EAGLE RIVER: Alaska State Troopers are looking for the driver of a car which left the scene of an accident at approximately 9:30pm last Saturday, January 31st.

The vehicle, which was described by a witness as a 1969 Blue Chevelle, reportedly had backed into the "Book Drop" at the library in the Eagle River Shopping Center, pushing the metal box through the plate glass window. The vehicle then reportedly drove away.

An employee from Carr's Food Center, who had observed the incident attempted to give chase to the car, but was unable to keep up with it.

Chugiak REACT was notified, and they contact REACT members in Palmer and Anchorage, who set up road blocks attempting to intercept the car, but it apparently did not leave the Chugiak Area as neither group saw it come through.

A spokesman for REACT said that the car was further described as having the rear end raised higher than normal, and apparently had two occupants, a young man and a young woman. He further stated that the State Troopers are planning to interview another witness who may know the identity of the driver.

FUNDS ASKED TO HIRE LIFEGUARD

CHUGIAK: Residents of the Greater Chugiak Area are reminded of the request by the Chugiak Ladies Club that they write to the chairmen of the finance committees of the Alaska State legislature requesting approval of funds to hire a lifeguard for Mirror Lake.

Ted Smith, of the Department of Parks and Recreation has stated that these funds had been included in the budget, and had been approved by the Governor. However approval of the legislature is still required. He said that he was sure that letters or wires from Chugiak area residents would be of help in obtaining approval of the appropriation.

Unfortunately the camper had been thrown clear of the truck body and they were able to crawl out of the back window.

She said that she doesn't remember exactly how they got out of the water, but that they must have swam. All four of them were suffering from shock and had numerous cuts and bruises. Later examination revealed that their 13 year old son David had broken both legs, and that Mr. Baranow had a broken hand.

The place where the accident took place was in a very primitive area, with no telephones or electricity. A taxi which happened along the road took them to the closest small village, where the local doc-

tor treated their injuries. They stayed in the village for two days before they hired the taxi to drive them to Guadalajara.

They stayed in that city for two weeks recovering, before they attempted to return to the United States. Mrs. Baranow stated that she is grateful that they decided not to take their youngest son who is a year and a half old with them to Mexico. They had left the baby with her parents in Wisconsin.

The truck, surprisingly did not sustain too much damage, she said, but the camper unit was a total loss. Not only that, but while they were being treated for their injuries, all the contents of the camper had been stolen, including the souvenirs they had purchased prior to the accident.

The Baranows were able to drive their truck back to Alaska, but left the children behind with their grandparents until they arrived here, and then arranged to have the boys fly home.



Neither was it the ambulance from the Eagle River Fire Company.

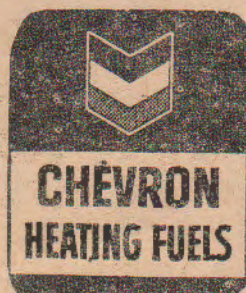
It was suggested that it may have possibly been the Palmer ambulance, which is very similar in appearance to the one from Chugiak.

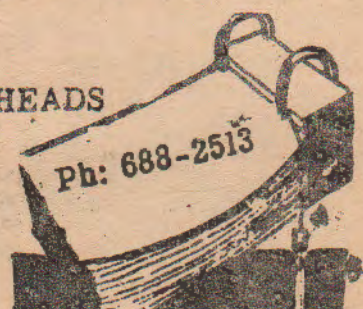

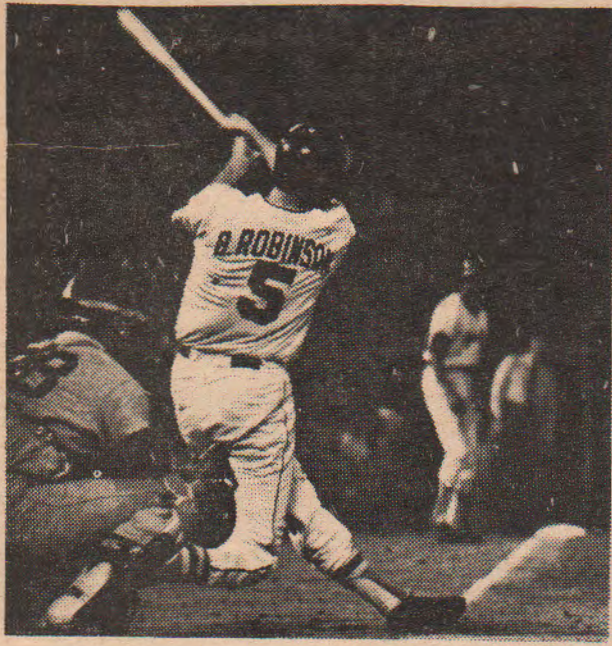

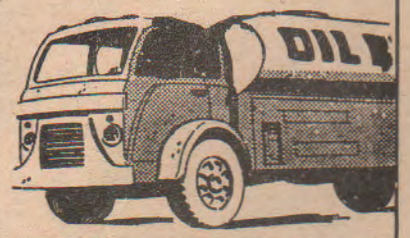
