



LOCAL ELECTION RESULTS

HEARING COVERS PETERS CREEK EKLUTNA ROAD

BIRCHWOOD: Representatives of the Alaska Department of Highways, met last Wednesday at Chugiak High School with Chugiak Area residents, and conducted a public hearing on the extension of the New Glenn Highway, which will begin at Peters Creek, north of the new bridge, and extend on to the new construction which starts at Eklutna Butte to Palmer.

Maps of highway design which were on display, showed the proposed route, which would leave the existing Glenn Highway at Mile 21 1/2, describe a long loop through the Earl Ray sub-division and the Eklutna Heights sub-division, return to and cross the existing highway at Mirror Lake, parallel the highway, crossing and re-crossing the road until it connects with the new construction at Eklutna Butte.

It was explained that it might be possible to construct this particular stretch of road as a 4 lane divided highway at the outset, instead of two lanes with widening to 4 lane in the future as in planned for the Eagle River to Peters Creek section. This would call for 40 feet of pavement, with 8 foot shoulders.

Plans call for the old Glenn Highway, which is terminated by a fence just north of the Old Peters Creek Bridge to be opened and joined to a gravel frontage road which would parallel the proposed new construction on the East as far as Mirror Lake. This would provide access to the new highway at frequent intervals to residents to the East of the road.

Several objections to the design were read into the record mainly from property owners whose homes or property lie in the proposed right of way.

The main objection to the project came from the Eklutna Village Council, who indicated that they would take legal steps to block the acquiring of right of way through the reservation lands until such a time as the Land Claims were settled, and right of way payment could legally be paid to the village, instead of to the BIA General Fund.

A spokesman for the Department of Highways stated that

LOCAL REALTOR GETS AWARD

PUBLIC HEARING TO CONCERN BEACH LAKE

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Area Borough Assembly will conduct a public hearing on Monday, November 9th at 8:00pm at the School Administration Building 670 Fireweed Lane in Anchorage.

The purpose of this hearing is to allow the public to express their views on a proposition by the Anchorage Motor Musers Club to develop certain lands in the Birchwood Area for use of mechanical recreation vehicles.

This land would include the Beach Lake area, and the Motor Musers have asked they be granted management responsibility of the area.

CHUGIAK: An all time record number of voters went to the polls at yesterday's general election, with a total of 1,780 votes cast at the five local voting precincts.

The vote by precinct was, in the Eagle River Valley precinct (No. 147) 394 ballots cast, in Eagle River Precinct, (No. 148) 489 votes. In the Chugiak voting precinct (No. 149) total vote cast was 330; in the Birchwood precinct, (No. 150) the total vote was 371; while at the Peters Creek Precinct, (No. 151), 196 votes were cast.

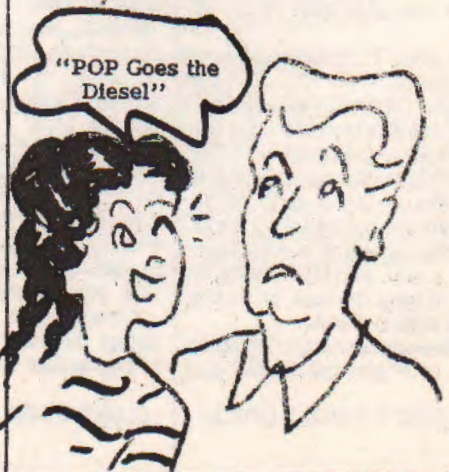
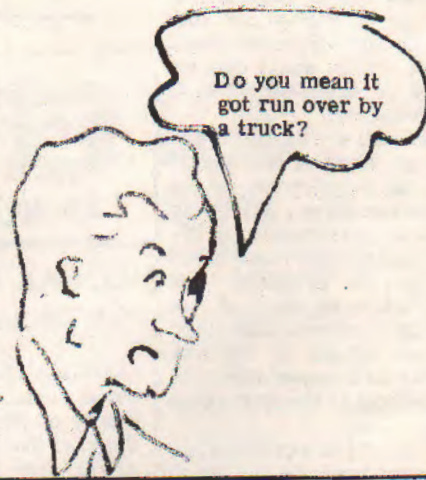

he felt sure that any such right of way payments could be placed in escrow in the name of the village council, there to draw interest until a settlement of the land claims is arrived at.

When questioned if a waiver could be obtained on the Federal requirement to fence both sides of the highway, thereby removing the interference with the normal movement of moose herds, it was stated that there were no plans to erect the fences through the Klutna Flats, nor in any other non-populated areas.

When it was pointed out that the fences which paralleled the new Glenn Highway from Eagle River to Peters Creek were already creating moose problems, it was told that a number of plans were being considered to handle these. Underpasses at frequent intervals which would allow the moose to cross from one side of the highway to the other was one that was being given serious consideration.

The records of this hearing are to be kept open for several weeks, and anyone wishing to write a letter of statement concerning the new construction may do so during this period and it will be written into the record of the hearing.

The final decision of the design is expected to be arrived at within the next month to six week period.

The construction schedule calls for the acquiring of right of way by mid-summer of 1971, with actual construction to begin in 1972.

All the Senior Citizens are most appreciative for the generosity shown to them by these very thoughtful people of our community.

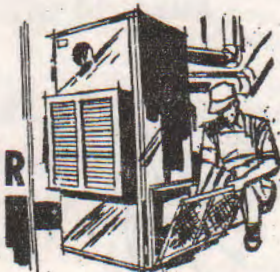

OLD CHUGIAK: The following special educational programs will soon be offered to the students at Chuglak Elementary School in addition to their regular studies, according to Mr. Zankie, Principal.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION: Teacher, Mr. Rupp. The students will be exposed to their environment through studies of the forest, rocks and minerals, tides, mapping, use of the compass, and survival.

