DEFEAT OF CHARTER IS AIM OF CFPSCB

FEW DETAILS AVAILABLE ON SHOOTING

EAGLE RIVER: Few details are available of a shooting incident which reportedly took place the other day on the South Fork Road.

Two couples riding on trail bikes reported that they were driving down the road when they came upon a parked pick-up truck, whose occupants were apparently target practicing with high powered rifles. They apparently made no effort to pause in their practice as the cyclists passed them.

One of the cycle riders was reported as having said that when they had proceeded only a little way past the truck bullets began whistling past them. They "hit the dirt", but not before a woman passenger on one of the cycles was struck in the hip by a bullet. The bullet, which glanced off the nylon jacket she was wearing, was either almost spent, or struck her at an angle. It did not penetrate her skin, but inflicted a severe and painful bruise.

The truck was described as being either a 1962 or 1963 yellow Ford pick-up with a white camper unit. They believed that there was lettering on the side which advertised an Eagle River construction company.

Further information is pending investigation by the Alaska State Troopers.

OLD CHUGIAK: A Committee whose goal is the preservation of the second class form of Borough Government was formed last Thursday night at a meeting held at the United Methodist Church of Chugiak.

The Committee is composed of area residents who believe the voters of the Greater Chugiak Area have indicated their opposition to Unincorporation by their overwhelming 7 to 1 vote against it at last October's election.

The aim of the Committee is to publicize the articles of the proposed Charter for the United Municipality of Anchorage, which would usurp the right of the voter to make his own decision at the ballot box (as is possible in the second class borough), possibly forced to assume payment of the bonded indebtedness of the City of Anchorage Port and other utilities, and complete loss of community identity through the assimilation of the local post office into branches of the Anchorage Post Office.

The group selected the name of "COMMITTEE FOR PRESERVATION OF THE SECOND CLASS BOROUGH". Elected as Chairman for the Committee was Bill Lowe, of Peters Creek. Bob Jones, of Chugiak was chosen Area Co-ordinator, and Jess Niemi, of Eagle River, Treasurer for the organization.

Key workers have been named for each voting precinct in the Greater Chugiak Area whose responsibility it will be to recruit volunteers to get out and personally register each registered voter in the area.

The first phase of the campaign will be "Education" was decided. Volunteers will be going door to door hand out a personal letter from Lowe to the local residents and answering questions about the charter. The second phase will be an all out effort to get every registered voter to the polls on the day of Charter election. "We'll be there, if we have to" Committee member promised.

Precinct leaders are, Wooten, the Eagle River precinct, Louise Juhnke the Birchwood precinct; Lowe for the Peters Creek precinct, and Marianna Kler for the Chugiak precinct. A precinct leader for the Eagle River Valley had not been named.

REGISTRATION ALSO REQUIRED FOR BOROUGH ELECTION

CHUGIAK: Alaskan residents must be registered to vote in local elections, as well as in the coming State Primary.

Bill Lowe, Chairman for the COMMITTEE FOR THE PRESERVATION OF THE SECOND CLASS BOROUGH, pointed out that anyone who fails to register by the August 11th deadline will not only not be eligible to vote in the State Primary, but will lose out on the opportunity to vote at the Borough Election in September at which time they will be asked to either approve or disapprove the proposed charter.

Mrs. Billy Moore, librarian announced that the new closing dates will be Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, August 3rd, 4th and 5th.

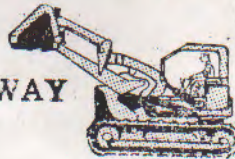
Books duo on the 3rd may be turned in on the 6th. There will be no story hour on Wednesday, August 5th.

DANGERS OF CHARCOAL GRILLING TOLD

The Food and Drug Administration warns consumers to use charcoal briquettes only outdoors because of the danger of carbon monoxide poisoning.

FDA's Office of Product Safety has investigated several cases of carbon monoxide poisoning from the improper use of charcoal briquettes in enclosed indoor areas. Some of the victims have died.

FDA Commissioner Charles C. Edwards, says charcoal briquettes are safe to use outdoors, but in enclosed areas where there is little or no ventilation the large quantities of carbon monoxide as released by burning charcoal can result in severe poisoning or death.

Carbon monoxide gas is invisible, odorless, and tasteless. Persons exposed to the gas for prolonged periods may experience headaches, dizzy spells, weakness, mental depression, nervousness, irritability, and circulatory impairment.

FDA urges consumers to use charcoal briquettes only outdoors and not to move grills or Hibachi pots to cars, trailers, enclosed porches, inside boats, or indoors in the event of rain or other unfavorable weather.

The office of the Alaska State Fair announced this year there will be many daily gate prizes to be given away each day of the fair. Aug. 28 to Sept. 2. Among the prizes there will be toasters, percolators, mixers, skillets and the grand prize will be a piano.

To be eligible to win, purchase a book of season passes. Then as you come into the fair grounds each day give your ticket to the gate man. Be sure that you have filled in your name and address on the back of the ticket.

TIPS FOR MILADY



Make ring box favors for the guests at a bridal shower. Cut a large size marshmallow across the middle leaving a small section intact at the back for a "hinge". Place a yellow "Lifesaver" candy vertically between the two halves to resemble a ring in the box.

If it should be a baby shower you're planning, then make candy pacifiers for favors.

Attach a ribbon 1/4 inch wide to the "Lifesaver" or handle of the pacifier and tie into a bow.

Push a straight pin through the bow, and through the center of a large flat mint.

Stick a jelly bean over the point of the pin and onto the mint, and you have a nipple for your pacifier.
