MOVIE THEATER TO OPEN HERE

EAGLE River: A movie theater with a seating capacity of 300 is scheduled to be opened by January 1st, of 1971, according to Robert Thomas of Eagle Riv-

Thomas is presently constructing the theater at the corner of Eagle River Road and the Eagle River Loop.

Thomas said that they have ovrcome the difficulties which forced them to cancel plans to open a theater several years ago, and now are approved to show Walt Disney films as well as movies from several other major studios.

Thomas said that the emphasis will be on family type movies.

Initial plans call for showing movies on Friday nights, Sat-urday nights and Saturday and Sunday matinees. The Saturday matinee will be a kiddle show, complete with cartoons.

ANCHORAGE: Strong oppos-ition by Chugiak Alea resid-ents was largely responsible for the defeat of the proposed Snowmobile tract by the GAAB Assembly last Monday

evening. The defeat, may only be a temporary setback for the proposal of the Anchorage Motor Mushers, as Assembly-man Wilda Hudson one of the six who voted against the measure, gave notice of re-con-sideration. Under parlimen-tary proceedures, this means that Mrs. Hudson may ask the issue be brought back for vote at the next regular or special meeting of the Assembly. Local residents who attend-

ed the public hearing last Monday not only cited their one objections to the propos-al, but carried petitions from other area residents objecting to it,

Ed Willis, Assemblyman from this area stated that he had received many calls from local residents objecting to the pro-posal. He stated that it was pointed out to him that the proposal in its present form is too vague, and does not have sufficient detail as to what use the borough land is to be put to. In effect, it would be writ-ing the Motor Mushers a blank

check.

The land in question, is in the vicinity of and includes Beach Lake. It is in the Birch-wood Area, and not in Eagle River as the Anchorage newspapers have been saying.

When and if the matter is again brought before the Assembly, it will not include a pub-lic hearing. Local residents who have

been fighting the proposal are now concentrating their fire on Wilda Hudson, who by virtue of her notice of consideration is the only member of the Assembly who can again bring the matter up for vote.

A spokesman for a local recreation group who has been opposing the tract urges local residents who also oppose it to personally call Mrs. Hud-son and attempt to persuade her to allow the Assembly's vote of Monday night to stand.

The vote was 6 opposed and in favor of the proposal. If Mrs. Hudson changes her vote to "Yes", a tie vote would result.

ANCHORAGE DRIVER GETS CITATION




