SHIRLEY GAVIN...3rd TIME WORLD CHAMP

ANCHORAGE: The top lead dog musher in the whole world is still Chugiak's own Shirley Gavin.

Shirley came in first place both days of the race last weekend to win the perpetual trophy for the third time after getting permanent possession of it.

On Saturday, February 14, she made the ten mile trail in 37.40. Second place on Saturday was Rosie Lonsonsky with 38.43; 3rd, Natalie Noris with 39.12, 4th, Donna Mudge with 39.15; 5th, Donna Hank with 41.56; 6th, Sue Holesclaw with 45.00; 7th Donna Knosalla with 55.33; and 8th Connie Hood with 57.56.

On Sunday, the last day of the race, Shirley's time was 37.53. Second place was Rosie Lonsonsky, with 38.56. 3rd was Natalie Noris, with 38.36; 4th was Donna Mudge with 38.47; 5th, was Kath Blis, with 41.12; 6th was Donna Hanks with 55.10, 7th was Sue Holesclaw with 45.47, 8th Donna Knosalla with 51.4 and 9th, Connie Hood with 52.40.

Shirley, who ran 10 dogs the first day and dropped to 8 on the second day, said the trail was in terrible condition from the lack of snow. "It's the worst I have ever seen it," she stated.

Shirley's lead dog is a pure bred registered Irish Setter named Blaze. She has been offered \$600 for the dog, but "I wouldn't take a thousand," she said.

Shirley, who has been training and racing her own dogs for the past nine years, was this last year elected to the Board of Directors of the Alaska Sled Dog Racing Association.

She has 24 dogs in her stable. Shirley does not make her dogs stay outside in all kinds of weather as is the custom with most Alaskan mushers. She has a large comfortable dog barn behind her home, with a stove to heat it in cold weather. Blaze, as befits a leader, is a house pet.

Although Shirley raced in World Championship Sled Dog Race last year, she does not plan to do so next weekend. She said that the poor winter has not made it possible for her to get enough miles on her dogs in training.

CAR DAMAGED BY VANDALS

OLD CHUGIAK: A \$9,000 Lincoln Continental was heavily damaged by vandals during a three hour period last Saturday night.

Gene Needels, of Old Chugiak reported that his car had skidded into the ditch while he was trying to avoid an oncoming vehicle on the Glenn Highway at Eklutna Flats.

This happened around midnight of Saturday February 14th. Needels said that he left the car and went to try to get a wrecker to pull it out. When he returned about 3:00pm, he discovered that all of the windows, with the exception of the windshield had been broken out, the trunk lid had been jimmied with a crowbar, and the interior of the car damaged.

It also appeared that the vandals had attempted to set fire to the vehicle by stuffing rag into the carburetor and lighting them and also by setting fire to a blanket in the car.

Needels said that fortunately in both cases the fires had

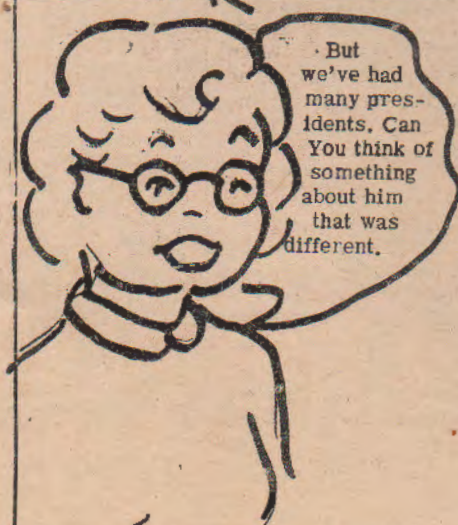

THE COMMUNITY QUESTION BOX

QUESTION: Can you tell me if there is a charge to use the local ambulance? And if so how much?

ANSWER: There is no charge to the individual. The two local ambulances are operated respectively by the Chugiak and the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Companies which in turn are supported by your taxes.

If you should be in need of an ambulance, do not hesitate to call the ambulance which serves the area in which you live. Both ambulances have dispatchers on 24 hour call, and if one is not available, the other will be sent under a mutual aid agreement.

People living in the Peters Creek, Old Chugiak, Fire Lake or Birchwood areas should call the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, at 688-2555. Those living in the Eagle River Area should call the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company, at 694-2595.

REGISTRATION DAY - FEB. 24

CHUGIAK: Voters in the precincts of the Greater Chugiak Area will have the opportunity to pre-register on Tuesday, February 24th, which has been designated as State Registration day.

Registration will be done between the hours of 8:00am and 8:00pm on that day.

