


BOWLING ALLEY BAR LICENSE DENIED



Christmas tidings echo their joy and wonderment throughout the land. Midst the happy bustle of holiday preparations, we pause to hid wishes for health and happiness to our dear customers, their families and friends. Thank you, one and all. ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Area Borough Assembly turned down a application for a alcoholic beverage license by Jim King of the Eagle River Bowl at their meeting last Monday night.

The vote followed a public hearing, at which time King explained that his plans to re-open the bowling alley were dependent upon obtaining the license. The Brunswick Corporation, hed refused to install the equipment unless a cocktail lounge was to be operated in confunction with the lanes to further insure the financial status reoperation. Past records seem show that the bowling alley by themselves did not bring in sufficient income to pay off the equipment within the specified time period.

An initial motion to deny the license did not have sufficient yes votes to pass. The vote was 5 to 4 to deny it. A vote of six was necessary to defeat the motion. The motion was then rephrased to grant the application. This was defeated 7 to 2.

feated 7 to 2.

The assembly based their vote on the basis of there not being sufficient population in the area to justify granting of another license.

There is no further appeal through the Borough Assembly on this action.

King said that there is another course open to him, but that he had little hope of being able to re-open the bowling alley without the license.

One Christmas legend tells of the lit gray lamb with a long-ing in its heart to be white. It wandered to the dwelling of the Holy Family, lingering at the door. The Christ Child, seeing the lamb, beckoned it in. He laid His hand on its head, and it became white as snow

Norwegians, Swedes and the Swiss make it a special point to be extremely friendly and hospitable on Christmas, both to domestic pets and wild pirds. A persistent Christmas legend

is that bees hum a carol in honor of the Christ Child. In England, holly is placed on the hive to wish the bees a Merry Christmas.

Spaniards are taught to treat cows kindly: they believe that cattle breathed upon the Christ Child to keep Him warm. Tradi-tion holds that cows and homes kneel in adoration at midnight each Christmas Eve. Among the residents of the German Alps it is believed that on Christmas Eve all animals can reak.

Hospitality Tea Punch



Happy the holiday hostess who has an easy trick or two up her sleeve. A good punch recipe, for instance, will come in handy at many a festive occasion. The one pictured above, rosy in color, is a delightful blend of fruit juices with a strong tea base. The tea acts as a silent partner in the punch, giving it body without masking the flavors of the other ingredients. For holiday glamer a colorful ice ring filled with orange and lemon slices, red and green candied cherries, floats in the bowl. Cup cakes made from a cake mix and decorated with a variety of holiday motifs are also easy to do, yet effectively festive.

Holiday Panch (Makes about 50 punch-cup servings)

1 quart cold water
1/3 cup loose tea or 15
teabags

4 cup sugar 2 quarts cranberry juice cocktail

4 (6 oz.) cans frozen orange juice, thawed

Bring I quart cold water to full rolling boil; remove from heated tea all at once. Let stand 5 minutes. Strain into punch is which it days and stir until dissolved. Cool at room temperature. Add juices and water. Refrigerate. When ready to serve, add ginger ale, and ice ring.

"To make ice ring, freeze water in ring mold adding lemon and make ices and red and green cherries."




BRAZIL CUSTOM HELPS OTHERS



HOW IT GREW

To give leaves of broadleaf evergreens a fustre, wipe them with glycerine diluted with water. You may silver or gold some or spray them with artificial

Prepare cake mix according to package directions; bake in two (8-inch) pans. Cool and split each layer (with knile or string) to make 4 thin layers.

Spread the bottom 3 layers with apricot preserves; stack and top with remaining layer. Mell chocolate and butter over het water. Add confectioners' sugar and vanilla; blend well. Ad boiling water. Spread over top of cake and drizzle down the side


