



BRIDGE IS SITE OF TWO WRECKS

VANDALS DAMAGE CARR'S SIGN

EAGLE RIVER: Vandals were apparently responsible for damage inflicted to the Carr's Food Center sign at the Eagle River Shopping Center last Monday night.

According to a spokesman for the Chugiak Security Patrol, he was summoned by two persons who had witnessed the act.

The witnesses reportedly heard the sound of rocks smashing through the sign, and observed a car leaving the scene hurriedly. They noted the license number of the car and turned it over to the Security Patrol.

The Patrol subsequently located the car in question and pulled the driver over to the side of the road.

The driver was a juvenile, as were the two passengers. All three were identified as Chugiak High School seniors who had received their diplomas only a few hours earlier. The Security Patrolman stated that it appeared that all three had been drinking.

The Alaska State Troopers were called in, and the case is being investigated.

In addition to the damage to the sign, the receiver of the pay telephone had been pulled loose from the instrument and smashed.

CHARTER COMMISSION TO HOLD MEETING HERE

CHUGIAK: The Anchorage Area Charter Commission has set the dates for a second round of public hearings to discuss the proposed charter for a unified City-Borough government.

The hearing in the Greater Chugiak Area will take place on Wednesday, June 24th at Chugiak High School.

The Commission has spent roughly 150 hours preparing the preliminary charter draft, and is now near the end of its deliberations.

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River bridge was the scene of two serious accidents during the past week.

On Tuesday, May 26th, a three car collision took place when a Dept. of Highways sweeper truck was struck by a pick-up truck on the bridge.

The sweeper has apparently stirred up a cloud of dust making it impossible for the driver of the pick-up to see it.

The truck crashed into the rear of the sweeper, and was itself struck by a third car, a sedan driven by Mrs. Wayne Cousineau of Eagle River, who had apparently also been blinded by the dust.

Alton Lyle, driver of the pick-up, sustained minor injuries.

The second accident took place on Saturday, May 30th, at 1:04 pm.

A 1968 Chevrolet Station Wagon, driven by John L. Hendrix of Eagle River was towing a camping trailer, when the car went out of control on the bridge and swung into the opposite lane of traffic, crashing into a 1967 Chevrolet, driven by H.A. White also of Eagle River.

Hendrix was taken to the 5040 Air Force Hospital with serious injuries. White, who was also injured was taken to Providence Hospital.

The Alaska State Troopers estimated the total damage to both cars and the trailer at \$8,000. The trailer was completely demolished.

The accident is still under investigation.

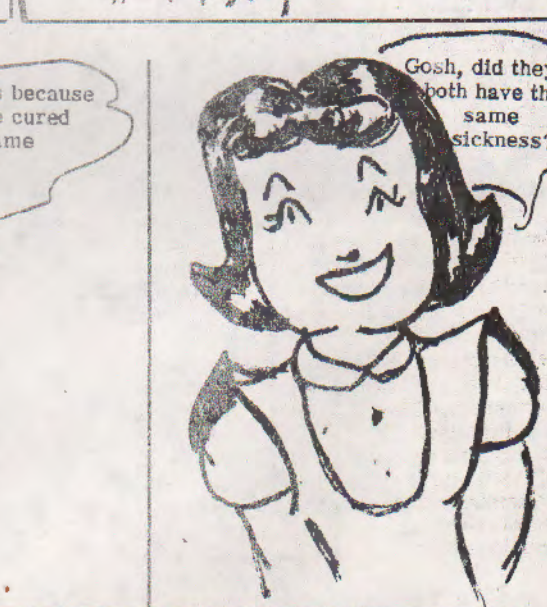

FENCE CUT TO RELEASE TRAPPED MOOSE

BIRCHWOOD: The Department of Fish and Game removed a section of the fence along the new Glenn Highway last Sunday, in the hopes that a calf moose which had become trapped on the highway side of the fence would be able to find its way back to its mother.

The action was taken in response to a number of calls from people who had seen the calf running along the fence trying to find a way through.

The calf was only a few days old, and would not have been able to survive long without its mother.

It had been feared by a number of conservationists that the fences might cause the newborn calves to become separated from the cows in the spring.

Although the fences in rural stretches of the highway are low enough for a full-grown moose to jump over them, a small calf would be unable to.

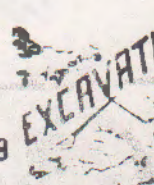

The Sale will start at 12:00 noon and last until 6:00pm. The public is invited to stop by and buy homemade breads, cakes, cookies or pies.

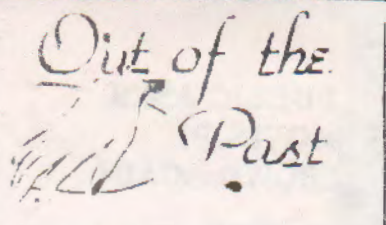
Donations will help the group to plan a full program of crafts and trips for the summer.

PUBLIC ASKS MOVIE BE SHOWN AGAIN

BIRCHWOOD: By popular demand, the Chugiak High School Journalism Department is presenting the second showing of the film, "All Around Chugiak High."

The film, which was well received in its first showing on May 27th, is a coverage of the year's activities, including the various accomplishments made by the school both in the area of sports and in the area of academics.

The film which is the first in the Borough and in Alaska, depicts scenes concerning the new Social Studies-English Elective programs, the introduction of the wrestling Take-Down Tournament, and the Steeple Chase to the state and accounts of the acquisition of four state championships in athletics. The result is a veritable talking and moving yearbook.

The production was combined student-teacher endeavor, utilizing the efforts and talents of the Journalism, Art and Music departments, under the leadership of Mr. Tom Cresap, Journalism and Spanish Instructor, who filmed and produced the movie.

Featured are three animations, one of which was done by the school's drama club and the other two of which were drawn by Vicki Frankfourth and Steve Jordan, with help in animation from Mr. Cresap.

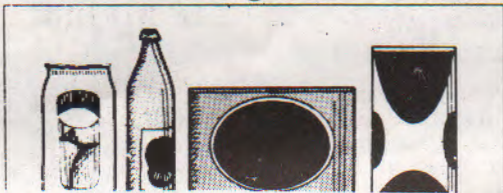

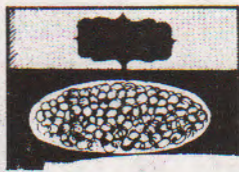

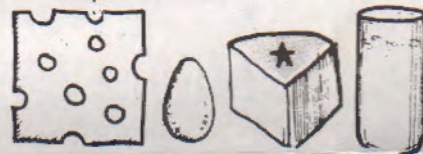
