# DOUBLE SHIFTING SEEN HERE THIS FALL

### CONSTRUCTION ON CONNECTOR ROAD TO START

EAGLE RIVER: Construction on the connector road between the new and old Glenn Highways at mile 15 1/2 is scheduled to start sometime this month, according to Jim Gordon, foreman for M.B. Construction, sub-contractors for Creen Construction Co. on the project,

The connector will join the Old Glenn Highway at the Powder Magazine Road intersection, but will not follow the present road bed. The consector will be in a straight line, and will be located somewhat to the North of the present Powder Magazine Road.

Gordon said that specificat-

Gordon said that specifications called for a black-topped surface and would be similar in design to the existing connectors at Birchwood Loop, and Artillery Road.

The connecor will be 1,100 feet in length, and should be completed within three weeds from the start of construction.

the sum of \$1,500,00 in unappropriated borough school

Since this was such a good bid, the firm was asked to hold the bid open for 30 days.

The Chamber is still trying to get the Department of High-ways to correct what they believe are unsafe situations at the intersections of the New Glenn Highway and connector roads. Another unsafe con-dition which brought to light was the fact that the only way from the Peters Creek area to the rest of Chugiak is over the new bridge, which means that youngsters on foot, bicycles or even horseback would have to travel on the paved highway down the long stretch from the top of Peters Creek hill to the North Birchwood Loop.

For a considerable portion of this stretch, guardrails would prevent them from getting off the road to avoid traf-

fic. With school vacation coming up, the large numbers of Chugiak area youngsters who travel on foot or bicycles to Mirror Lake could create a dangerous condition on this stretch of road. It was sug-gested that this could be remedied by opening a section of the fence at the north end of the Old Glenn Highway which would permit foot or bicycle traffic, but exclude cars. This would permit youngsters to pass from one part of the community to the other along the old road, using the old bridge.

The next regular board meeting will be a luncheon meeting on Friday, May 15th, at a loc-ation to be announced.

A spokseman for the Walk stated that they are sure they will exceed their \$50,000.00 goal.




