EAGLE RIVER: There will be a special election on Tuesday, April 14th, for all residents of the Service District served by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company.

This service district is located in Precincts 147 and 148, which are the Eagle River and the Eagle River Valley voting precincts.

The purpose of the election is to ask the voters to authorize the lease-purchase of a new fire truck for the Fire Company.

This would be to replace the main pumper which was damaged in a collision with a car while responding to a fire call last winter.

The new truck would be a fully equipped pumper. The amount of funds asked in the election is \$30,000. This would be budgeted over a five year period. Fire Company officials do not anticipate any increase in the service district taxes to cover this. Insurance collected from the wrecked truck would also be used toward acquiring the equipment.

Polling place for both precincts will be the Eagle River Elementary School. Polls open at 7:00am and close at 8:00pm. Any qualified voters are eligible to vote in this election.

Voters at this election will have the opportunity to use a new type of ballot which the borough is trying out. This is a printed card, similar to the IBM Cards. Instead of marking the ballot with pencil, the voter punches out a perforation on the card. When the polls close all ballots will be taken to the School District Headquarters at 670 Fireweed Lane, where they will be counted by computer.

The Borough plans to use this type of ballot at all future elections.

NEW AMBULANCE SERVICE FOR BOROUGH LOOMS

ANCHORAGE: A proposal to contract for ambulance service within the Greater Anchorage Area Borough was presented to the Assembly last Monday night.

The proposal was made by Richard F. Angotti, who for the past fifteen years has provided a similar ambulance service in the San Francisco area.

Mr. Angotti proposes to provide three fully equipped ambulances on a 24 hour basis. For this the borough would pay him \$200,000 per year. In addition to this, there would be a charge to anyone using the services of these ambulances of \$25.00 plus \$1.00 per mile (one way). A rebate of 80% of fees collected would be returned to the borough.

At present the borough contracts ambulance service with the Anchorage Fire Department, and with the Chugiak and Eagle River Volunteer Fire Companies.

The Borough pays the local fire companies \$1,5000 per year for this ambulance service.

EAGLE RIVER MAN ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance responded to a call late Sunday afternoon to the Schroeder subdivision where they found a man suffering from a self inflicted gun-shot wound.

According to a spokesman for the Fire Company, the victim, Gary Lee Gullard, age 27 had apparently placed the barrel of 2.44 magnum pistol in his mouth and pulled the trigger.

He was taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital, where he was last listed in serious condition.

Gullard is married and has several children. He is the brother of James Gullard who was the driver of one of the cars involved in the accident last month in which four teen-agers were killed. He was also reportedly the step-father of Michael Smith one of the youths injured in that accident.

The Alaska State Troopers reported that they did not know any motive the the apparent suicide.

RED BARN NOW HOME OF PRE-FAB HOME PLANT

EAGLE RIVER: The Red Barn which closed its doors as a Country Western night club last month, is now the location of the first large scale manufacturing firm in the Greater Chugliak Area.

Northland Homes Inc., manufactures pre-fab package homes which are built in pre-assembled panels and can be erected on a foundation in a week's time, according to Bob Cole who is supervisor of the plant.

Cole, who is a resident of the Eagle River area has many years experience in the building trade and in making pre-fab homes.

Cole said at present that they are offering only one floor plan, but expect to have as many as 20 to choose from.

The design now available is a 26x40 one story home with 3 bedrooms. The package includes a built in kitchen range baseboard heating system and

furnace.

They are presently completing two model homes on the location, and when they are finished, they will be open to inspection by the public.

Although they have been in business for less than a month, Cole said that they already have customers for several of the homes.

He said that at present the only thing holding them back is getting materials. He said that when they get going full swing they expect to employ as many as 40 people.

LOCAL CHAMBER TO PUSH FOR HIGHWAY SAFETY

EAGLE RIVER: The Board of Directors of the local Chamber of Commerce met last Friday evening at the Big Country Kitchen in Eagle River.

The Board agreed that a number of unsafe conditions exist at the intersections along the new Glenn Highway, and are writing to the Department of Highways asking that these be corrected.

The Chamber is presently conducting a campaign to encourage local residents to select names for such streets or roads within the Greater Chugliak Area that are not already named, and to put up street signs at the ends of these streets. The Chamber will provide at cost wooden or metal blanks all ready to be stenciled with the names of the streets and fastened to posts. As soon as these are available the public will be advised where they can be picked up.

It was brought up that the Borough will be setting up zoning restrictions in the Greater Chugliak Area as it has been doing in other rural areas of the Borough. The Chamber feels that the local residents should look into this and decide the type of zoning they want for this area before the borough imposes them. A study of this matter is plan-

ned.

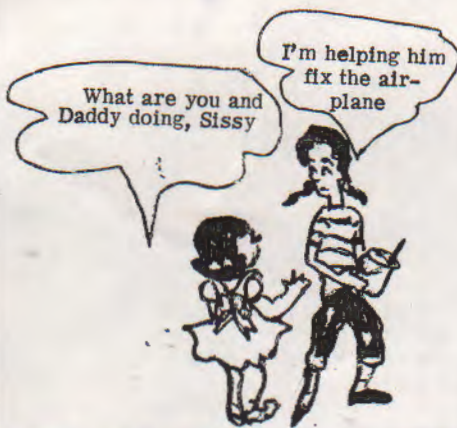

ment residents of the Greater Chugiak Area have two fully equipped ambulances standing by on a 24 hour basis. Both are manned by trained crews. There is no charge to the individual for the use of either ambulance, the cost being covered by taxes through the Borough Health Department.

