NEW AMBULANCE SERVICE FOR BOROUGH LOOMS

ANCHORAGE: A proposal to contract for ambulance service within the Greater Anchorage Area Borough was presented to the Assembly last Monday night.

Monday night. The proposal was made by Richard F. Angotti, who for the past fifteen years has provided a similar ambulance service in the San Francisco area.

Mr. Angottl proposes to provide three fully equipped ambulances on a 24 hour basis. For this the borough would pay him \$200,000 per year. In addition to this, there would be a charge to anyone using the services of these ambulances of \$25.00 plus \$1.00 per mile (one way). A rebate of 80% of fees collected would be returned to the borough.

At present the borough contracts ambulance service with the Anchorage Fire Department, and with the Chugiak and Eagle River Volunteer Fire Companies.

Companies. The Borough pays the local fire companies \$1,5000 per year for this ambulance service.

EAGLE RIVER MAN ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance responded to a call late Sunday afternoon to the Schroeder subdivision where they found a man suffering from a self inflicted gun-shot wound.

According to a spokesman for the Fire Company, the victim, Gary Lee Gullard, age 27 had apparently placed the barrel of 2 .44 magnum pistol in his mouth and pulled the trigger. He was taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital, where he was last listed in serious condition.

Gullard is married and has several children. He is the brother of James Gullar who was the driver of one of the cars involved in the accident last month in which four teen-agers were killed. He was also reportedly the stepfather of Michael Smith one of the youths injured in that accident.

The Alaska State Troopers reported that they did not know any motive the the apparent suicide.

EAGLE RIVER: There will be a special election on Tuesday, April 14th, for all residents of the Service District served by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company.

Fire Company. This service district is located in Precincts 147 and 148, which are the Eagle River and the Eagle River Valley voting precincts.

The purpose of the election is to ask the voters to authorize the lease-purchase of a new fire truck for the Fire Company.

This would be to replace the main pumper which was damaged in a collision with a car while responding to a fire call last winter. The new truck would be a

The new truck would be a fully equipped pumper. The amount of funds asked in the election is \$30,000. This would be budgeted over a five year period. Fire Company officials do not anticipate any increase in the service district taxes to cover this. Insurance collected from the wrecked truck would also be used toward acquiring the equipment.

Polling place for both precincts will be the Eagle River Elementary School, Polls open at 7:00am and close at 8:00pm. Any qualified voters are eligible to vote in this election.

Voters at this election will have the opportunity to use a new type of ballot which the borough is trying out. This is a printed card, similar to the IBM Cards. Instead of marking the ballot with pencil, the voter punches out a perforation on the card. When the polls close all ballots will be taken to the School District Headquarters at 670 Fireweed Lane, where they will be counted by computer.

The Borough plans to use this type of ballot at all future el-

EAGLE RIVER: The Red Barn which closed its doors as a Country Western night club last month, is now the locat-ion of the first large scale manufacturing firm in the Greater Chugiak Area,

The design now available is a 26x40 one story home with 3 bedrooms. The package includes a built in kitchen range baseboard heating system and

furnace.

They are presently comp-leting two model homes on the location, and when they are finished, they will be op-en to inspection by the public.

Although they have been in business for less than a month, Cole said that they al-ready have customers for several of the homes.

He said that at present the only thing holding them back is getting materials. He said that when they get going full swing they expect to employ as many as 40 people.







OLD CHUCIAK: The Chugiak Benefit Association is plan-ning to install a pump in the well at the Chugiak Carnival Grounds it was announced this week,

The well was drilled ten years ago, but has never had a pump. Recent tests have in-dicated that there is still an adequate water supply in the well.

Water will then be piped down to the Rodeo Arena, and will be available for other Carnival Grounds facilities, such as plumbing for the Carnival Hall, for the Little League ballpark and the proposed Babe Ruth ballpark and for the Family Park and picnic area which the Chugiak Ladies Club is planning to develop this summer.

A spokesman for the Chuglak Benefit Association stat-ed that theCowboy Rodeo Associalton, which leases a pro-tion of the grounds for the Rodeo Arena plans to oil the driveways on the grounds this summer to reduce the dust problem.

OPEN LETTER:

As many of you are aware, on April 14, a Special Election will be held in the Eagle River area to vote on a most important issue.

The exact proposition is, PROPOSITION G: Shall the Greater Anchorage Area Bor ough on behalf of the Eagle River Service Area enter into lease purchase agreements for the aquisition of one fully equipped pumper fire truck, such authorization to be in the

amount of \$30,000. Early in 1970, the most re-liable pumper operated by the Eagle River Fire Company was totally destroyed in an unfurtunate accident. We must now replace the 1951 duplex, The choice is to be made is whether to apply the approx-imately \$10,000 that is due imately from the insurance company towards the purchase of a new apparatus or attempt to repair a 19 year old fire truck. It has been investigated and it would appear that a lease purchase arrangement would be the most practical method of acquiring new equipment.

Our Service Area can ill afford to tax itself in one year for the approximately \$20,000

would involve high interest REGISTRATION rates and in the long run we would pay an additional sev-eral thousand dollars that are not needed under a lease purchase arrangement.

The decision in this matter rests with your vote on April 14th and for your convenience voting in both the Eagle River area and the Eagle River Val-ley precincts will be at the Eagle River Grammer School, I will see you at the polls,
