CARR'S TO SPONSOR LITTLE LEAGUE TEAM

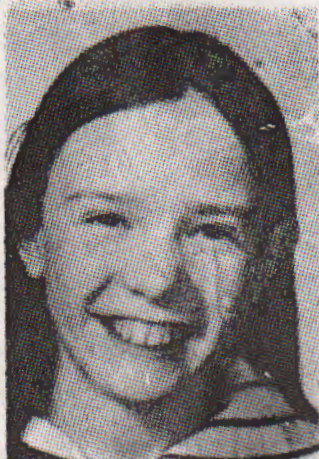

LOCAL SPELLING CHAMPS NAMED

CHUGIAK: Spelling champs from the three Elementary Schools in the Greater Chuglak Area were named this week.

To represent their respective schools in the State Championship to be held soon in Anchorage will be, Debbie Kerr, for the Chugiak Elementary School, Catherine Lane, from the Birchwood Elementary School, and Ricky Peoples, from the Eagle River Elementary School. All three are sixth graders.

Both Debbie and Cathy were the champions from their schools last year. Debbie's father, Mr. Paul Kerr, and Cathy's father, Mr. Wendell Lane are both teachers at the Chugiak Elementary School.

There will be no champion speller representing Chuglak Junior High this year. The Anchorage Times, who sponsor the contest ran out of the spelling booklets, and the administration did not think it would be fair to expect a student to enter the contest without an equal opportunity to prepare.

CHS BAND AND CHOIR TO HOLD SPRING CONCERT

BIRCHWOOD: The Chugiak High Music Department will present the Spring Concert on Friday, April 17th, at 8:00pm in the school gym.

Admission is \$1.50 for adults, 75¢ for students grades 7 through 12, and 75¢ for children.

In the past custom has been to give two free concerts during the year; in the fall and at Christmas. Admission is being charged for the Spring Concert to defray music department expenses.

Also a first for the music department is the offering of recordings of the best performances of the year of the band and choir. These are 12 inch LP records with 22 minutes of music on each side. They sell for \$4.00 apiece and may be purchased from any band or choral student or at the evening of the concert.

During the concert, members of the FHA (Future Homemakers of America Club) will be babysitting at 50¢ per child.

ANCHORAGE: Last Monday night the Borough Assembly voted unanimously to reject a proposal to turn the ambulance service within the Borough to a private concern.

The eight members of the Assembly who were present at the meeting all voted to give no further consideration to the proposal.

The possibility of the proposal being accepted had caused considerable concern, particularly among the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area.

The present arrangement contracts ambulance service to both the local Volunteer Fire Companies. This not only provides added revenue to the Fire Service Districts, but offers ambulance service to local residents at no charge to the individual.

The private firm who had submitted the proposal to the Borough would have charged \$25.00 for each ambulance call, plus \$1.00 per mile for the distance traveled.


LOCAL VOTERS APPROVE FIRE TRUCK

EAGLE RIVER: Voters assured a new fire truck for the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company with a resounding vote of 142 yes to 29 no.

Votes cast in the Eagle River precinct numbered 88, while 91 went to the polls in the Eagle River Valley precinct.

The new method of voting on special computer cards which were then taken to Anchorage to be processed by the school district computer proved to be highly successful.

Local Assemblyman Ed Willis was very enthusiastic in his praise of this method. The long hours of counting votes will be thing of the past, he predicted. He felt that not only would the Borough adopt this method for all their elections, but he felt sure that the State would also use the cards for the General Election.

