

PETITION ASKS 4th CLASS BORO INFORMATION

CARR'S STORE HELD UP AT GUNPOINT

EAGLE RIVER: An armed robbery took place at Carr's Eagle River Store last Saturday, when two masked men day night after the store had closed for business.

At approximately 10:15pm, as Tom Cloonan, the night manager was putting the day's receipts in the store safe, two men appeared from somewhere in the rear of the store.

Both were wearing snowmobilers masks, and one was dressed in a snowsuit and the other in blue denim trousers and jacket.

One of the men was armed with what appeared to be a .38 caliber pistol. He ordered Cloonan into the back office of the store and ordered him to stay there. Cloonan obeyed, and watched the men through a small window which enables anyone in the office to see the interior of the store. When he saw the men leave through the front door of the store he left the office. He discovered that they had taken all the cash from the safe. A number of checks which were also in the safe had not been taken.

Cloonan summoned the Alaska State Troopers and also called Boyd Burleson, the store manager.

Burleson stated that he feels that the two men must have entered the store unobserved during business hours and remained hidden until the last box boy had left and Cloonan was alone. He said that he had questioned the store employees and that none had seen any strange cars in the parking lot when they left. He believes that the pair must have had an accomplice who was waiting for them with getaway transportation. The amount of cash which was stolen was not disclosed, but was a large amount.

Cloonan described the men as both being heavyset Caucasians. He said that they appeared to be adults and not juveniles. None of the employees remembered seeing anyone resembling either of the men in the store earlier in the day.

CHUGIAK: A group of local residents are circulating a petition asking the State Attorney General for information as to whether the Greater Chugiak Area can become a 4th class borough, or if this is not possible, a 4th class city.

Ralph Anderson, of the Chugiak Texaco Service, who drafted the petition, stated that unless the people of this community take some steps to form some kind of local government, they will find themselves swallowed up with no voice at all in their own affairs.

Anderson said that he does not as yet know what power go with 4th class status, but it is his belief that administration of schools will revert to the State.

Copies of the petition have been placed in various business establishments throughout the area, and appear to be receiving quite a number of signatures. He said that he expects to pick the copies up and submit the petitions to the Attorney General by the end of this week.

When the information asked for in the petition is received he said, they are planning to call a community meeting and let the people of this area decide what they want to do.

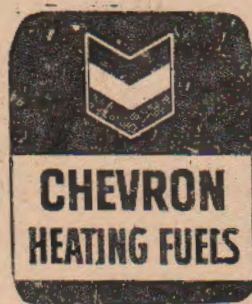

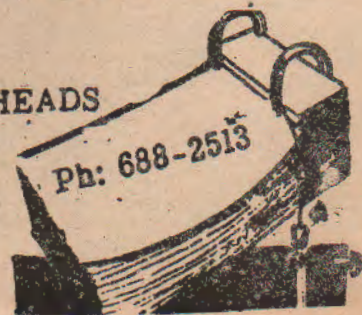

The main topic of business was the forthcoming Sweetheart Ball, to be held at the Anchorage Westward Hotel, Saturday evening, February 14, 1970.

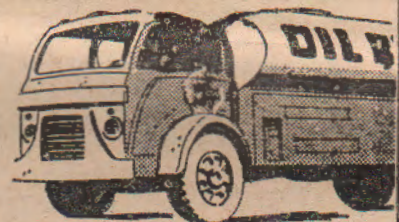
Gamma and Omicron chapters are hosting the Ball this year and the past few weeks members have been busy working on decorations and plans for the event.

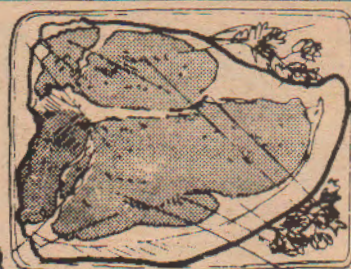
