



## RURAL VOTERS DUMP CHARTER

ANCHORAGE: The hotly contested Charter went down to defeat yesterday, brought to earth by the voters outside the City of Anchorage.

The Charter, which had to tally over 51% affirmative votes both inside and outside the City in order to pass was defeated in the Borough by a "NO" vote of 6,145 to a "YES" vote of 3,403 (unofficial).

Inside the City, the Charter passed by a narrow margin of 3,138 "YES" votes to 2,622 "NO".

This rejection of the Charter means that it will return to the Charter Commission who will attempt to amend the objectionable sections and bring it back to the voters in one year. If it is again turned down, then the Charter Commission will disband and the issue will be dead.

Local turnout in the precincts of the Greater Chugiak Area was not as heavy as had been hoped for by local anti-charter groups who had been beating the drum to get all of the registered voters in the area to the polls.

Total unofficial voter for the five precincts in the Greater Chugiak Area was 1,364. This is 230 votes less than was cast at the August primary election, when 1,594 voters went to the polls.

In precinct number 147 (Eagle River Valley) 290 votes were cast. Precinct number 148 (Eagle River) 370 votes. Precinct number 149 (Chugiak) 269, Precinct No. 150, (Birchwood) 282 votes. Only in Precinct number 151 (Peters Creek) did the number of votes come close to those cast in the primary. The vote yesterday in Peters Creek was 153 as opposed to the 166 who voted in the primary election.

The number of votes for or against the Charter, as well as on the other issues and candidates from the local precincts were not made available to the Courier in time to make the deadline for this issue.

The ballots were not counted locally, but were taken to Borough Election Headquarters at the Anchorage School District Administration building where they were counted by computer.

Ed Willis, Borough Assemblyman from the Greater Chugiak Area, and one of the most outspoken opponents of the

### YOUTH CHARGED WITH BLACKMAIL

EAGLE RIVER: An 18 year old Chugiak Area youth was arrested by the Alaska State Troopers last week on suspicion of attempting to extort \$8,000 from a teller at the 1st National Bank branch at Eagle River.

According to Lieut. O'Brien of the Alaska State Troopers, the woman teller received an anonymous call at approximately 10:00am on September 28th. The caller indicated he had her two teen aged daughters in custody and threatened them harm unless she brought \$8,000 in cash to the Old Peters Creek bridge by 11:00am of that day.

Lieut. O'Brien said that his office was notified of the threat within minutes. They first of all determined that the two girls were safe at school, then advised the teller to bring a dummy packet of money containing only a few marked bills to the pick-up site. She drove a borrowed van type vehicle, with two State Troopers hidden in the back. In addition to these two troopers, there were a total of 13 to 15 men including FBI agents hidden in the woods around the bridge,

### CHAMBER BOARD HEARS PLANS FOR PRISON

EAGLE RIVER: Captain David Webb, Supervisor for the Department of Correction for the Southcentral District, State of Alaska, was the special guest speaker at the regular meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce.

Capt. Webb told the group of plans to construct a Medium Security Correction Institution, which possible might be located in the Eagle River area.

The 216 acre site under consideration is located just to the south of the Eagle River Campground on state land belonging to the Department of Mental Health.

The other site is adjacent to the Alaska Psychiatric Institute in Anchorage.

A Federally funded site study is currently underway, Webb stated, and the results of this study should be completed within 10 to 15 days.

Webb explained that the factors which would influence the decision would be land availability and which site was the most suitable for the type of

### ILLEGAL MOOSE KILLS FOUND IN THIS AREA

CHUGIAK: Twelve cow moose have been found indiscriminately shot in the Greater Chugiak area since the hunting season began on August 20th and the Fish and Game Department has appealed for public assistance to apprehend the violators.

Calling on the public to report any illegal kills, Regional Protection Officer, Don Tetzlaff, said of the twelve cows already found, seven had been shot and the meat salvaged, and five had been shot and the meat taken.

Three other kills have been reported but not found by Department protection officers.

Tetzlaff said the cows may have been shot by hunters who mistook them for bulls. In this case, the hunter would not have been prosecuted, had he reported the incident immediately and the meat salvaged.

Investigation of the incidents is continuing, he added.

