AMBULANCE WRECKED ON WAY TO HOSPITAL

ANCHORAGE: The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance, speeding to the hospital with the victim of a reported hit and run accident, was involved in a collision at an intersection in Mt. View.

According to Chugiak Fire Chief Lionel Deal, the ambulance was crossing the intersection with the siren and red light going when it was struck.

The driver of the other car apparently did not see or hear the ambulance.

Neither the driver of the ambulance, Mrs. Waneeta Smith nor the attendant Mrs. Jewel Deal were injured. The patient did not sustain any additional injuries and was taken to the ANS Hospital by the Anchorage Ambulance.

Chief Deal estimated the damage to the ambulance at approximately \$300, and said he expected it to be back in commission in around three days.

The ambulance had responded to a report of a man laying along side the highway near Eklutna. The person reporting the incident thought man might have been struck by a car.

LOCAL ZONING COMING SOON!

EAGLE RIVER: "Either decide how you want to be zoned or the borough will decide for you!"

This was the message that was delivered by David Dorris, Assistant Planning Director from the GAAB Department of Planning and Zoning.

Mr. Dorris outlined the Zoning Ordinance at a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Local Chamber of Commerce last Monday night at the Lions Den in the Eagle River Shopping Center.

The Borough plans to Zone the entire Greater Chugiak Area after January 1st, 1971, with Zoning scheduled to be completed prior to the 1971 construction season.

Mr. Dorris said that short of visual inspection of all areas, it is not possible for his department to be familiar with the community to the point of being able to recommend the most suitable type of zoning for each neighborhood. Therefore, he said, the Borough would be very favorable toward zoning the areas

ue fields in Eagle River, Birchwood and Old Chugiak.

The "Y" will provide balls, bats and bases. Girls must have their own mitts, and pay the "Y" membership fee.

In accordance with the wishes of the residents of those areas, providing that they make their wishes known.

He pointed out that residents of any given area need not wait until the borough is ready to come in and zone that area.

He said that a petition, containing the names of owners of over 50% of the property in a given area requesting a specific type of zoning would result in his Department coming in and reviewing the petition, and if it met the requirements of the ordinance, that type of zoning, would in all likelihood, be granted.

He then defined all the designations of zoning and explained that areas are zoned either residential, business, or industrial. He explained all the exceptions and other factors involved in zoning a community.

Another advantage he mentioned in petitioning for zoning prior to it becoming mandatory by the borough, was that if the majority of the property owners of an area wished to be zoned to exclude any certain type of business or industry, they could have this zoning in effect before someone could start such a business or industry prior to mandatory zoning and then claim "grandfather rights."

Dorris suggested small neighborhood meetings where the residents of that area could study the Zoning Ordinance, and decide which type of zoning would be their choice. He said that they could then contact his office at 277-9561 and would be given information on how to initiate a petition.

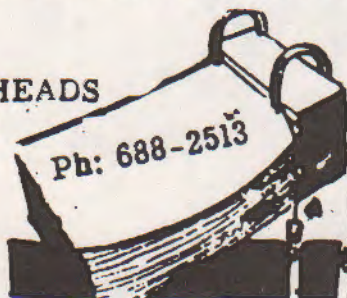

FISH HATCHERY DEDICATION THIS SATURDAY

FIRE LAKE. The New Fire Lake fish hatchery, a production facility designed to improve the fishing along the Alaska's road system, will be dedicated Saturday, June 27th, by the Department of Fish and Game.

Secretary of State Robert Ward and Fish and Game Department officials will participate in the ceremonies scheduled for 2:00pm. The public is invited to attend the dedication and to tour the hatchery site.

Financed through the sale of sport fishing licenses and matching federal funds under the Anadromous Fish Act, the new \$538,000 hatchery will have an annual capacity of 10

million fingerlings.

Explaining the need for the new hatchery, Rupe Andrews, director of the sport fish division; said that Alaska's sport fishing potential in remote areas is unsurpassed, but that intense fishing pressure near roads and population centers often depletes the resource. Stocking is then necessary if quality recreational fishing is to be maintained.

The new hatchery will utilize recently developed techniques in fish culture and will stress automation to reduce the labor involved. The new techniques will more than triple the fish-rearing potential of the facility, which has been in a limited operation since 1964.

Using the new fish-rearing techniques and automated equipment, the hatchery is capable of producing up to 50,000 pounds of young fish per year. The Fire Lake facility was formerly limited by a shortage of water and cold water temperatures throughout most of the year.

In the standard hatchery, water passes over the fish once and then is discharged back to the stream. The new hatchery incorporates a technique in which the water is sterilized and heated, then passes over the fish to be reconditioned and used again.

Because the water can be reused, it is economically feasible to warm it. Fish grow faster in the warmer water, thus permitting control over the size of fish desired for planting. Mortality of the

young fish is also reduced.

Fry and fingerlings produced by the hatchery are transported by truck or commercial aircraft for planting in lakes throughout the state.

Fish are reared for up to three months and are two to four inches in length when planted.

The Fire Lake hatchery is open seven days a week from 8:00am to 4:30pm. The public is invited to tour the facility during these hours.

NO CITATION IN ONE CAR ACCIDENT

FIRE LAKE: An Anchorage driver received no citation following a one car accident at Mile 16 early last Monday morning.

Lionel K. Madderford had apparently fallen asleep at the wheel of his 1966 Chevrolet station wagon, causing the car to go out of control, leave the road, and roll over once.

Damage to the vehicle was estimated at \$1600 by the Alaska State Trooper's.

Madderford was taken to Providence Hospital with minor injuries.

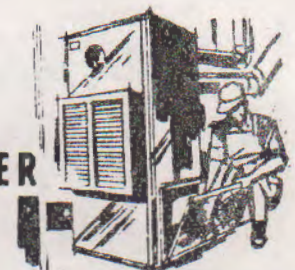

Viewers will be asked to ballot for their favorite exhibits during the first week of the show.

Rules for entries are as follows:

1. All paintings must be appropriately framed, and prints and drawings must be matted. Framed pictures delivered to the art gallery must be ready to hang with screw eyes and cable installed, and screw eyes and cable should be taped to pictures being shipped.

2. All paint and varnish must be dry on both paintings and frames before delivery.

3. Ship entries prepaid with address label provided. All shipped entries must be packed well in crates if possible, as they will be returned in the packing received, collect, by your method of shipping. Entries in their crates must not exceed 70 pounds.

Entry blanks and instructions may be obtained by writing the Alaska Association for the Arts, Box 2735, Fairbanks 99701.

The exhibit is open to all art-

ists living in Alaska. Exhibitors may enter a maximum of two compositions in painting, sculpture, print or drawing.

Only original works executed within the last year are eligible. No copies, imitations, reproductions from the work of others, or kit work will be accepted. Classroom work or work done under instruction cannot be considered.

CLOSURE ORDER IS LIFTED

Rains and cooler weather have eased the fire danger on portions of the Kenai Peninsula the Anchorage area, and the Matanuska-Susitna Borough. Closure orders affecting these areas were rescinded on June 17.

Areas affected by this announcement include lands within the Matanuska-Susitna Borough, Greater Anchorage Area Borough, and all lands located within Game Management Unit 7. These areas may be closed again when warranted by dry conditions flammable ground cover.

F. J. Keenan, Director, Division of Lands, in making the announcement, cautioned the public that Management Units 12 and 20 in the Fairbanks area and Unit 15 on the Kenai Peninsula remain closed to open burning.

Keenan also noted that all land users are to exercise extreme caution in the use of fire and are by law ultimately responsible for damage resulting from any fires they have set.
