NEW H'WAY LIGHTING SYSTEM ASKED

PAIR HARASS TROOPER AT MIRROR LAKE

PETERS CREEK: A spokesman for the Chugiak Security Patrol reported a disturbance at the Mirror Lake Picnic Wayside early last Monday morning.

He stated that he intercepted a call from a State Trooper in need of assistance, and upon responding to the call found the resident Trooper at Mirror Lake being confronted by two men who were harassing him.

The State Trooper from Palmer also arrived and the two men were placed under arrest.

The Security Patrolman reported that the two had been members of a party who had been shooting in the park area and otherwise creating a disturbance. He said that the other members of the party had fled when the Trooper came out of his house trailer but the pair had remained behind and were giving the Trooper a "hard time".

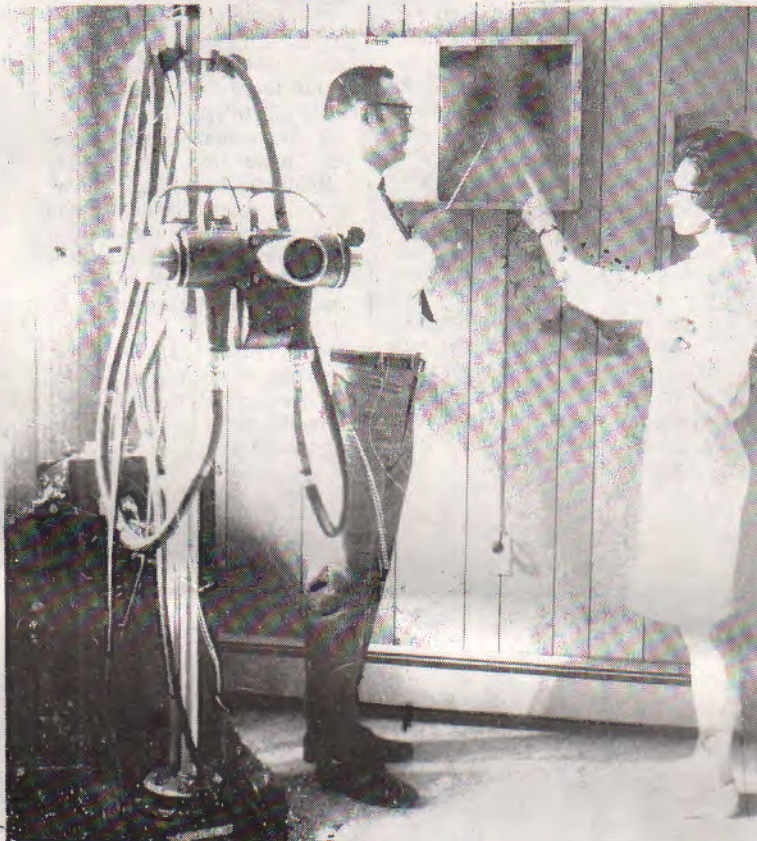
The Security Patrolman said that the Trooper has been the subject of considerable harassment since he moved his trailer to the facilities provided by the Department of Parks and Recreation at Mirror Lake. He has been threatened with being "burned out", and his family has experienced a complete violation of privacy by the public using the picnic wayside.

The Chugiak Security Patrol has been authorized to respond to calls for assistance by Alaska State Troopers.

MIRROR LAKE FIRE QUICKLY EXTINGUISHED

PETERS CREEK: Sparks from an unattended cooking fire at the Mirror Lake Picnic Wayside were responsible for a fire which broke out in the moss and brush near the swimming area last Sunday.

A Park Ranger, assisted by members of the Chugiak Lions Club and also the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company who had been called, quickly brought the fire under control.

DR. GREEN OPENS NEW TREATMENT FACILITY

EAGLE RIVER: Dr. Thomas F. Green, MD, announced this week, the completion of a new diagnostic and treatment facility at his Eagle River office.

The clinic is located in the lower floor of the building in which the Doctor's office is located.

Dr. Green is now able to treat injuries and other complaints which require the use of X-Ray, right at his office, rather than having to travel to Anchorage hospitals as in the past.

Dr. Green stated that the X-Ray equipment is already installed and in use, and within a short time he expects to have a laboratory with the services of a lab technician on the premises.

TRESPASSERS EVICTED FROM CAMP GORSUCH

PETERS CREEK: A number of trespassers at Boy Scout Camp Gorsuch, are to be evicted tomorrow, according to a spokesman for the Chugiak Security Patrol.

The Security Patrolman reported that a number of transients had moved onto camp property, had confiscated supplies stored for the use of the Scouts and strewn a considerable amount of litter and garbage around the camp.

The camp has now been posted against trespassers, and all "squatters" have been given until Thursday to move out.

The regular Boy Scout encampment starts this Friday, and anyone caught trespassing will be arrested, the Patrolman stated.

ANCHORAGE: The Department of Highways announced today, that it will begin advertising for construction of Project F-042-1 (33), illumination along the new Glenn Highway from Eagle River to Peters Creek.

This project involves the illumination of five intersections, Artillery Road, Powder Magazine Road, South Birchwood Loop, Birchwood School Cutoff, and North Birchwood Loop.

Completion is scheduled for November 1, 1970. Advertising began June 8th, 1970, with bids to be opened in the Commissioner's Office in Douglas on June 30th, 1970.