To accomplish this, the students will be given direction in the use of resource materials, audio visual aids, specimens and the compass.

There will be short walks into the woods bordering the school and it is expected that resource personnel can be contacted to speak to the class.

These students will gain a greater appreciation of and for their environment by becoming more aware of their surroundings, how it benefits and supports plants and animals and how man can adopt to nature's forces.

FRENCH: Teacher, Mrs. Speicher. The objectives of this class are to help the children to learn some basic vocabulary for common objects, plus some easy conversation. Some French songs and games will be sung and played to enhance the learning situation. Pronunciation, numbers, colors etc will be covered.

SCHOOL NEWSPAPER: Teacher Mrs. Menschel. A school newspaper is being planned involving all grade levels. It will be co-ordinated and supplemented by a newspaper staff composed of 4th, 5th and 6th graders.

The major objectives of this project are: 1. To provide an outlet for written expression, (both creative and reportage) on a school-wide level. 2. To strengthen communication between the school and the community.

ART: Teacher, Mrs. Gaard. The boys and girls who select Art as their choice in the Enrichment Program will find it one of "exploring" the use of various media to express themselves in creative art. Plans are underway to use crayons, tempera, fabric, clay, prints and other media the children may select.

As a culmination of the Art Enrichment Program, an Art Show is planned for the Spring. **ROCKETRY:** Teacher, Mr. Heath. Here the class will study the principles of how rockets work. The main core of the course will be devoted to construction of rockets and firing them.

The students will make their own rockets and launching pads, either from kits or from their own materials.

Dear Editor:

We wish to call attention to the proposed request by the Snowmobile Club to lease local Borough Recreational land for EXCLUSIVE use of MECHANIZED vehicles.

The area in question, at the South end of Birchwood Loop to Cook Inlet including Beach Lake, earmarked previously as recreational land, is now supposedly to be used for MECHANIZED RECREATION ONLY.

This proposal almost invariably excludes other types of desirable recreation, - horse-back riding, hiking, cross-country skiing, hiking. The planning staff of the Borough Assembly states in the Memo that they are of the opinion that the proposal to perform a minimum of improvements on the site this year is not ideal, but nevertheless the group is strongly urged to go ahead with long-range plans for improvements in the area.

Why should this Anchorage Club, which is 20 miles away come into our area and want to turn a beautiful spot into an arena, when racing tracks and parking lots could just as well be built on the ugly landscape around Anchorage consisting of all those dead-looking evergreens?

We protest this proposal, on the grounds that the development of a bowl-shaped race course and a parking lot for a MINIMUM of 500 cars would destroy the natural scenic beauty of this area.

Local residents should be aware of this proposal and its future effect on our community. It should also be noted that Mr. Willis, in behalf of those concerned area residents, has asked for, and received a hearing on this matter.

The hearing is only a week away, November 9th, 7:30pm, at the School Administration Building on Fireweed Lane.

MTA HEARS PHONE BEEFS

BIRCHWOOD: Approximately 150 dissatisfied subscribers of the Matanuska Telephone Association filled the multi-purpose room of Chuglak High School last week, and brought their grievances to the management.

MTA had called this public meeting, and had invited representatives of the Public Service Commission, RCA, the City of Anchorage Telephone Utility and Elmendorf and Ft. Richardson Base Communications systems to sit in.

Complaints ranged from inability to obtain proper service within the local exchanges, to difficulty in calling to Anchorage and complaints of the tolls to the military bases.

The problems, it appeared were threefold. While MTA could and would take steps to correct the hang-ups within the local exchanges, the limited number of available circuits to Anchorage were responsible for the trouble in placing calls to that City, and could be alleviated only when RCA makes additional circuits available. This was hoped.

Tolls to the military bases are a third problem, and no immediate relief to that was apparent.

It was suggested that local subscribers might write to members of the Alaskan congressional delegation pointing out the great number of local residents who are either members of the military, or who are civilians employed at one or the other of the bases, and the need for toll-free communication between this area and the bases, such as available to subscribers of the Anchorage Telephone Utility.

EAGLE RIVER: Chuglak High School Counselor, Mrs. Sally Callaway, was guest speaker at the regular board meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce last Monday night.

Mrs. Callaway told the board of a program which the school hopes to initiate with the aid of local business establishments whereby students may obtain credits in vocational fields through an on-the-job training program.

Local businessmen will be asked to provide opportunities for interested students to spend several hours a day at their establishment learning a trade. This would be on a no salary basis for not more than a one semester period.

Mrs. Callaway pointed out that there is little or no opportunity for the non-college oriented students to obtain any vocational training at the local school, and that cooperating businessmen could help provide this necessary opportunity.

Other Chamber Business discussed was the scheduling of the Annual Meeting, which in accordance with the By-laws must be held the first regular meeting day in December.

All Chambers members will receive a notice of this meeting 30 days prior to the date.

A financial report and a resume of the first years activities of the Chamber will be presented at this time. Also an amendment to the By-Laws will be voted upon by the membership and a nominating committee to select candidates for several board seats will be appointed.

This meeting has been scheduled for Monday, December 14th.

The next regular meeting of the Board of Directors will be on Monday, November 23rd, at the Lions Den in the Eagle River Shopping Center, starting at 8pm.
