



## EKLUTNA COUNCIL TO BLOCK HIGHWAY

### LOCAL MAN NAMED AWF&SC PRESIDENT

**FAIRBANKS:** Edward A. Bellringer, a resident of the Chugiak Area was elected the new President of the Alaska Wildlife Federation & Sportsman's Council at their 17th annual meeting held last week at Fairbanks.

This is the third time that Bellringer has held this office the first time in 1960 and again in 1968.

Bellringer, who has lived in Alaska going on twenty years, is a past president of the Matanuska Valley Sportsman, is presently a member and trustee of the Alaska Big Game Trophy Club, is an official scorer for the Boone and Crockett Club, is Secretary for the Anchorage Area Fish and Game Board Advisory Committee, is a life member of the National Rifle Association. He works at Elmendorf Air Force Base as Wildlife Program Advisory for the Alaskan Air Command, and is Conservation Advisor for the Alaskan Command.

Bellringer makes his home in the Peter's Creek area with his wife and three daughters.

Also elected at this meeting was Harold S. Ephan, of Palmer who will serve as Vice-President for the South Central Area.

The Council at this meeting reaffirmed their stand objecting to political interference in Fish and Game management. They also went on record to recommend that the State of Alaska adopt the National Rifle Association's Hunter Safety Law.

Also resolved was to have the State Highway Department seek a waiver from the Federal Department of Transportation on requiring of fencing both sides of Federal Aid Highways in Alaska. It is their belief that these fences interfere with the normal movement of moose herds.

Action was taken at this meeting to change the name of the organization from the Alaska Sportsman's Council, to the Alaska Wildlife Federation & Sportsman's Council. This is to reflect the Council's affiliation with the National Wildlife Federation. The Council is made up of Sportsman's groups from all over the State. Club representatives from as far away as Juneau attended the meeting in Fairbanks.

**EKLUTNA:** The Eklutna Village Council, at their Monday meeting resolved to take legal action to hold up the construction of the extension of the Anchorage to Fairbanks Highway from Peters Creek to Eklutna until the settlement of the Native Land Claims.

Acting on a protest which had been filed in 1951, the Council unanimously resolved to block the efforts of the State to acquire Right of Way through certain protested lands near the village.

Although the village recognized the need for this project it was felt that the State could do more than it has to aid this Community in terms of development.

It was further stated that the status of the land at present makes it impossible to derive any direct benefits from the state. Any monetary benefit would go into the Federal general fund without any benefit to the village. The holdup could be until the land claims are settled.

In the past Right of Way resulted in the lifting of the land freeze by recommendation of the village by resolution early in 1970. This practice was stopped.

The protested land affected lies between Anchorage and Palmer.

It was not known at this time if the loss was covered by insurance.

Everyone wishes she would hurry home She is loved and missed

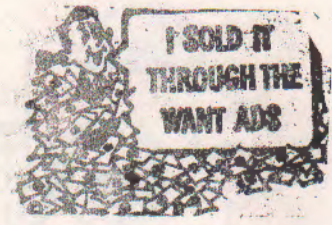

Republican Senate nominee Ted Stevens has proposed an Air Travel Protection Agency to coordinate federal agency efforts to halt airplane hijackings.

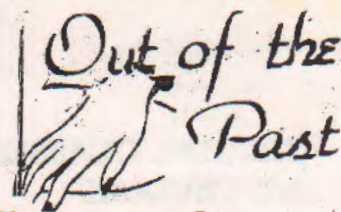

## SPECIAL CLASSES AT CHUGIAK ELEMENTARY

**OLD CHUGIAK:** The Chugiak Elementary School's students in grades 4, 5, and 6 will soon experience a program which will place upon them the responsibility of selecting an academic area of study. This is a program which will be aimed at accomplishing the following objectives: 1. Selecting a program in an area of interest and following through with the requirements demanded of that class. 2. To build a student's self-direction and self discipline. 3. To provide for the students interesting areas of study in which they will work harder, since attendance in an area will be the student's choice. 4. To give the students the opportunity to take advantage of a specific teacher's skill and talents. 5. To provide an experience involving shifting classroom areas in addition to becoming flexible by meeting the demands of several teachers. 6. To allow for growth in independent work habits.

There will be no grades given in these specific areas. It is the aim of the school to reduce the anxieties which often accompany a grading system. Students will be free to enjoy these areas for the pleasure and enjoyment of learning, rather than working for a letter grade.

