

# **BRIDGE IS SITE OF TWO WRECKS**

#### VANDALS DAMAGE CARR'S SIGN

EAGLE RIVER: Vandals were apparently responsible for damage inflicted to the Carr's Food Center sign at the Eagle River Shopping Center last Monday night.

According to a spokesman for the Chuglak Security Patrol, he was summoned by two persons who had witnessed the act.

The witnesses reportedly heard the sound of rocks smashing through the sign, and observed a car leaving the scene hurriedly. They noted the license number of the car and turned it over to the Security Patrol.

The Patrol subsequently located the car in question and pulled the driver over to the side of the road.

The driver was a juvenile, as were the two passengers. All three were identified as Chugiak High School seniors who had received their diplimas only a few hours earlier. The Security Patrolman stated that it appeared that 'll three had been drinking. The Alaska State Troopers

In addition to the damage to the sign, the receiver of the pay telephone had been pulled lose from the instrument and smashed.


The car had apparently taken hold of the door handle as the door came open. The force of the door opening pulled her from the car which was moving at about 40 mph at the time.