Persons living in the Eagle River Valley and Eagle River voting precincts will register at the Eagle River Elementary School. Those living in the Birchwood, Chugiak and Peters Creek precincts will register at the Chugiak Elementary School.

Pre-registration was voted into law at the last general election, and anyone wishing to vote in the August primary election will be required to be pre-registered no less than 14 days prior to that election.

This registration will be permanent, and registered voters will need only to transfer their registration if the move from one precinct to another. However, it was pointed out that if a voter does not vote at least every four years, their registration will expire.

It was also pointed out that anyone who pre-registered at either the last primary or general election does not have to register again. They should have been mailed their blue registration cards.

LOCAL DOGS DO WELL AT ANCHORAGE SHOW

ANCHORAGE: Local obedience trained dogs and their handlers made a good showing at the Obedience Trial held at the Central Junior High School in Anchorage last Sunday, February 15th.

Sixty three dogs were entered in this trial, which was judged by Carl Spitz Sr, of Hollywood California, well known judge and trainer for Walt Disney studios.

Highest scoring dog in the trial was "Mike" a Standard Poodle owned by Laura Cad-

den. Mike scored 198 points out of a possible 200.

In Novice A class, highest scoring dog was "Ter-y", a German Shepard, owned by Bill Glafke, of Eagle River, with 196 points. In 4th place another locally owned dog, "Vic", a German Shepard owned by Archie Hutchison with 194 points.

In Novice B class, the highest scoring dog was "Mike", the Standard Poodle owned by Laura Cadden with 198 points. 2nd, was "Kelly", a German Shepard owned by Marilyn Crete, with 192 points, and 3rd was "Suzie", a miniature Poodle owned by Eddy Burg, of Birchwood.

CHAMBER BOARD MEETS WITH TAX MEN

OLD CHUGIAK: A special meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce was held on Thursday, February 12th, at the office of Great Land Realty in Old Chugiak.

Meeting with the Board was Glenn McKee, Borough Tax Assessor, Larry Norene, Borough Land Appraiser, Jack Long, Borough Building Appraiser and Ed Willis, Borough President, and Assemblyman from Section 1.

The purpose of this meeting was to learn firsthand the why's and wherefo's of Borough taxation and appraisal policies and how the Greater Chugiak Area fits into the overall picture.

Til Wallace, Chamber of Commerce President, stated that an assessment was explained as "an attempt to arrive at the least erroneous answer to an unanswerable question."

He said that the tax officials went on to say that the tax assessment department of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough handles 40,000 separate tax accounts, and intending to equalize the entire area some inequities will be made.

While they try to appraise property at its full true value they realize that in many cases they may have made a mistake. Anyone who feels that their property has been over appraised is asked to come to the borough office, and in most cases a mutually satisfactory agreement can be arrived at right at the desk.

It was further explained that the property in the Greater Chugiak Area has been under appraised for years, and it is only this year that the Borough appraisers have been able to get around to making the necessary corrections.

Wallace asked that the ap-

preciation of the Chamber Board be expressed to Mr. McKee and his staff for taking the time and effort to come out and explain this.

We will be playing Thursday night against Eielson at 9pm.

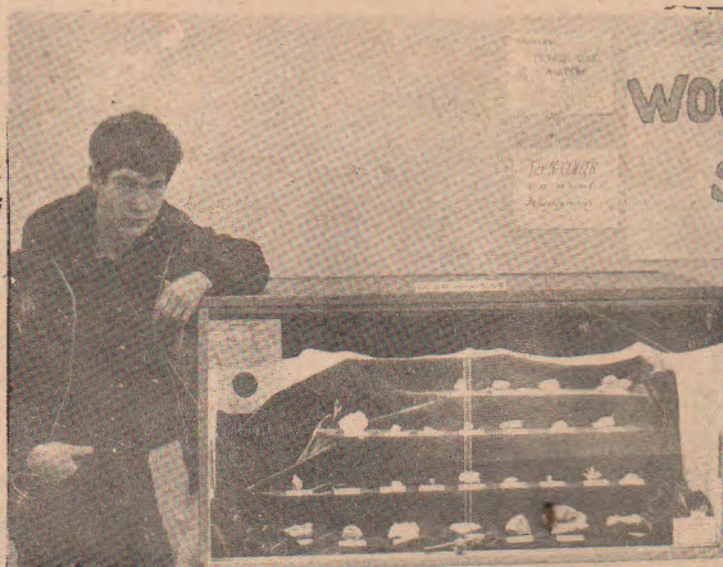
WRESTLING this weekend will be held at Chugiak Saturday night with West.