A certificate of completion will be awarded those students who satisfactorily complete the courses.

This is a pilot program, and will operate for a period of 10

weeks. At completion, students and teachers will evaluate together and determine if such a program is worthy of being established.

A breakdown of the five academic areas in which students will have an opportunity to explore will be published in the next edition of the Courier.

## PRINCIPAL TELLS REGULATION

**EAGLE RIVER:** Mr. Blue, principal of the Eagle River Elementary School, gave a breakdown of the State Law governing the operation of vehicles on school property at a recent meeting of the Eagle River Elementary PTA. According to Mr. Blue, the Regulation No. 127/69, which covers this subject, reads as follows:

The operation of vehicles on school grounds constitutes a danger to the children.

The Greater Anchorage Area Borough now therefore ordains that Chapter 13, code of ordinance of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough is amended by adding Article 3 to read as follows: Section 13.15 Offense: The unauthorized operator of any vehicle on a public school ground is prohibited. Section 13.17 Penalty: Anyone who violates ordinance, 1 shall be liable for any damages and subject to other appropriate remedies together with costs in a criminal action brought by Greater Anchorage Area Borough.

2. Shall be guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not more than \$300.00 or be imprisoned for not more than 30 days, or both.

Vehicles used in this article is to include ALL vehicles propelled by other than human muscular power.

Also discussed at the regular PTA meeting October 19, was the busing program.

Mr. William Knight, bus contractor for the Greater Chugiak Area, informed the PTA that the number of children bussed for the 21 days of school in September were:

Chugiak, 5,421; Birchwood, 5,290; Eagle River, 6,475; Kindergarten and Special Ed. 1,103; High School, 15,785.  
Grand total, 34,074

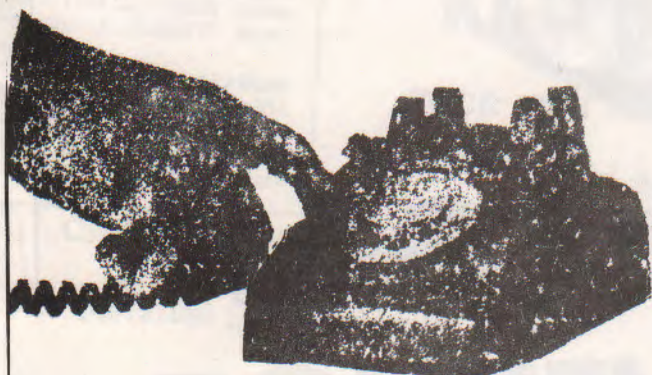

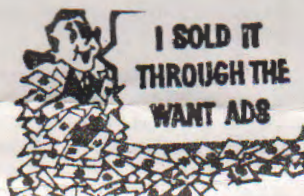

### LYNX STUDY PROPOSED BY ADF&G

Fur trappers have been urged to save the carcasses of trapped lynxes so they may be used in a Department of Fish and Game research project.

Pete Berrie, Fairbanks game biologist, said 50 lynx carcasses are needed from the Anchorage area and 20 from Homer. The Department of Fish and Game is paying \$5 for each carcass received in good condition, and carcasses may be sent to A.D.F.&G. at Rm. 116, 604 Barnett St., Fairbanks.

Only adult females are needed from the Anchorage area, Berrie said, but trappers in the Homer area may send in any age or sex. The head must be intact and undamaged.

The lynx collection project is part of a 10-year effort by Department researchers to learn more about lynx movements, breeding and denning habits, and reproduction-population trends.

Lynx populations are cyclic, usually fluctuating behind the "ups" and "downs" of the snowshoe hare upon which it depends for food between December and April. Lynx are expected to reach a "high" in the Anchorage area two years from now.

### POLLOCK ASKS AMMENDMENT

JUNEAU

Howard Pollock, R-Alaska, says he is seeking inclusion of an amendment to the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1970 to authorize a special \$20 million appropriation for Alaska for fiscal 1972 and 1973.

Another part of the amendment would extinguish certain rights-of-way for roads, highways, tramways, trails and bridges reserved in legislation enacted in 1947. Pollock said this would permit private development of the land involved.

Pollock said he has contacted the chairman of the House Public Works Committee requesting the amendment, which he says matches an amendment inserted in the recently passed senate version of the 1970 Highway Act.
