#### HARROWING EXPERIENCE FOR LOCAL FAMILY

EAGLE RIVER: An Eagle River family, driving through Mexico last month, underwent a harrowing experience which turned their leisurely vacation into a nightmare.

Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Baranow and two of their sons were driving down a narrow road along the beach near Guadalajara, when a truck loaded with tobacco coilided with their pickup-camper.

Their pickup rolled over the hank and landed upside down in a tidal pool alongside the road.

Mrs. Baranow, said that she remembers being unable to get the car doors open because of the water pressure, but for-

She said that she doesn't remember exactly how they got out of the water, but that they must have swam. All four of them were suffering from shock and had numerous cuts and bruises. Later examination revealed that their 13 year old son David had brok-en both legs, and that Mr. Baranow had a broken hand.

The place where the accident took place was in a very primitive area, with no telphones or electricity. A taxi which happened along the road took them to the closest small village, where the local doctor treated their injuries. They stayed in the village for two days before they hired the taxi to drive them to Guadalajara.

They stayed in that city for two weeks recovering, before they attempted to return to the United States. Mrs. Bar-anow stated that she is gr teful that they decided not to take their youngest son who is a year and a half old with them to Mexico. They had left the baby with her parents in Wisconson.

The truck, surprisingly did not sustain too much damage, she said, but the camper unit was a total loss. Not only that, but while they were being treated for their injuries, all the contents of the camper had been stolen, including the souvenirs they had purchased prior to the accident.

The Baranow's were able to drive their truck back to Al-aska, but left the children be-hind with their grandparents until they ar ived here, and then arranged to have the boys fly home.






