LOCAL HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENTS CALLED FOR

CHUGIAK: The Alaska Department of Highways have scheduled a number of improvements for both the new and old Glenn Highways, according to Jack Spake, Construction Engineer.

Overhead lighting for all intersections of the new highway and the connector roads are scheduled for this spring.

This includes the repocing of the temporary lights at the Artillery Road intersection with a battery of 26 lights, and the placing of lights at both the North and South Birchwood Loop Roads, the Birchwood School connector road, and the Powder Magazine Road. Also scheduled for this summer is the widening and surfacing of the Powder Magazine Road connector at Mile 15 1/2.

Spake also stated that pending the appropriation of funds, the Highway Department has scheduled the improvement of the Old Glenn Highway be-

SERVICES FOR MAX LATIMER

PETERS CREEK: Funeral Services will be held today, Wednesday, March 4th, at 7:30pm, for Max Russell Latimer, of Birchwood, who died sometime last Sunday of a self inflicted gunshot wound.

Latimer's body was discovered at approximately 2:30 Sunday afternoon in his car, which had been parked in the yard of the Peters Creek Service Station. No one at the service station remembered when the car had arrived, as a number of vehicles are always parked there awaiting repairs. Latimer had been shot in the head. A pistol and a note was found near the body.

Services are to be held at the Green Funeral Chapel at 819, W 7th Avenue in Anchorage. Mr. Bernard Miller, of the Chuglak Branch of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints will conduct the Service. The Latimer family has asked that memorials be made to the Chuglak LDS Church.

GRAND JURY INDICTS CARR'S EMPLOYEE

ANCHORAGE: A Grand Jury last week issued a secret indictment against Thomas J. Cloonan, of 1310 E Street, Anchorage, for the embezzlement of \$7,4000 from Carr's Food Center in Eagle River.

Cloonan, who had been employed by Carr's as night manager had reported that he had been held up by two masked armed men on Saturday, February 7th, as he was putting away the day's receipts in the store safe.

This was after closing hours and Cloonan was alone in the store at the time. He had reported that the men had forced him into a back office of the store, and after removing all of the cash from the safe, had fled through the front door of the store.

A spokesman for the Alaska State Troopers stated that Cloonan was arrested after an unidentified third party found \$6,900 in cash hidden in the area near Cloonan's

CHUGIAK: A major school expansion program is slated for the Greater Chuglak Area with two schools to be enlarged and a third to be completely replaced.

Plans were approved last Monday night by the GAAB Assembly, and construction is slated to begin sometime this summer.

Additional classrooms are to be added to the Eagle River Elementary School. The addition, which will contain six new classrooms is scheduled for completion by October 1st, 1970.

Chuglak High School will see a number of drastic changes as the second phase of three phase program begins.

The plans call for the conversion of the wood shop into an arts and crafts room, the present library will be divided into two classrooms and gymnasium enlarged with the addition of exercise room and more physical education facilities. Also, a new classroom complex will be built onto the school which will include a choral section and a Instructional Materials Center.

The Chuglak Elementary School is scheduled to be replaced completely by a new school building to be constructed in the area between the two existing ones.

This will be a 12 classroom structure built along the new open team teaching design. The building will be completed with multi-purpose room and Instructional Materials Center.

Of the two existing buildings older wooden structure will probably be torn down. The newer building will be utilized possibly for kindergarten and special education classes.

Completion date for the Chuglak Elementary School is by late Spring of 1971. The addition to Chuglak High is scheduled for completion by January of 1971.

SECURITY PATROL TO SERVE LOCAL AREA

CHUGIAK: Businessmen and householders of the Greater Chuglak Area are now being offered protection from vandals and trespassers by the newly organized Chuglak Security Patrol, it was announced this week.

This organization, patterned after the Merchant Patrols of Anchorage and other cities will be manned by uniformed, armed patrolmen, who will patrol the property of subscribers, and will be authorized to make arrests and hold trespassers for the Alaska State Troopers.

Bill Ross, of Anchorage, who along with Dick Smerdon of Eagle River have organized the patrol, explained that they are licensed by the State of Alaska, and will be working in cooperation with the Alaska State Troopers.

They will offer 12 hour patrol during the night hours when businesses are closed, and will also come to the assistance of their subscribers during the hours of the day if their services are needed to arrest a vandal or shop-lifter and hold them for the State Troopers.

Initially the two men will both act as patrolmen, but they plan to hire others as the need arises.

In addition to offering their services to business establishments, they will be available to check on private homes when the owners are away on vacation.

Another service offered by the Chuglak Security Patrol will be the installation for a fee, of burglar and fire detection equipment.

RAFFLE TO BENEFIT BABE RUTH PARK

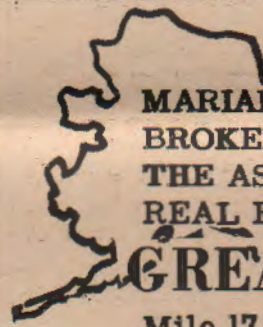

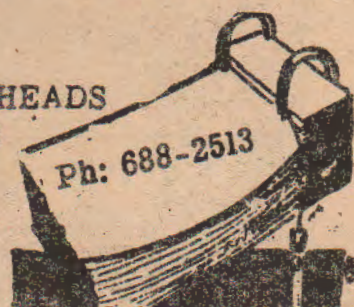

Locally they will be available at the Public Library in the Eagle River Shopping Center.

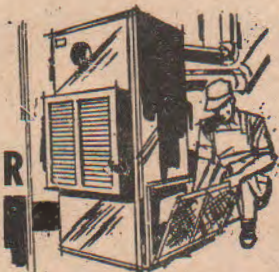
Theme for the show this year is "Wildlife of Alaska." A special award is offered to the painting which best depicts interpretation of this theme.

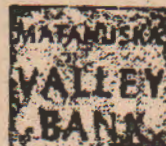

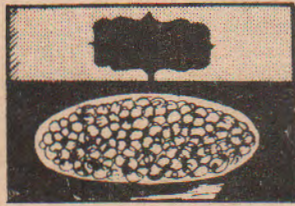

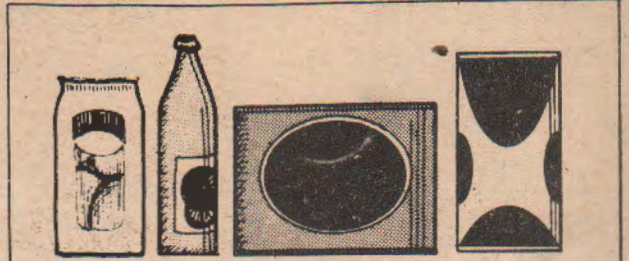