Tetzlaff said the Department

plus another trooper surveying the area from an airplane, till 5pm of that day, but the caller failed to pick-up the bundle

On the following day, October 29th, a woman employee of the Alaska State Bank, who lives in Anchorage received a similar call at around 9:30 in the evening. She was also instructed to bring cash, this time \$10,000 to the old Peters Creek bridge. She informed the State Troopers of the call and they placed a tap on her telephone. She received a second call later that evening, instructing her to have the cash at the bridge at 11:00pm. This time the caller identified himself as Investigator Roger Benson, of the Alaska State Troopers.

The call was traced to a pay phone in the Chugiak area. Investigator Benson listened to a tape which had been made of the call and recognized the voice as that of a youth who he had questioned for past offenses.

The youth, George E. Van Duren, of Peters Creek, was interviewed by the Alaska State Troopers, and subsequently was arrested on the charge of attempted blackmail.

He is presently out on bail. The case will be brought before the next Grand Jury for indictment, according to the Alaska State Troopers.

institution planned.

The facility would be built to house 120 inmates initially, with the ability to expand to house a maximum of 300 as future need would dictate. A staff of 60 to 70 people would be employed.

Webb pointed out that only a portion of the 216 acres would be used if the Eagle River location was the one selected, and that a 16 foot high barbed wire fence would enclose the complex. He again pointed out that this would be a prison for medium security prisoners, and that the State would continue to send maximum security inmates to penitentiaries outside.

The facility would be built through a direct appropriation of 5.2 million dollars appropriated by the last State Legislature. He said this would be the beginning of a program for the construction of regional correctional institutions in the State.

While complete plans for the facility have not yet been drawn up, Webb said that he is sure that there will be no plans for staff housing at the institution, nor facilities for laundry on the premises.

He said that he was reasonably sure that the institute would be equipped with its own complete sewage treatment plant.

When asked if a pro or con reaction from Chugiak Area

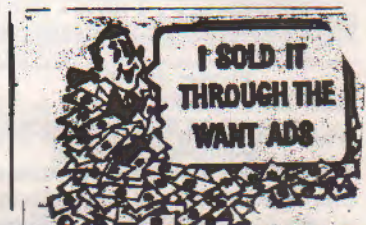
residents might influence the decision of the location of the prison, he said it would certainly be one of the factors to be considered. However, he pointed out that the Anchorage site did not, in his opinion, have sufficient land for any expansion. He said it already was shared by API and the McLaughlin Youth Center.

He also replied in answer to a question, that the only other parcel of State land which might be available was located in the Birchwood area, near the Alaska Railroad.

He said the final report was due on November 11th. Construction is scheduled to begin in June or July of 1970, to be completed in December of 1972.

Webb said that he, himself was leaving the Department of Correction, and that any future questions would have to be addressed to Charles Adams, Director of Division of Correction, Pouch H, Juneau.

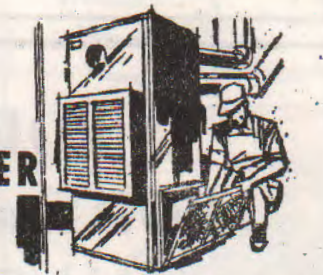

**OIL DRUMS OUT AS GARBAGE CANS**

**ANCHORAGE:** Old 55 gallon oil drums have many uses, but common practice aside, they are not garbage cans.

The Greater Anchorage Area Borough's health department is mailing approximately 7,000 letters to borough residents served by Anchorage Refuse advising them that the garbage collection company will not pick up garbage deposited in oil drums after next March first.

A health department spokesman said storage of garbage in any other than "tight, covered, washable or otherwise approved containers" is not legal.

Burning garbage is also against the law, he said. The department spokesman said public dumps are available at Eagle River, Spenard and at Girdwood.

A nominal fee is charged for use of the Eagle River and the Girdwood dump. The Spenard dump is financed by a .5

mill levy.

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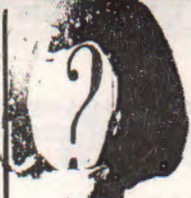

Anyone needing information on dog control, or wishing to report a stray dog may call Mr. Trent, at the Animal Shelter, at 277 5823.

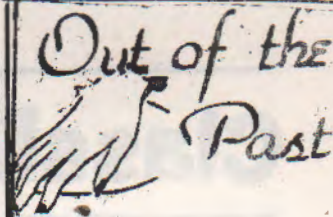
