MEDICARE RATE GOES UP

Beginning Jan.1, Medicare hospital patients will pay the first \$60 of their hospital bill if they entered the hospital after 1970.

The present \$52 hospital deductible will apply for hospital stays which began in 1970 and carried over into 1971.

Frank M. Di Paul, manager of the Anchorage Social Security office, explained the increase was pecessary because of the long-term rise in hospital

The \$60 deductible applies to the first 60 days as a bed patient in a hospital.


Also, beginning Medicare patients hospitalized over 60 days and up to 90 days must pay \$15 a day instead of the present \$13 per day.

Medicare patients needing hospitalization beyond the 90 days can draw upon a "lifetime reserve" of an additional 60 days. If this becomes necessary he will need to pay \$30 for each day used tead of the present 126 per day.

For the first 20 days in an extended care facility the Medicare patient pays nothing. However, beginning lan. 1, star in extended core facility more than 20 day? through the 100 will cos \$7.50 per day instead of the presen \$2.50 per day.







INVITATIONS TO INAGUARATION ARE SENT

JUNEAU to the formal inauguration of Gov. William A. Egan and Lt. Gov. H.A. "Red" Boucher are going into the mails, the inauguration committee reported Monday.

committee spokesman said between 54,000 and 55,000 invitations are being mailed

for the activities Jan. 8-9.

The Alaska Ferry Wickersham will be docked at Juneau during the activities to provide housing for some of the guests, and the inauguration committee reports that the ferry Taku also may be held over for that purpose.

The festivities begin at 4:30 p.m. Jan. 8 with public open house at the governor's mansion followed by an inaugural dinner at 71p.m. the Baranof Hotel, the Elks lodge, the Breakwater Inciand Mike's Place in Douglas Admission is by ticket.

On Saturday, Jan. 9, an inaugural parade is scheduled for 10 a.m., followed by inaugural pageants at the high school auditorium at noon and 3 p.m. The inaugural ceremony will be at 2 p.m. in the high school gymnasium, with admission by invitation only

disposing of it. According to Ed Alger, public nuisance control supervisor for the Anchorage Borough Health Department, it is currently permissable either to take your used Christmas trees to the dump or leave them with your regular trash to be picked up by the city. But no one is allowed to

burn trees, Alger stressed.
Several cities across the nation have made provisions to recycle old Christmas trees so that they will continue to be useful, such as collecting them for landfill or shredding them to use for mulch to control erosion.

Alger speculates that Anchorage will follow suit in the future, but no such plans have been made this year.

RCA TO ESTABLISH STATION

RCA Alaska Communications, Inc., has filed a gequest with the Federal Communications Commission for authority to establish and perate a ground station that rould make Alaska the first tate to utilize satellites for ntrastate communications.

Howard R. Hawkins, resident of RCA Alascom, aid the satellite earth station would be located at Lena Point, near Juneau. He said the facility to be built at an estimated cost of \$1.5 million would provide additional circuits for telephone service, two-way television transmission and expanded voice-record services.

The stations would make possible the first live television between the Juneau-Sitks area an' other parts of Alaska and side points.