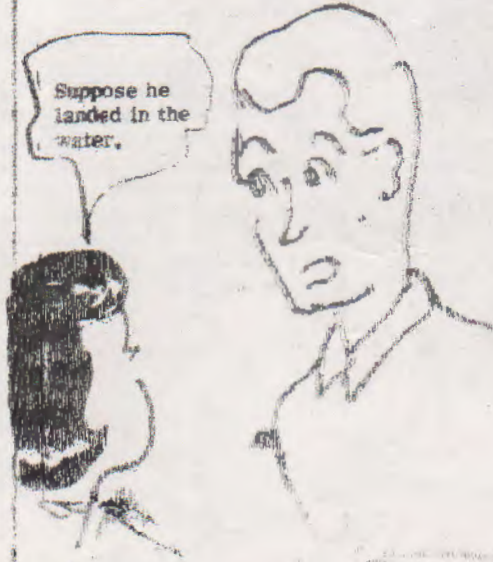

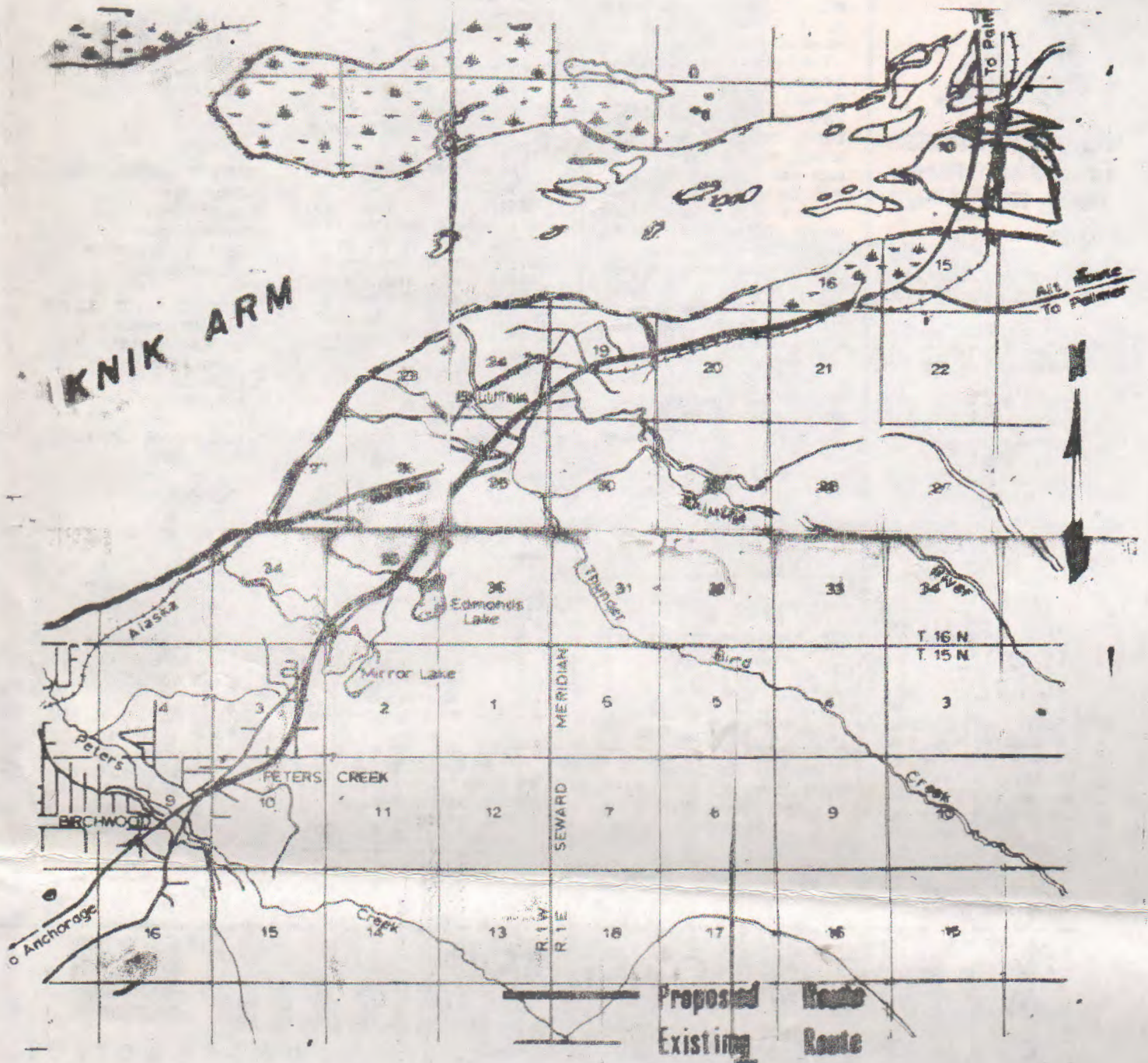

PETERS CREEK: The approximate route for the proposed reconstruction of the Glenn Highway between Pet-

er Creek, and the Ekiutna Flats is shown in the accompanying drawing.

The highway is planned to be the same in width and surfacing as the recently completed portion north from Eagle River.

At present the Department

of Highways is working on frontage roads and approaches to serve the area adjacent to the highway.

This project is scheduled to go to contract sometime in 1972. Before final plans are prepared, a public hearing will be held, probably in Chuglak. After the hearing, a report will be prepared which will include analysis of comment made at the hearing. This report will be submitted to the Federal Highway Administration, along with a request for Federal Aid funds.

