested lands near the village.

Although the village recognised the need for this project it was felt that the State could do more than it has to aid this Community in terms of devalopment.

It was further stated that the status of the land at present makes it impossible to derive any direct benefits from the state. Any monetary benefit would go into the Federal general fund without any benefit to the vollage. The holdup could be until the land claims are settled.

In the past Right of Way re—sulted in the lifting of the land freeze by recommend—ation of the village by resolution early in 1970 This practice was stopeped.

STEVENS ASKS HALT TO HIJACKING

Republican Senate nominee Ted Stevens has proposed an Air Travel Protection Agency to coordinate federal agency efforts to halt airplane hijackings.

"The Air Travel Protection Agency would be established under the Federal Aviation Agency and would have as its primary function the prevention of threats or acts of violence upon persons or property aboard aircraft operated by air carriers," Stevens suggested.

The Republican candidate made the statement in a position paper on hijacking released today.

Stevens has also been recognized for his effort, action and encouragement which further the effectiveness of the entire program of environmental awareness and conservation" by the Alaska Environmental Education Association.

The award was presented to Stevens at a meeting in Kenai Friday, by AEEA Board President, Peter F. Larson.







LYNX STUDY PROPOSED BY ADF&G

Fur trappers have been urged to save the carcasses of trapped lynxes so they may be used in a Department of Fish and Game research project.

Pete Berrie, Fairbanks game biologist, said 50 lynx carcasses needed from the are Anchorage area and 20 from The Department of Homer. Fish and Game is paying \$5 for each carcass received in good condition, and carcasses may be sent to A.D.F.&G. at Rm. 116, 604 Barnett St., Fairbanks. Only adult females are needed from the Anchorage area, Berrie said, but trappers in the Homer area may send in any age or sex. The head must he intact and undamaged.

The lynx collection project is part of a 10-year effort by Department researchers to learn more about lynx movements, breeding and denning habits, and reproduction-population trends.

Lynx populations are cyclic, usually fluctuating behind the "ups" and "downs" of the snowshoe hare upon which it depends for food between December and April. Lynx are expected to reach a "high" in the Anchorage area two years from now.

POLLOCK ASKS AMMENDMENT

JUNEAU Howard Pollock, R-Alaska. says he is seeking inclusion of an amendment to the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1970 to authorize a special \$20 million appropriation for Aaska for fiscal 1972 and 1973.

Another part of the amendment would extinguish certain rights-of-way for roads, highways, tramways, trails and bridges reserved in legislation enacted in 1947. Pollock said this would permit private development of the land involved.

Pollock said he has contacted the chairman of the House Public Works Committee requesting the amendment, which he says matches an amendment inserted in the recently passed senate version of the 1970 Highway Act.
