Other departments will be stocked and open at the earliest opportunity. In addition to the items mentioned above, Wilkins is planning a gift line, and a film department and film developing service.

Wilkins, who lives in Birch-wood with his wife Katie, has been in Alaska for one year.

His nome state is Iowa, and he is a graduate of the University of Iowa, where he was a major in Pharmacy. He has been a practicing pharmacist for five years, and has work-ed at Fort Madison Iowa, Cedar Rapids Iowa and at Mount Vernon Washington. He has managed stores in the States, and has worked at the Downtown Rexal and Eastchester Drug Stores in Anchorage.



FOUNDATION FUNDS SURVEY

A \$55,000 Ford Foundation grant for a survey of environmental and land-use policy issues in Alaska has been awarded the University of Alaska's Institute of Social, Economic and Government Research (ISEGR).

The purpose of the survey, to be conducted by a team of economic and ecological specialists, will be to identify and define major policy issues concerning the state's physical environment and its use of its natural resources. Among the specific areas to be examined are the division of public lands between state, federal, and private holdings; leasing versus sale of public lands; and competing resource allocations.

"Alaska is in a period of dra matic and basic economic and social change," Victor Fischer, ISEGR director, explained in announcing the award of the grant

nouncing the award of the grant "The rapidity of change and the limited factual knowledge of the various development impacts upon and implications for the environment give this program a high urgency and importance to the future of Alaska."

HARVEST REPORT FORMS NOW AVAILABLE

Game harvest report tickets are now available at all license vendors and must be obtained prior to hunting for deer, moose, sheep, brown-grizzly bear and caribou, the Fish and Game Department reminded hunters last week.

The harvest report tickets replace the former tag system. The tickets are not attached to the animal but must be mailed to the Fish and Game Department within 15 days after the taken. Persons not taking the bag limit for the species is taken. Persons not taking the bag limit must mail the tickets within 15 days after the close of the season.

There is no charge for the harvest reports but non-residents still must purchase big game tags. The caribou harvest rereports are necessary only in game management units 9, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 20.

Sport fishing and hunting and guiding regulations for 1970-71 are now available at license vendors and Fish and Game Department offices. Tapping regulations are printed in a separate booklet this year and will be available soon.



land available for the construction of a new Babe Ruth diamond (which would also accomodate a local American Legion League team) but it has been impossible to get a group together to plan and work to-

ward the construction. The Little League District Tournamentisheld in Palmer GVe year because we don't have a field that is adequate for tournament play. Our Babe Ruth team plays ninety Our percent of their games in Anchorage because their field is sub-standard. We don't have a field for the American Legion and therefore our boys are split up and assigned to different teams in Anchorage

A good well rounded athletic program has proved over and over to be the best answer to the juvenile delinquency problem. Mother's don't want their boys getting hurt and so keep them away from such programs. In Eagle River we even had a teacher who told the boys they were to young to participate in an athletic program (Many boys stayed away because of their respect for this teacher). You hear about injuries to boys who are in athletic programs, but I think it would be very interesting to have a list of the serious injuries and even deaths that occur to the boys who are not in athletic programs...
JUST DURING THE HOURS
THAT THE ATHLETES ARE
AT PRACTICE OR PLAYING
THE GAME. How many boys are injured just fooling around on motor bikes, snow machines, a rough game of tag, or in cars just during the hours that they would have been at practice or competing in a well supervised sport. Idon't believe that there is any sport as dangerous to our youth as the time to "just fool around"?

I believe that it is time that this community (an it's Service Clubs) took a good hard look at whether it wants to be a community or just an area where a lot of people have a place to eat and sleep.



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

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
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
