EAGLE RIVER TO GET SEWERS



WRECKED PICK-UP TRUCK....SECOND VEHICLE WITHIN A WEEK TO FALL VICTIM TO ROAD HAZARD.

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Borough Assembly voted unanimously 11 to 0 on Monday night to adopt Ordinance 53-70, which created the Sanitary Sewer Improvement District No. 50.

This District, which includes the area immediately surrounding and including the Eagle River Shopping Center and the Eagle River School, was adopted after a very lengthy public hearing.

This district would not be tied in with any other existing sewer district, but would call for a complete system of laterals, trunks and a treatment plant.

The cost for property owners in the area could be a maximum of .11¢ per square foot of assessable land. However, there is a possibility of a special grant from the State which could bring the levy against the property owners to considerably less.

The ordinance will go into effect after 65 days, during which time objections to the ordinance will be heard. In order to object to this ordinance, a petition signed by more than 50% of the residents who own assessable property within the district must be presented.

MAN HURT WHEN CAR HITS BARRIER

PETERS CREEK: An Oregon man was seriously injured when his pick-up truck crashed into the earthen barrier at the north end of the Old Glenn Highway in Peters Creek last Saturday morning.

Floyd B. Riggs, who gave his local address as 2204 Northern Lights Blvd, apparently failed to see the sign indicating that the road was a dead end, and struck the barrier which the Department of Highways had placed across the road to prevent cars from running into the chain link fence which closed off the road upon the opening of the new highway.

Riggs, age 45, was taken to the Anchorage Community Hospital by a passing car. It was reported that he had climbed the chain link fence to get assistance. He was treated for facial cuts, a broken arm and possible chest injuries.

His 1968 Ford pick-up truck had hurtled completely over the dirt barrier, and sustained major damage.

This is the second accident at this barrier within less than a week. Several days earlier a Niniichik couple were injured when they also failed to see the signs indicating the

THREE CAR SMASH AT MILE 23

PETERS CREEK: Mrs. John Eppler, of Old Chugiak, was taken to the Anchorage Community Hospital by the Chugiak Fire Co. ambulance, following a three car accident which took place Monday evening at Mile 23, Glenn Highway.

Mrs. Eppler, who was driving a 1964 Chevrolet pick-up had stopped in the Northbound lane, and was waiting for traffic to clear so she could turn into the parking lot of the Peters Creek Shopping Center.

A late model Buick, driven by Pat J. Brown, also of Old Chugiak, overtook Mrs. Eppler from the rear and although the driver attempted to miss her car, sideswiped it, pushing it across the road and causing it to hit a Datsun which was coming in the opposite direction.

Mrs. Eppler, was treated at the Community Hospital for whip-lash. Brown was taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital where he was treated for an arm injury. The driver of the Datsun, Jerry D. Cromwell of Wasilla was not injured.

No further information was available, pending investigation by the Alaska State Troopers.

CHUGIAK: Residents of the area served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company have been informed that there will be no burning of brush permitted until there is some rain.

Even if the Department of Health should issue such a permit to an individual, the Fire Company will not approve it.

Fire hazards are worse this spring than they have ever been, it was explained, and until rain relieves the situation no burning will be allowed under any circumstances.

ASSEMBLYMEN BEG FUNDS AT JUNEAU

JUNEAU: Ed Willis, Borough Assemblyman from the Greater Chugiak, area accompanied Chairman John Asplund and other members of the Assembly to Juneau yesterday.

They planned to meet with legislators and Governor Miller to urge the passage of the bill proposed by Representative Gene Guess which would allow the State to purchase the bonds for schools and other improvements, until such a time as the suit by Will Key Jefferson has been resolved and the bonds can be marketed through conventional channels.

The addition to Chugiak High School is among the projects which have been held up because of the suit.

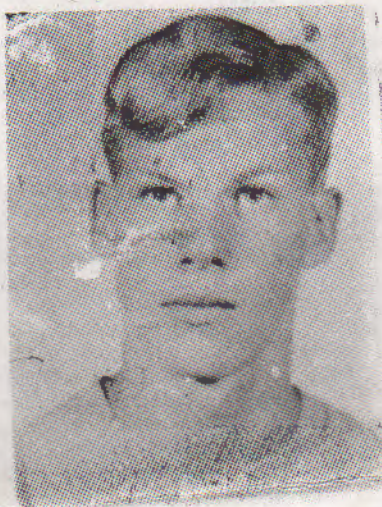
In addition to his athletic accomplishments, he plays trumpet in the Chugiak High School band.

OLD CHUGIAK: PTA movie of the month will be this Friday, May 15th, at the Chugiak Elementary School at 7:30pm.

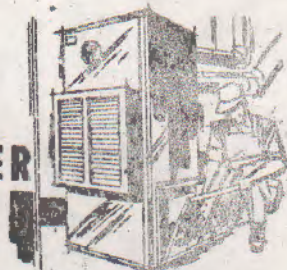
It is suggested that the whole family plan to see this rollicking, way-out comedy about science teacher, his Model Ford, and an amazing new invention that defies gravity.

THE COMMUNITY QUESTION BOX

QUESTION: Is the dump south of Eagle River operated by the borough? If so, how come that we are charged a fee?

ANSWER: The Sanitary Land Fill (dump) is administered by the Chugiak Benefit Association, and leased to a private operator who charges a fee in exchange for maintaining the dump and keeping the refuse covered.

The voters of this area were offered the opportunity to have the dump open free to the public and the maintenance of it supported by their taxes at an election several years ago.

This was turned down, and the only other recourse was to lease it to a private operator.

The Borough did operate the dump for a short period a few years ago, and the sign which they put up did stand for some time after they relinquished responsibility. This sign may have lead some to believe that the dump was still maintained by the Borough.

This sign has since been removed.

The hours at which the dump is open and the days appear in a classified ad elsewhere in this newspaper.