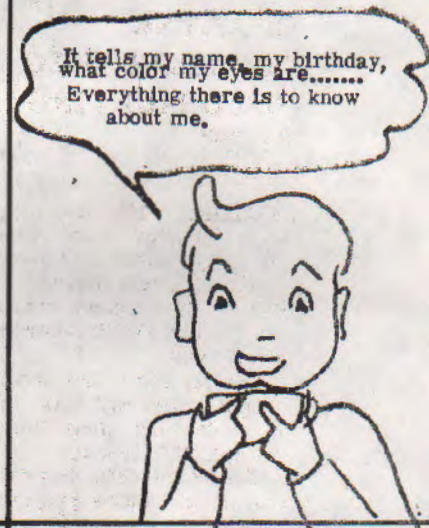

CHUGIAK: The Anchorage Area Charter Commission has set the dates for a second round of public hearings to discuss the proposed charter for a unified City-Borough government.

The hearing in the Greater Chugiak Area will take place on Wednesday, June 24th at Chugiak High School.

The Commission has spent roughly 150 hours preparing the preliminary charter draft, and is now near the end of its deliberations.

DIRECTORY CENSUS TO START SOON

CHUGIAK: A house to house census of the entire Greater Chugiak Area is scheduled to begin this month, according to a spokesman for the Chugiak Ladies Club.

This census is taken every two years by the club and the information gathered is used in compile a Community Directory.

This year, the Ladies Club will be assisted in their head count by the local Chamber of Commerce and several other local Service Organizations.

Local residents can look forward to being visited by a representative of one of these organizations who will ask a few simple questions.

This year the census cards will have an added section other than the part which asks the information which later appears in the directory.

This section is strictly for Chamber of Commerce use, and will not be published in the Directory. The Chamber is seeking to compile a list of statistics on the local area such as how many are homeowners, renters, military, rate of population growth etc.

The portion of the card which contains this information will be detached from the part of the card which shows the name of the householder, and catalogued as a list of nameless statistics.

Local residents are asked to please cooperate with the volunteer census takers when they knock at their door.

The Ladies Club sells copies of the Community Directory and proceeds are used to finance a college scholarship which is offered each year to a graduating senior from Chugiak High School.

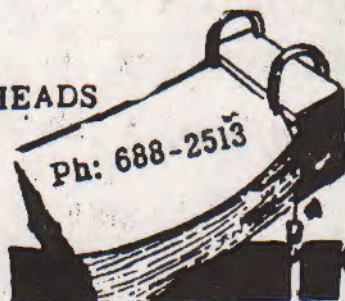
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SPORTSMEN GET GUNS FOR KIDS

GIRLS SOFTBALL LEAGUE TO FORM HERE

CHUGIAK: Girls age 8 through 12 are being offered the opportunity to join a Slow-pitch Softball league, under the sponsorship of the Anchorage Community YMCA.

Mr. Burney, of the YMCA, stated that if sufficient girls sign up the "Y" hopes to organize at least three teams this year.

The program will start June 16th, and last through August 8th. Complete details for participating may be obtained at the library.

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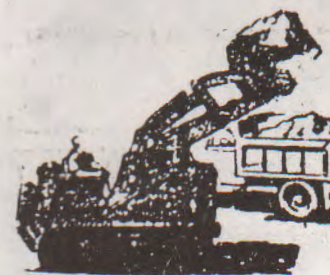

HUNT RESULTS TOLD

Questionnaires sent to hunter who held antlerless moose permits for Sub Units 14A and 14E by the Alaska Department of Fish and Game have been tabulated.

"The results are somewhat different than expected," said Jack Didrickson, area game biologist. "For instance, 550 permits were issued in 14A and 14B, but out of 80 per cent of the permit holders who answered the questionnaire, over 100 persons did not hunt."

Of the 340 permit holders who hunted however, 317, or 93 per cent, were successful in both Sub Units.

In Sub Unit 14A, the 80 per cent who returned the questionnaires reported taking 152 adult female moose, 23 adult males and 24 calves. In Sub Unit 14B, 54 adult females, 39 adult males and 24 calves were taken.

Since the questionnaire was answered by 80 per cent of the permit holders, the final tallies on moose taken will have to wait until all harvest ticket data is compiled.

ANOTHER BIG CABBAGE CONTEST FOR K

BIRCHWOOD: Youngsters of the Greater Chuglak Area between the ages of 6 and 12 will once again be invited to participate in the "Big Cabbage Contest," sponsored by H&H Nursery Supply of Birchwood and Eagle River.

Each boy or girl participating will receive free two cabbage plants from H&H. They are of the same variety that win the largest cabbage award at the Palmer Fair.

The youngster is to plant cabbages, keep a record of care and growth, and may receive advice but not help from an adult.

Plants may be picked up at H&H Nursery Supply in Birchwood from June 15th until June 19th.

The closing date and judging of the contest will be dependent on the growing season, and will be announced at a later date; however it will be in time for children to enter the cabbages in the Fair if they wish to do so.

4H judging standards will be used.

This year there will be two divisions, children ages 6 to 12 and ages 10 through 12. There will be several prizes in each division.

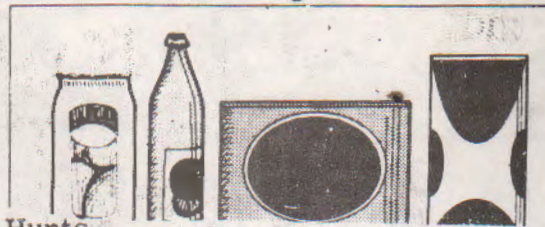
