The inability of the Borough to sell the bonds in time to ac-cept bids for this current construction season is the reason for the setback. The bonds could not be sold because of snit which had been brought against the Borough by Will Key Jefferson.

Klingler stated that the low bid for the addition to Chugiak High School has been with-drawn. He said that it had drawn. The contract must now be rebid, and by the time this is done, it will be too late for this year.

Also down the drain for this year is the replacement for the Chuglak Elementary School, and the addition to Eagle River Elementary School. The Eagle River school ad-

dition was the most critically needed as some of the classes will have to go on double shifts until additional classrooms

can be built.
Klingler said that the school administration has asked for a two week extension on accepting bids on the elementary school in hopes that the legislature will vote to purchase the bonds and make the funds available, however with three weeks of the construction season already gone, he has grave doubts that anything could be completed in time to be used this year.