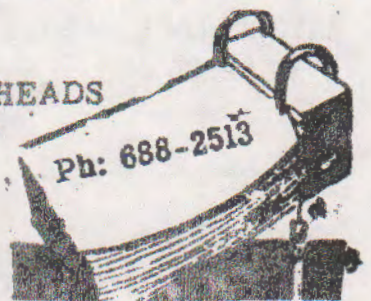

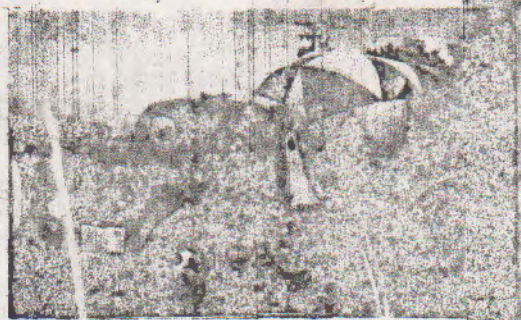

Injured was Mrs. Evelyn Morris of Birchwood. Mrs. Morris had opened the oven to put in some bread when the accident occurred.

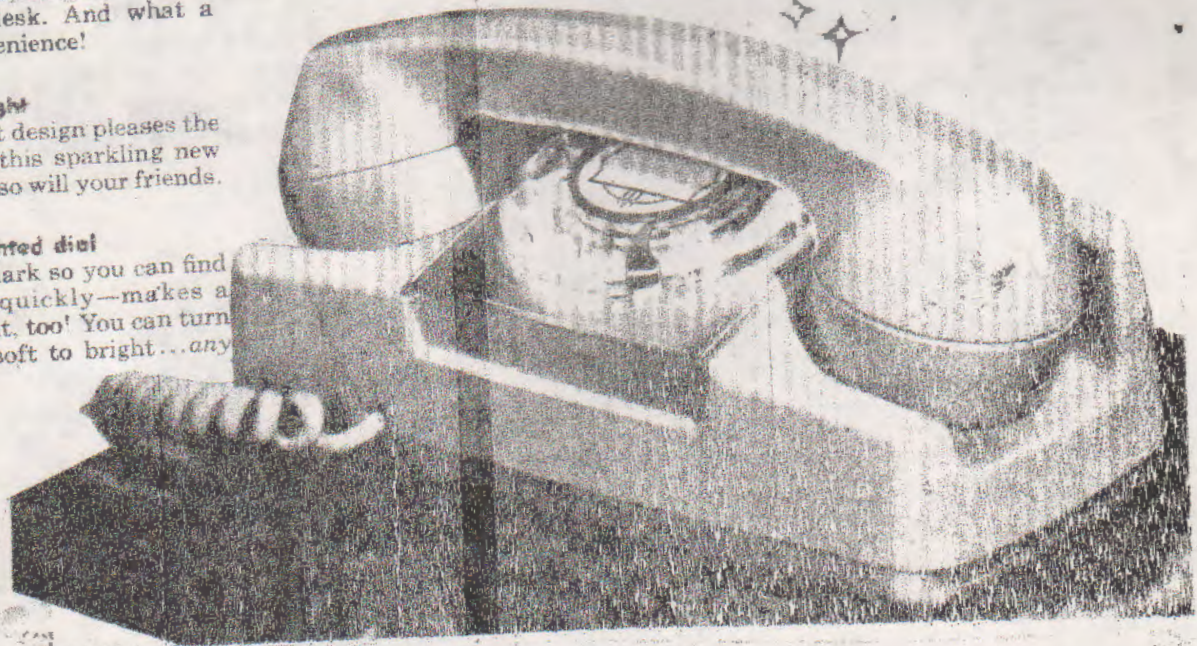

LOCAL RESIDENTS TO GO TO WHITEHORSE

CHUGIAK: Twenty Five local residents will be joining more than 600 persons converging upon Whitehorses, Yukon Territory this weekend to attend the circuit convention of Jehovah's Witnesses.

According to W.C. Bower, who heads the Chugiak group, two DC-6 aircraft have been chartered to take persons from the Anchorage area, while several private planes and a number of cars will be carrying other delegates from Fairbanks, Kodiak, Bethel, Palmer, Kenai and other localities.

P.G. Ronco, Branch Manager for the Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society for Alaska and the Yukon, will deliver the keynote address Friday evening. He will emphasize the convention theme, "Sacrifices That Please God." Informal skits by various congregations from around the state will be presented Friday and Saturday evenings," Bower said. "A Baptismal service will be conducted Saturday morning. Delegates will also hear instructive talks by a slate of speakers."

Mr. Ronco will address a large audience Sunday afternoon at three when he delivers the convention's principal talk, entitled "Withstanding the Pressures of Our Day."

Requests for accommodations at Whitehorses have already been received from nearly 600 persons. The convention coordinator, Mr. Sid Drebbitt, of Whitehorse, expects this to be the largest convention ever held in that area.
