



"TOUCH" OFFERED LAND IN EAGLE RIVER

MUSTANGS STATE TRACK CHAMPS

BIRCHWOOD: Chugiak High School came away with its 4th State Championship last weekend, as the track team came up with a beautiful 'come from behind' effort to defeat Palmer and half a dozen other Class A Schools.

After all the field events were over, Palmer led with 56 points -- Chugiak had 52.

Halfway thru the running events, Palmer had widened their margin of victory to 22 points, and things looked grim for the Mustangs. However, with 3 events to go, the score was tied up, and the mighty Mustangs went on to win 190 to 176.

Assistant track coach Don Sanders stated, "We beat Palmer during the early season, and then they turned around and clobbered us. It took a lot of extra effort and training to make a come-back and win that Championship."

Coach Andy Kirk added, "This track team is no better than last year's track team, but after we got licked by Palmer in mid-season the men pulled together and had real team spirit. That's what won it for us -- a real team effort in what is usually a sport for individuals. Co-captains Jon Shipman and George VanDuran deserve a lot of the credit for this team spirit."

VANDALS WRECK BOWLING ALLEY

EAGLE RIVER: Vandals inflicted damage estimated in the thousands to the Eagle River Bowling Alley building this past weekend, according to a spokesman for the Chugiak Security Patrol who investigated the incident.

Dick Smerdon, of the Security Patrol stated that he answered a call from a local resident stating that she had seen two teen-age boys leaving the building early Sunday morning.

Investigation showed that the padlock hasp had been sawed in two and the building entered. Two of the bar stools and numerous other items appeared to have been stolen.

In addition, all of the glass in the windows and showcases had been smashed, and spray paint had been used to write

CHS TEACHER FILES FOR HOUSE

OLD CHUGIAK: A Chugiak High School science teacher announced today that he has filed as a candidate to the Alaska State House of Representatives on the Republican ticket.

Robert C. Kallenberg has been an Alaskan resident since 1926, and has taught school in the Greater Chugiak Area since 1963.

Kallenberg makes his home in the Old Chugiak area of the community. From 1926 until 1963, he lived in the Bristol Bay area. He taught school at Dillingham, and has been a Bristol Bay fisherman from 1927 to the present date.

Kallenberg is presently serving his second term as Chairman of the Board of Supervisors for the Chugiak Fire Service District (an elective office), is a past member of the Alaska Fisheries Board, the

EAGLE RIVER: A number of phone calls have been directed to the Knik Arm Courier during the past week concerning a report that the organization known as TOUCH had acquired a parcel of land in the Eagle River area to be used as a campground for transients.

The Courier contacted Jamie Love, a spokesman for TOUCH, asking for confirmation of this report.

Love admitted that TOUCH had been offered the use of a 40 acre parcel of land in the Eagle River area. When asked who had offered the use of the land, he stated that he was not able to release this information. When asked for the approximate location of the land, he also declined to elaborate. When it was asked why he could not answer these questions, he replied, "No comment."

He did admit that the land was not likely to be used as a campground for transients, as its accessibility was limited mainly to four-wheel drive vehicles.

Tom Farrey, another TOUCH spokesman stated that he felt the land would be used mainly by individuals interested in learning care of land and of animals. He said that they were interested in planting a garden and raise organic crops. He admitted that their livestock at present was limited to one duck, but hoped that other animals would be donated.

Farrey expressed concern that Eagle River residents might oppose this project, and hoped that TOUCH might be able to set up a public meeting where they could explain their plans to area residents.

LOCAL HEAD START APPROVED

CHUGKA: GOAL Council (the local Community Action Agency for the Greater Chugiak Area) has received approval from the Greater Anchorage Area Community Action Agency to run its own Head Start program next year.

In the past GAACAA delegated all Anchorage area Head Start Programs to the Neighborhood Community Child Development Corporation. This coming year GOAL will be the delegate agency to run our local Head Start, contingent upon funds received from OEO in San Francisco.

In April, the Chugiak Head Start Parents Council made a request that GOAL submit a proposal for running the local Head Start to GAACAA.

A committee to write the proposal was named. Serving on this committee were, Donna MacAlpine, Mona Michal, Natalie Brooks, Mary Lee Nicholson and Gene Groves. All five are actively involved in the current Head Start. Mr. Groves and Mrs. Michal are on the Policy Advisory Committee, while Miss Nicholson, Mrs. MacAlpine and Mrs. Brooks are on the Board of Directors of the NCCDC.

It was felt by all concerned that a locally run program would be more effective and would bring forth much more community participation, because local needs are different from Anchorage, and because of the difficulties of distance and communication.

A Head Start program is dependent on many volunteer services and contributions. The needs are varied: classroom help (perhaps sharing a talent or a hobby with the children); consultants for the health and nutrition program; volunteers to lead parent classes and activities; volunteers for work projects such as clearing land and building equipment for a playground; food donated for the lunches (leading to a slogan "Grow a Row for Head Start"); citizens willing to serve on a Head Start Board. There will be some salaried positions available which will be advertised around July 1.

One of the primary differences from past Head Start programs will be lunches cooked at the Center (in the Chugiak United Methodist Church).

This will be a learning experience in nutrition as the children will be able to observe a meal in preparation and occasionally help with the cooking. Because of a limited budget any donated food would be most welcome, any garden surplus in the fall, vegetables that keep well, such as potatoes, fish that an over-enthusiastic fisherman's wife doesn't want, etc. A limited amount of freezer space is available if anyone has something to donate now.

Applications for pre-registration are available at the GOAL Center. The age requirement is that a child be 4 on or before Nov. 1, 1970. The income eligibility differs with the size of the family, but all ADC mothers, foster parents, those enroll in WIN and those with large families and small incomes should inquire at the GOAL Center.

The Chugiak Head Start Parents Council invites all local residents to an Open House on Wednesday, May 27th, at 7:30 at the Chugiak United Methodist Church.

Barbara Goldberg will speak on early childhood education and answer questions. Mrs. Goldberg is a child psychologist, an AMU Faculty member, Director of the Child Development Center in Anchorage, and mother of a 2 year old girl. This is a good chance to learn what preschool education and Head Start is all about.

Anyone with questions about Head Start, Donations, offers of volunteer labor, etc. may call Natalie Brooks, at 688-2743. Mrs. Brooks is President of the Parents Council, and will be temporary coordinator of community participation in the coming program.

If any of the members have any ideas that they wish to have worked out, or arts they'd like to teach, then Mrs. Pelon is the one to contact.

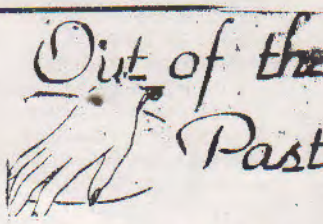
The men are also needed in this field. We need men to share their abilities with others. As all of you have something to offer, let us hear your suggestions.

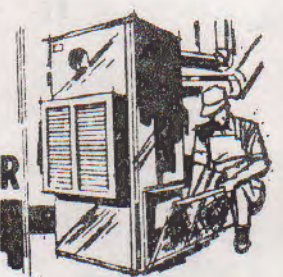


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CHS AWARDS ASSEMBLY

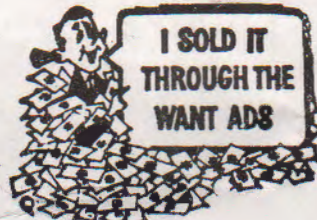
