OLD CHUGIAK: U.S. Postal Inspectors are investigating a burglary which took place at the Chugiak Post Office sometime on the night of January 9th.

Entry was gained by smashing the glass in the door which separates the box lobby from the service lobby.

The break-in was discovered by Postal Clerk Dee Steeby when she reported for work on Saturday, January 10th.

An undetermined amount of parcel post packages appeared to have been taken. Mr. K. E. Johnson, Postal Inspector stated that it is impossible to estimate at this time the value of the items taken. He said that the burglar appeared to have taken packages at random, rather than to have been looking for some particular merchandise.

He stated that he is of the opinion that this is the work of juveniles.

LOS ANGELES, CAL: Extradition papers have been drawn up for David James Bell, and the suspected murder of Isabelle Adams should be back in Alaska this Friday or Saturday, according to the Alaska State Troopers.

Bell was arrested at the Los Angeles airport by the L.A. police while trying to buy a ticket to the east coast.

Mrs. Adams was shot to death on Tuesday, January 6th at her place of business, Izzie's Bar and Liquor store at mile 14 1/2 Old Glenn Highway.

State Troopers uncovered sufficient evidence to issue a warrant for the arrest of Bell, who it was discovered had left Alaska later in the evening the day of the shooting.

Efforts of law enforcement officers in "the south 48" led to his arrest in California.

THE COMMUNITY QUESTION BOX

QUESTION: I am confused about the new diet soft drinks that are on the market.

The cans and cartons are labeled "Clyclamate removed", but the list of ingredients on the cans list clyclamate as still being in them. Isn't there a law that says all food products must be correctly labeled?

ANSWER: We checked with both the bottlers of Pepsi Cola and Anchorage Cold Storage, and they both gave the same explanation.

There were a large quantity of pre-printed cans and cartons on hand when the order came out banning cyclamate.

The FDA has given them cans and cartons as long as they are labeled clyclamate removed.

Since most of these now contain some sugar, they are no longer as low in calories as they once were, but still

have less than regular soft drinks. In order for a soft drink to be called "diet", it must have less than half the calories that regular pop has.

Diet Pepsi, has according to the bottler, one third the calories of regular Pepsi.

A spokesman for Anchorage Cold Storage said that Tab, has 72 calories per can, as opposed to Coke, which has 160. Like, and diet Dr. Pepper which also now contain sugar, have 36 calories per can. The only diet soft drink which is unchanged, is Fresca, which contains no sugar and still has only 12 calories per can.

Three new artificial sweeteners are presently undergoing extensive tests, and it is hoped that one or more of them will prove safe enough to use in diet foods. The most promising is said to be ten times the sweetening strength of clyclamate.

OPEN LETTER: To the residents of Eagle River.

As your Assemblyman I wish to inform you of action being proposed to the Borough Assembly regarding the Eagle River Sewer Service Area. As you know, the Sewer Service area was created primarily to enable an election in order to obtain bonding capacity, approve bonds for construction of sewers and provide back up financing for the system.

However, it is obvious at the present time that a system other than one just to serve the commercially developed area is some distance in the future. From the response indicated by residents of the area to me, to the Borough Public Works Department and to the Assembly, it is apparent the Sewer Service Area is unwelcome in the community. Therefore, we are recommending the abolishment of it at this time.

If, in the future, the residents of an area were to petition for Sewer Service, the petition would be submitted to the Borough Public Works Department for preliminary engineering and cost studies and the Public Works Department would then make a recommendation to the Assembly based on their findings and the petition.

