



DOUBLE SHIFTING SEEN HERE THIS FALL

CONSTRUCTION ON CONNECTOR ROAD TO START

EAGLE RIVER: Construction on the connector road between the new and old Glenn Highways at mile 15 1/2 is scheduled to start sometime this month, according to Jim Gordon, foreman for M.B. Construction, sub-contractors for Green Construction Co. on the project.

The connector will join the Old Glenn Highway at the Powder Magazine Road intersection, but will not follow the present road bed. The connector will be in a straight line, and will be located somewhat to the North of the present Powder Magazine Road.

Gordon said that specifications called for a black-topped surface and would be similar in design to the existing connectors at Birchwood Loop, and Artillery Road.

The connector will be 1,100 feet in length, and should be completed within three weeks from the start of construction.

MTA OFFICIALS TALK TO LOCAL CHAMBER

EAGLE RIVER: The Board of Directors of the local Chamber of Commerce met last Friday at the Eagle River Lions Den in the Shopping Center building.

Special guests were Max Clement, General Manager of the Matanuska Telephone Association, and Bob Fleming, Chugiak Area member of the MTA Board.

Mr. Clement explained to the Chamber the reason for the problems many have been having in placing and receiving calls from Anchorage. He explained that the fault lies in not being able to get enough lines from ACS. He said that when the sale of ACS to RCA is completed, MTA hopes to get the additional circuits it needs to upgrade the service.

PETERS CREEK: A Nindichik couple both sustained injuries when they failed to notice the Road Closed sign on the Old Glenn Highway and collided with the earthen berm which was pushed up by the Department of Highways to prevent cars from running into the chain link fence which was erected to close off the north end of the Old Glenn Highway.

The driver, Art Richardson, sustained cuts about the face. An unidentified woman passenger suffered a broken leg. Both were taken to the ANS Hospital by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance.

The car, a late model Mustang, had climbed right on top of the dirt pile, and sustained considerable damage.

CHUGIAK: There is a definite possibility of double shifting at the Eagle River Elementary School this fall, according to a spokesman for the Anchorage Borough School District.

At that, Chugiak area residents are better off than some in other parts of the borough it was pointed out.

The primary classes (as many as 12 classes) at Eagle River will probably double shift until the completion of the addition to that school, however Chugiak High will get by on regular shifts with the addition of two more relocatables until the addition to that school is completed.

Chugiak Elementary students will remain on single shifts and attend classes in the existing building while the new replacement school is under construction.

Birchwood Elementary school does not anticipate any problems, and will continue to house all seventh grades of the Chugiak Junior High as it has been doing.

However, it was pointed out that all this is based on the assumption that the projected school enrollment does not exceed the estimated figure.

SUIT MAY ENDANGER CHS BUILDING PROGRAM

CHUGIAK: Ed Willis, Borough Assemblyman from the Greater Chugiak Area, said today, that he was concerned that construction of the addition to Chugiak High School might be jeopardized by the suit that Will Key Jefferson has filed against the Greater Anchorage Area Borough. This suit has held up the sale of the bonds which the Borough was to have completed with the John Nuveen and Associates Bonding Company of Chicago.

Willis said that a motion was defeated at the Monday night Assembly meeting to allocate the sum of \$1,500,00 in unappropriated borough school funds toward the Chugiak High School contract. The apparent low bidder on the job was the construction firm of K Inc, whose bid was \$1,890,000,00

Since this was such a good bid, the firm was asked to hold the bid open for 30 days.

Willis stated that Jefferson's suit is scheduled to come before Judge Davis today (Wednesday) and borough attorney

the street naming campaign.
The Greater Anchorage Area Borough has indicated to the Chamber that they will cooperate with the community in allowing local residents to name their own streets. Any names chosen will be permanently recorded on the map of the area, and will be changed only in the case of duplication.

It was also brought out that the Borough Planning and Zoning Ordinance will probably become effective in the Greater Chugiak Area by the end of the year. It was suggested that meetings be held throughout the community of local neighborhoods to determine what type of zoning the majority prefers. It was felt that the Planning and Zoning Department would honor the wishes of area residents if they were made known prior to the ordinance going into effect.

The Chamber is still trying to get the Department of Highways to correct what they believe are unsafe situations at the intersections of the New Glenn Highway and connector roads. Another unsafe condition which brought to light was the fact that the only way from the Peters Creek area to the rest of Chugiak is over the new bridge, which means that youngsters on foot, bicycles or even horseback would have to travel on the paved highway down the long stretch from the top of Peters Creek hill to the North Birchwood Loop.

For a considerable portion of this stretch, guardrails would prevent them from getting off the road to avoid traffic.

With school vacation coming up, the large numbers of Chugiak area youngsters who travel on foot or bicycles to Mirror Lake could create a dangerous condition on this stretch of road. It was suggested that this could be remedied by opening a section of the Old Glenn Highway which would permit foot or bicycle

traffic, but exclude cars. This would permit youngsters to pass from one part of the community to the other along the old road, using the old bridge. The next regular board meeting will be a luncheon meeting on Friday, May 15th, at a location to be announced.

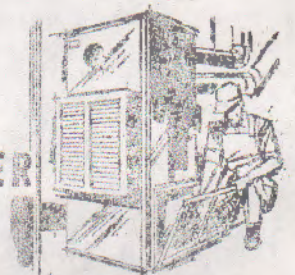

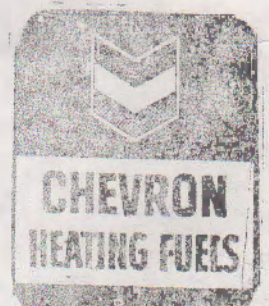

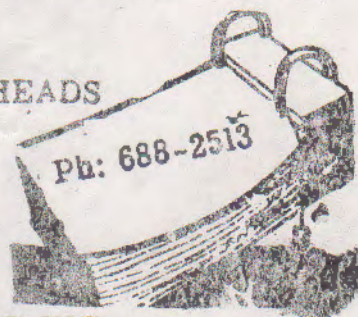

HOPE WALK IS SUCCESSFUL

ANCHORAGE: The first Annual Walk for Hope, which took place last Saturday, was even more successful than anticipated with 4,500 walkers having registered and 3,100 completing the 31 mile trek.

This year, once again Chugiak's own Paul Mitchell was the oldest person to complete the entire 31 miles. Mitchell, who is now 71 years old, is a Chugiak Area pioneer, having homesteaded in the Old Chugiak Area. Mitchell also was the oldest to finish the 31 mile Walk for Biafra, last year.

The first woman to finish was Marcey Trent of Anchorage. Mrs. Trent who is over 60 years old, ran the entire 31 miles in 4 1/2 hours.

A spokesman for the Walk stated that they are sure they will exceed their \$50,000.00 goal.

It was also mentioned that a number of walkers had lost their cards. A number of the lost cards had been found, and have been turned in at the Walk for Hope Headquarters. Walkers may identify their lost cards by the number assigned to them and are asked to pick them up so they can redeem their pledges.

A great number of walkers were from the Greater Chugiak Area. Mrs. Diane Anderson, chairman for Walk for Hope said that she is sure that none of them were aware that one of the children in Hope Cottage is an infant girl, whose family lives in Chugiak.

The Fire Company is collecting coupons to get a new Fire truck.

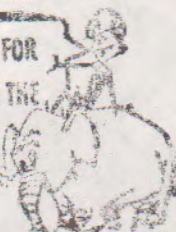
COURIER ROUTE OPEN IN BIRCHWOOD
