PALMER: Robert Vroman, Chairman of the Matanuska-Susitna Borough said that he has heard no comment among residents of that area on the proposal of Representative Stan Cornelius (R) of Anchorage that the Greater Chugiak Area be excluded from the Anchorage Borough and made at part of the Mat-Su Borough,

Vroman said that he has personally investigated the fiscal aspects of this, and came to the conclusion that should such a change take place, the Chugiak area residents would have to expect to pay taxes for the entire support of the

MEA SUB-STATION TO BE NAMED FOR PIONEER

EAGLE RIVER: A pioneer of the Eagle River area, as well as of the Matanuska Valley will be honored in the naming of the new Matanuska Electric sub-station in Eagle River.

Willard Johnson, General Manager for MEA announced today that the name of the facility will be the Walter Pippel Sub-station,

Pippel at one time owned the land on which the new substation is to be located, MEA purchased the land from Pippel.

The decision to name the sub-station was made at the January 26th meeting of the MEA Board of Directors.

ANCHORAGE: Clifford J. Croh, Chairman of the Anchorage Area Charter Commission, stated today that the Charter Commission has no definite plans at this moment toward asking the Boundary Commission to exclude the Greater Chugiak Area from the Anchorage Borough.

This possibility came to the attention of the public when Representative Stan Cornilius (R) made statements to both Anchorage newspapers to the effect that he had written to Groh suggesting this.

Cornelius stated that it appeared that the residents of the Greater Chugiak Areahad indicated by their 7 to I vote against unification in last Octobers election had indicated their unwillingness to be a part of the unified Anchorage area, and therefore he felt it unfair to "cram it down their throats." For this reason he suggested that the Chugiak area should be excluded by the boundary commission and be made a part of the Matanuska Susitna Borough, since these two areas seemed to have more in common.

When asked if he intend to act upon Cornelius' suggestion, Groh stated that Mr. Cornelius plan was slightly "after the fact". Groh said that he had himself written to the Boundary Commission requesting information on possible exclusion of the Chugiak Area approximately ten days prior to the receipt of the letter from Mr. Cornelius. "I don't know where Cornelius got the idea", he said, "I must have a spy in my office."

Groh maintained that it is his belief that the majority of the residents of the Greater Chuglak Area would prefer being a part of the Mat-Su botough to being part of a unified Anchorage government. He said that he had gotten that impression not only during the public hearing which took place at Chugiak last year, but from the many letters which he, as chairman of the Charter Commission has received since Mr. Cornelius' statement appeared in the Anchorage papers. "They are almost all in favor of getting out of the Anchorage Borough."

Groh went on to say that the time during which the Boundary Commission could act on

VERY INTERESTING

The suggestion of Representative Stan Cornelius which was given such front page prominence in both of the Anchorage papers was very interesting.

Ever since the meeting of the Charter Commission at Chugiak High School, we have been wondering when some one in Anchorage was going to drop the other shoe.

to drop the other shoe.

At that meeting a Charter Commission member brought up the idea that perhaps the residents of this area would be happier as a part of the Mat-Su borough. When a number indicated that this would not break their hearts, then the subject was pounded into the minds of those present by asking any and all who addressed the chair if they would

be interested in seceding from the Anchorage borough.

At that time we wondered why the Charter Commission was trying to make it appear that the Chugiak area people wanted out; and suggested that it might be that they were afraid that the over 1400 possible registered voters from this area could turn out en masse and scuttle their charter when it comes up for ratification,

Apparently our guess was correct. When no one from this area took the bait and iniatiated a petition asking to secede from the borough, the appeal to the Boundary Commission, (which admittedly originated in Mr. Groh's office) to exclude the Greater Chugiak Area from the Anchorage Borough was written.

Local reaction to this suggestion has been mixed. For the most part most of these reactions have been emotional. There appear to be those among us who hate Anchorage so much that they would be happy to pay the higher tax rate of the Mat-Su borough just to get away. On the other hand there are those who are so enamored of the big city image and the prestige associated with it that they are anxious to continue being a part of the large municiple organization no matter what the price. Finally there are those whose loyalties are to their own pocketbooks, and who would chose the unit which promises them the most for their tax dollar.

These latter people could very well be our own silent majority, and it is they who will decide which way the community will go if it is ever brought to vote.

What is needed now is some cold, hard figures, so that we can make intellegent decisions, rather than emotional ones.

We would like to suggest this as a first project for the new Chamber of Commerce, They could appoint a study committee who will show us just how much it takes in dollars and cents to run our schools, and how much we would have to pay in taxes if we become a part of the Mat-Su. Also what we might expect in the way of taxes if as a part of the unified Anchorage area we en having to help them pay of ir bonded indebtedness.

Many have ressed the deire to form our own Borough, rather than swap one master for nother. The cost of this should be computed so that a comparison might be made.

A possibility which should be considered is forming a 3rd class borough. We were informed by Robert Vroman, Chairman of the Mat-Su Borough that a 3rd class borough has only the responsibility of providing schools. It is not impossible that stripped of other costs, this area could

These By-lasw called for a board of directors of 13 mem-bers, 9 of which were to be elected by the membership, and 4 of whom will be appointed by the President, subject to the approval of the remainder of the board.

Dues for the organization are

to be established by the board. The committee recommended \$50.00 per year for each business firm, plus \$5.00 additional for each employee. In addition to active membership, accosiate and honorary memberships will be avail-The committee recom-

mended that associate members pay dues of \$10.00 per year. Associate members may take part in discussion of Chambashusiness, but are not entitled to a vote. Board me tings will be no

less than two per month, time and place to be decided. The Board Meetings will be open to the general membership at all times.

Following the election the newly chosen board met and chose their officers. President of the Chamber is Til Wallace, Vice-President, is Glenn Briggs, Secretary is Marianna Koehler and Treasurer, Irene Hildeman. The four board members to be appointed by the President have not yet been named.

The first regular meeting of the new board will be on Friday, January 30th, at the residence of Irene Hildeman in Birchwood.

Setting the dues for members will be one of the first orders

of business for the board. Anyone who own a license to conduct business of any kind in the 'Greater Chugiak Area is eligible for membership.

Over 40 local businesses have already pledged memb-ership in the Chamber.

Til Wallace, new Chamber President, stated that al-though the By-laws call for only one meeting of the General membership each year, he hopes to have all the mem-bers meet at least once each month with the board in order to develop the interest in the Chamber activities that he fe ls is necessary for the organization to be a success.