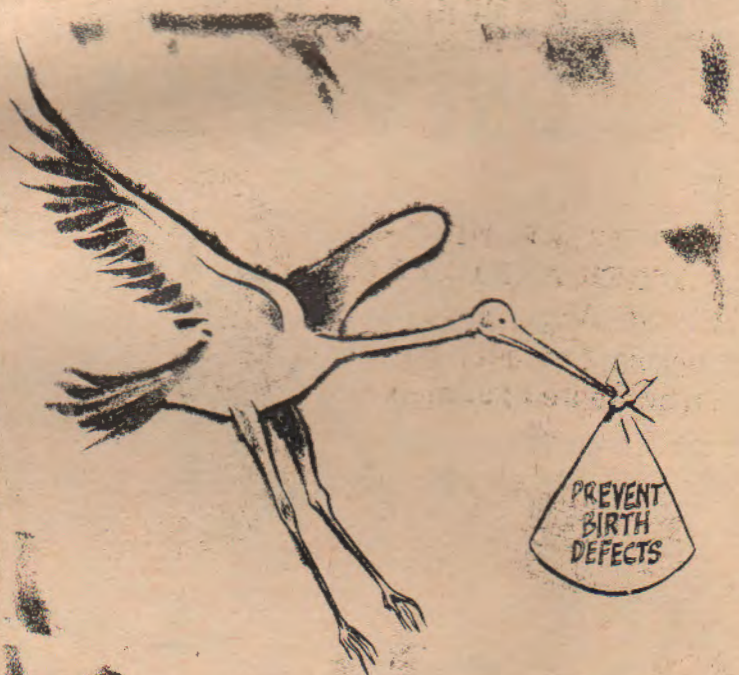

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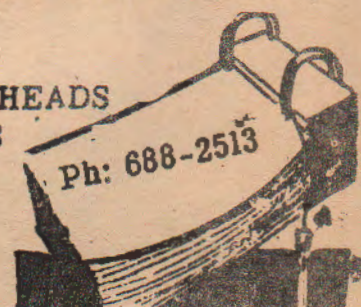

WADE CHARLES WINS JR. DOG MUSHERS TROPHY: Wade Charles, of Eagle River won the 1st of the preliminary dog race held on Tudor Road in Anchorage and was awarded the Suzanne Kemp memorial Trophy.

RUBELLA SHOTS FOR PRE-SCHOOL CHILDREN

EAGLE RIVER: A Rubella immunization clinic for all pre-school children in the Greater Chugiak Area has been scheduled for Saturday, January 31st, at the Eagle River the hours of 10:00am and 6:00pm.

A spokesman for the Borough Department of Health stated that a surprising number of parents had refused to give permission for their children to receive these immunization shots at the clinics held this past week at all three local elementary schools. In most cases these refusals resulted from misunderstanding on the part of the parents who either believed that their children had al-

ready received these shots, or that they had already had the disease.

Rubella, commonly called German measles, or three day measles, is in no way related to the regular or so called "hard" measles. While a vaccine for the the regular measles has been available for some years, and most children now receive this at an early age, this does not immunize the child against Rubella. The Rubella vaccine is entirely new, and has not been administered until this time. It is impossible for any child to have already had Rubella immunizations. It was also pointed out that Rubella is not always easily recognizable in a child, and many other illness resemble it and can easily be mistaken for this so called "3 day measles". Parents are better off to allow their children to have the Rubella shots, which can do them no harm even if they may already have had the disease.

Children who did not receive the immunizations at the school clinics, may still get them at the pre-school clinic on the 31st.

Rubella, while a mild disease in a child, can cause crippling birth defects in a child whose mother contracts Rubella during pregnancy.

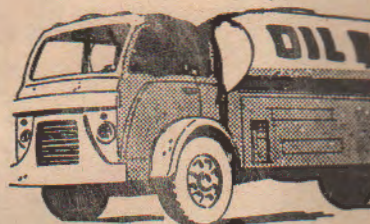

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GOAL COUNCIL APPROVES PLANS

EAGLE RIVER: The members of the GOAL Council were advised by the Chairman that the proposed program for the "Program Year D" (which starts in February) has been approved, however the level of funding is less than that requested.

Just under twenty six thousand dollars was requested but about seventeen thousand dollars was approved. The cuts will be felt mostly in personnel cost and in the center's ability to help some of the low income families with their transportation problems. A committee will be formed to adjust the program of the funding level.

The members of the council present at the meeting discussed the services offered at the center and indicated their desire to continue to provide space for the Food Stamp Program, the Borough Health Nurse, the referral services and the Adult Basic Education classes. The center has received four requests from agencies interested in using the center during the program year D. The members of the Council will be asked to decide on these requests at a future meeting.

Mr. Jessie Wooten announced at the meeting that he would be happy to conduct a class on some aspects of Real Estate.
