



EAGLE RIVER BOWL TO REOPEN

EAGLE RIVER: Bowling enthusiasts in the Greater Chugiak Area are reacting with enthusiasm at the news that the Eagle River Bowl will be re-opening in time for the fall bowling league season.

The announcement was made today by Jim King of S, K, Enterprises Inc., who have purchased the building.

King, who is in partnership with Donald Straub, an Eagle River building contractor, said that all new pin setting equipment has been ordered, and he expects to have it installed and ready to go by September 15th.

King stated that they do not plan to operate a cocktail lounge at the bowling alley.

He said that the bar in the 300 Room will be converted into a soft-drink fountain, and they plan to install six Brunswick tables in the room. He plans to have several dining tables in the room, to be served from the snack-bar kitchen.

The snack-bar and billiard parlor should be open for business by August 1st, King said.

The bowling alley will be open 7 days a week, with Saturday mornings reserved for Bantam Leagues and Saturday afternoons for Juniors.

Fall bowling leagues are already forming, he said, and anyone wishing to sign up for a league may do so by contacting Earleen Bendle at the Eagle River Barber Shop.

King, who is a salesman for S. T. Heflin Real Estate Agency plans to move to the Eagle River area in the immediate future.

CHAMBER FAVORS RETAINING 2nd CLASS BOROUGH

EAGLE RIVER: The board of Directors of the local Chamber of Commerce took an official stand on the proposed charter for the Unified Municipality of Anchorage at their Monday meeting.

MILLER TELLS OF STUDY FUNDING

Governor Keith H. Miller has announced the funding of a study to improve Alaskan emergency medical services. A federal grant of \$35,100 has been obtained in an effort to develop a master plan for the state that will enable the state to provide more timely service for highway and other emergencies.

Expanded training programs for ambulance attendants and hospital emergency room personnel are also an objective of the State, according to Bert Hall, commissioner of Health and Welfare. The grant was set up as a continuing project with another \$35,000 expected next year to complete the work.

NEW ADULT ED. PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

Commissioner of Education Dr. Cliff R. Hartman announced that the Correspondence Study Branch of the Department of Education can now provide additional help to adults desiring to earn high school degrees by examination through the General Educational Development program.

Many communities in Alaska, including Palmer give adult education courses at the local community college to help individuals prepare for the examinations. The Correspondence Study Branch of the Department now offers correspondence study materials for the GED examination to adults living in remote areas.

Any Alaskan resident who is 20 years old or older, who does not have a high school diploma and who lives where there is no community college program to help him earn one, is eligible for the correspondence study service.

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19 & 20 YEAR OLDS GET PRIVILEGE

19 and 20 year olds are getting new privileges and responsibilities in a law passed last month by Governor Miller. This age group will be on the responsibility and be removed from the jurisdiction of the juvenile court the first time 19 and 20 year olds can act as incorporations and serve in law enforcement offices.

Under the provisions of the law the 19-year-old will be able to work in a licensed restaurant and purchase alcoholic beverages. The provisions of the bill become effective on August 25, 1970.



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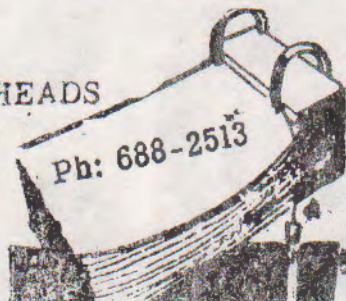
SCHOOL DEBTS TO BENEFIT FROM BILL

Governor Keith H. Miller has signed a measure authorizing the State to pay city and borough school districts one-half of their requirements for school debt retirement.

The act establishes a special account to which the Alaska State Legislature may appropriate one-half of school debt service costs incurred by school districts two years previously.

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MIS-INFO. ON YOUTH FOOTBALL CLEARED UP

CHUGIAK: Bill Watkins, a spokesman for the group who is attempting to organize Youth Football teams in the Greater Chugiak Area, stated that a lot of mis-information has been given out of this subject.

"I would like to correct some of this mis-information", Watson said.

"First of all, these teams will be made up entirely of boys from this area and will be practicing in this area, probably at Chuglak High School. They will be coached by qualified coaches from this area and will be playing against teams of the same age and weight groups from Anchorage and Palmer. They will not be traveling back and forth to Anchorage three times a week for practice."

"Secondly", Watkins went on, "All equipment except shoes and mouthpieces are bought and paid for by the Association. This equipment cost is close to one hundred dollars per boy and is borne entirely by the Association. There is a twenty dollar registration fee for each boy that plays. This money is used to pay insurance, pay qualified officials etc. The uniforms and pads are of excellent quality and surpass the stand-

ards set by the National Association. The only cost to the parent is the registratin fee, the pads, uniforms and helmets are provided. Each player also keeps his game jersey at the end of the season. Some of the schools in town have even proclaimed "Jersey Day". One day a week when the boys can wear their team jerseys to school. These jerseys are a badge of honor to any boys the, the same as the school athletic jackets of the high school boys."

"The third point", Watkins stated, "I would like to say something about the mis-information of the football injury rate. Certainly boys get injuries. They get hurt playing tag, cowboys and indians and almost anything else that boys do to have fun. One boy in the Alaska football program last year broke his arm. I wonder how many broken arms there were from skiing, baseball, hockey, basketball, just plain old "Tag" or just climbing trees. The most serious injury in the area last year was to one of our own local boys while he was playing baseball."

"When the idea of Youth Football was first started in the Anchorage area one of the local youth groups was approached to back it. After some checking they turned it down as being too expensive unless the parents furnished the uniforms and they didn't feel that the parents would back a program that would run in excess of one hundred dol-

lars per boy. Now that the program is started this same organization is very busy telling everyone that they meet that the injury rate is extremely high and otherwise bucking the program as they feel it will interfere with their own fund raising program.

This organization operates with PAID executives and at present has over forty thousand dollar surplins, and says of this they can ann ANOTHER PAID EXECUTIVE NEXT YEAR!"

"All athletic minded boys want to play football. To most of them this is the ultimate in sports. If they want to play and are going to play then they should start with the Youth Football program where they will learn and develop by playing with boys not only in their own age group, but in their own weight group. There will be two teams in this area. One for boys nine through eleven and under 110 pounds and one team with boys aged twelve through fourteen and under 140 pounds. This last team will include many high school freshmen and I would like to point out that the High School may not have a Junior Varsity team this year. There is a good possibility that they will not have any, and if they do play J.V., then there will only be four games."

Watkins concluded his remarks by saying, "I would like to see all adults and boys in the above age groups come to Chuglak High School Sunday July 19th for any additional in-

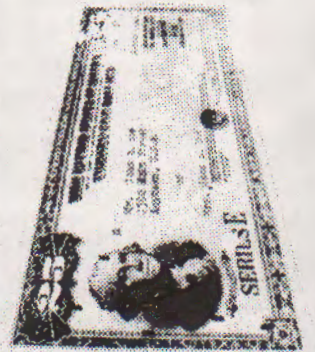
