OFF-DUTY FIREMAN HITS FIRE TRUCK

EAGLE RIVER: Last Thurs-day, January 8th, while the Eagle River Fire Company was rushing to answer a fire call up Eagle River Road; the truck was sideswiped by a 1969 Mercury sedan driven by Thomas T. Joy, an off-duty fireman from Ft. Richardson,

The collision took place at Eagle River Loop Road and Foothill Avenue. At the time of the accident, the fire truck was proceeding with both the red light on and the siren engaged.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, the Joy vehicle was driving left of the center line.

Damage to the Mercury was estimated at \$2,000. The fire truck was damaged an estim-ated \$8,000 and was put out of commission.

A second fire truck which was also responding was able to proceed to the fire at the Robert Trainer residence and keep the blaze from spreading to the interior of the house trailer. The fire had started

HAVE YOU SEEN THIS MAN?

MCHORAGE: The Alaska State Troopers are trying to locate a mystery witness in connection with the murder of Isabelle Adams which took place at her place of business Izzy's Bar and Liquor Store in Eagle River last week. A composite drawing of the witness (based on descript-ions given by several per-sons) is being circulated around the local area. This man was believed to

have been seen at or near the scene of the murder on the afternoon of the shooting.

He is described as 5 foot 7 inches tall, of medium build, weighing 190 pounds or less and 40 to 45 years of age. He has light brown hair, has a fair complexion and was wearing a grey Alaskan tuxedo. He was believed to have been driving 1970 Mercury cyclone two door sedan with black vinyl top and light colored bottom, The car was described as being "new and shiny".

The drawing is printed in this newspaper, and anyone having seen the man, or one who answers this description is asked to contact the Alaska State Troopers at 272-1561. This is not the man who is suspected of having shot Mrs.

Adams, and for whom an ar-rest warrent, was issued.

The suspected slayer is David James Bell, of Eagle River Valley. A spokesman for the Alaska State Troopers said that investigation has turned up sufficient evidence to issue a . warrent for his arrest in connection with the homicide.

Witnesses had placed Bell at Tips Bar on Tuesday after noon, and shortly after the time of the shooting he had been picked up at Tips by a taxicab and driven to a bar m Anchorage.
