

MERCHANDISE STOLEN FROM STORE FOUND

WILLIS TO ATTEND UNIFICATION INSTITUTE

ANCHORAGE: Ed Willis, Assemblyman from Section 1, and President of the GAAB Assembly, will be attending the New County Institute on City-County Consolidation at Nashville Tenn. on April 1st, 2nd and 3rd.

This is sponsored by the National Association of Counties and Metropolitan Government of Nashville-Davidson County.

Willis said that he was not going at the expense of the Borough. The cost of his trip was being met by himself and a group of private contributors.

Willis said that up to 6 members of the Anchorage Charter Commission would be attending this meeting at public expense. He said that he and other individuals decided that a member of the Borough Assembly should attend after the Assembly declined to send an official representative.

Willis pointed out that the Nashville-Davidson area has been operating as a unified form of government since 1962. He feels that in that time they will have encountered most of the problems that a similar entity (such as the proposed Anchorage Metropolis) would be likely to experience.

Willis, who has been a long time opponent of Unification said that he felt it would be a good idea to have someone at the meeting who could report some of the negative aspects of unification that are likely to be brought to light.

Willis plans to make a full report on what he learns at the meeting upon his return.

FIRE DESTROYS STORAGE SHED

EAGLE RIVER: Spontaneous combustion was named as the cause of a fire which completely destroyed a storage building at mile 14 1/2 on the Old Glenn Highway last Wednesday night.

The building was the property of Mrs. Walter Pippel, and had been standing unused for the past several years.

According to Eagle River Fire Chief, Tom Take, a quantity of old fertilizer and lime which was stored in the building had become wet and had generated sufficient heat to start the fire. Take said that the chemicals were at least 11 years old.

The fire was reported at 12:20pm. By the time the equipment responded the blaze was out of control. Take said that while the exterior of the building was sheet metal, the walls were insulated with about one foot of sawdust, and

1972 DATE SET FOR NEW HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

PETERS CREEK: Construction of the extension of the Glenn Highway from Mile 21 1/2 to the Eklutna flats is not scheduled to begin until some time in 1972, according to Mr. Charles Matlock of the Anchorage District of the Department of Highways.

Matlock stated that preliminary design of the extension has been made, but that a public hearing to discuss this design will be held before any further plans will be made.

He said that this hearing would not take place until late in 1970 or early in 1971.

He stated that this summer there would be work at resurfacing of the highway near Eklutna where the proposed extension will join the existing road.

Matlock stated that he would have a drawing of the proposed route made up for publication, so that Chuglak Area residents could get an idea of where the road would be going.

The original inics announced by Mercy Crusade could not be supported by the Health Department as they were not supervised by Licensed Veterinarians and appeared to be

in violation of the Veterinarian practice act.

The clinics will now be held from 7:00pm to 9:00pm, or as late as necessary, and vaccines will be administered by licensed veterinarians. Thus vaccinations received will be legal for interstate transportation, borough licensing etc.

The clinic for residents of the Greater Chugiak Area will be held on May 2, 1970 at the Eagle River Fire Station on Cornado Road.

The Department urges all persons owning unvaccinated dogs or cats to use the clinic.

The Department is seriously concerned over the present low level of rabies immunizations in the community's dog and cat population. If there should be an exposure of rabies in the community, it would be virtually impossible to stop the disease from spreading.

With the concerted efforts of the Veterinary Association, Mercy Crusade and the SPCA there will now be clinics available to all pets. All pet owners are urged to take advantage of these clinics.

The public is asked to make donations at the clinics to defer the cost of the vaccine.

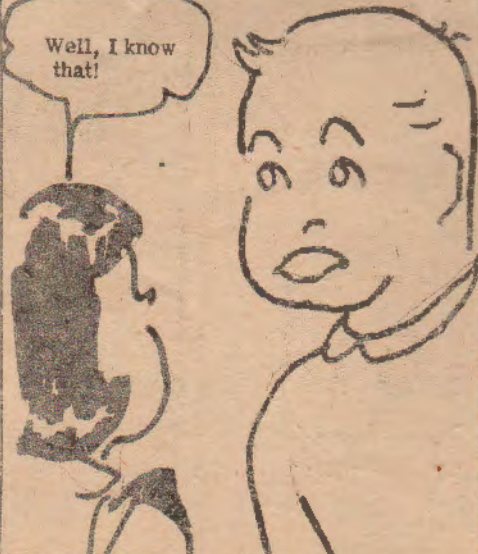

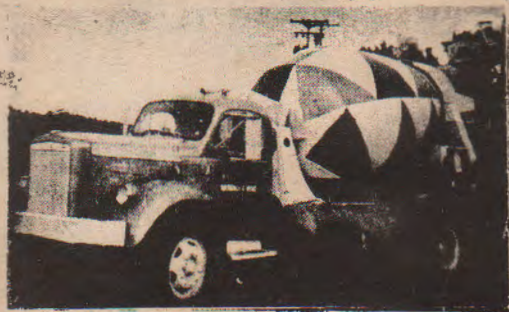

Local people interested in becoming members of this Co-op are asked to voice their opinions by answering the five following questions:

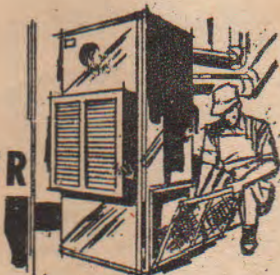
1. "Would you invest \$5.00 in a co-op?"

### RICHARD BURG OUT OF HOSPITAL

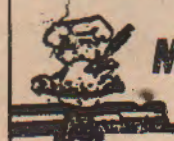