Both local Fire Companies depend upon the revenue of the ambulance contracts to keep the costs of supplying fire protection to the local service districts at a minimum.

The Borough Assembly voted 9 to 3 in favor of further study of Mr. Angotti's proposal. Ed Willis, Assemblyman from Section 1, (which primarily includes the Greater Chugiak Area) was one of those who voted against giving the proposition further consideration.

SUMMER CLASSES OFFERED AT CHUGIAK HIGH

BIRCHWOOD: A program of summer school classes for the period from June 15 through July 24 is being planned for Chugiak High School.

Most courses are scheduled for a 3 hour period of class time and most will be held in the morning.

Fees for in-district students are \$10 per student. Only one subject may be taken for credit (1/2 credit) and Driver Education will be good for 1/4 credit.

A minimum of 10 students are required before a teacher is assigned.

Questionnaires by which prospective students can indicate the courses they are interested in and the order of their preference are available at the school office.

It was stressed that it is necessary to have these filled out by Friday, April 10th, so that the administration can have an idea of where the most interest lies.

A total of 22 individual courses, from Elementary Typing through Aeronautics are offered.

CHS BAND AND CHOIR TO HOLD SPRING CONCERT

BIRCHWOOD: The Chugiak High Music Department will present the Spring Concert on Friday, April 17th, at 8:00pm in the school gym.

Admission is \$1.50 for adults, 75¢ for students grades 7 through 12, and 75¢ for children.

In the past custom has been to give two free concerts during the year; in the fall and at Christmas. Admission is being charged for the Spring Concert to defray music department expenses.

Also a first for the music department is the offering of recordings of the best performances of the year of the band and choir. These are 12 inch LP records with 22 minutes of music on each side. They sell for \$4.00 apiece and may be purchased from any band or choral student or at the evening of the concert.

RODEO ASSOC. PLANS BIG SUMMER HERE

OLD CHUGIAK: The Alaska Cowboy Rodeo Association is making plans for summer events to be held at the Chugiak Rodeo Arena, located at the Chugiak Carnival Grounds.

The Association has purchased 10 head of bucking horses from Wyoming. These should arrive in Alaska by April 15th, and will be boarded at the Len Milton farm at Wasilla. In addition to using them at the Chugiak grounds, the Association plans to lease them to other sanctioned rodeos throughout the state.

The first event of the season will be on May 19th. This will be a more or less practice session, where new stock, new announcers and new events will be tried out. The public is welcome to drop by and watch.

The first main rodeo will be a three day event, held over Memorial Day, May 29th, 30th and 31st.

Plans are to donate the receipts from the first day's gate to charity.

The Association plans to hold at least 6 events during the summer at the local arena, with one over July 4th definite.

They also plan to hold dances at the Chugiak Carnival Hall each Saturday night that there is a rodeo.

Planned events will include saddle bronc riding, bareback riding, bull riding, team tying, calf roping, women's barrel racing and many added attractions.

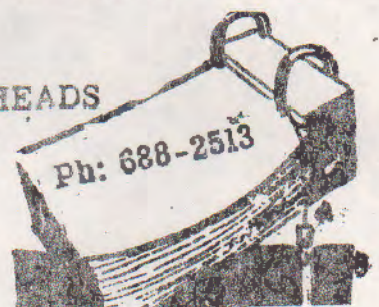

OPEN LETTER:

As many of you are aware, on April 14, a Special Election will be held in the Eagle River area to vote on a most important issue.

The exact proposition is, **PROPOSITION G:** Shall the Greater Anchorage Area Borough on behalf of the Eagle River Service Area enter into lease purchase agreements for the acquisition of one fully equipped pumper fire truck, such authorization to be in the amount of \$30,000.

Early in 1970, the most reliable pumper operated by the Eagle River Fire Company was totally destroyed in an unfortunate accident. We must now replace the 1951 duplex. The choice is to be made is whether to apply the approximately \$10,000 that is due from the insurance company towards the purchase of a new apparatus or attempt to repair a 19 year old fire truck. It has been investigated and it would appear that a lease purchase arrangement would be the most practical method of acquiring new equipment.

Our Service Area can ill afford to tax itself in one year for the approximately \$20,000

would involve high interest rates and in the long run we would pay an additional several thousand dollars that are not needed under a lease purchase arrangement.

This year two more teams will be added to the local league, providing 2 managers and 2 coaches can be recruited.

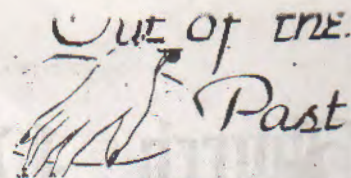
The First National Bank of Anchorage will sponsor one of these teams. The sponsor of the second team is not yet definite.
