



PHARMACY TO OPEN IN EAGLE RIVER



PHARMACIST, JIM WILKINS CHECKS HIS STOCK AS HE PREPARES FOR THE OPENING OF THE EAGLE RIVER PHARMACY.

EAGLE RIVER: A much needed service will come to the Greater Chugiak Area, with the opening of the Eagle River Pharmacy in the Shopping Center this Thursday.

The Pharmacy is owned and operated by Jim Wilkins, registered pharmacist.

In addition to being able to fill all prescriptions, the new pharmacy will carry a line of patent medicines, cosmetics, sundries, gift wrap and greeting cards etc.

Wilkins stated that he will have the prescription department complete, and expects to have the shelves stocked with staple drug items by the Thursday opening. Other departments will be stocked and open at the earliest opportunity. In addition to the items mentioned above, Wilkins is planning a gift line, and a film department and film developing service.

Wilkins, who lives in Birchwood with his wife Katie, has been in Alaska for one year.

His home state is Iowa, and he is a graduate of the University of Iowa, where he was a major in Pharmacy. He has been a practicing pharmacist for five years, and has worked at Fort Madison Iowa, Cedar Rapids Iowa and at Mount Vernon Washington. He has managed stores in the States, and has worked at the Downtown Rexal and Eastchester Drug Stores in Anchorage.

Wilkins stated that local residents may not only bring any new prescriptions to him to be filled, but can have prescriptions which they have in Anchorage drug stores transferred out here for their convenience. Instructions on the transfer of prescriptions appear in the Pharmacy ad elsewhere in this newspaper.

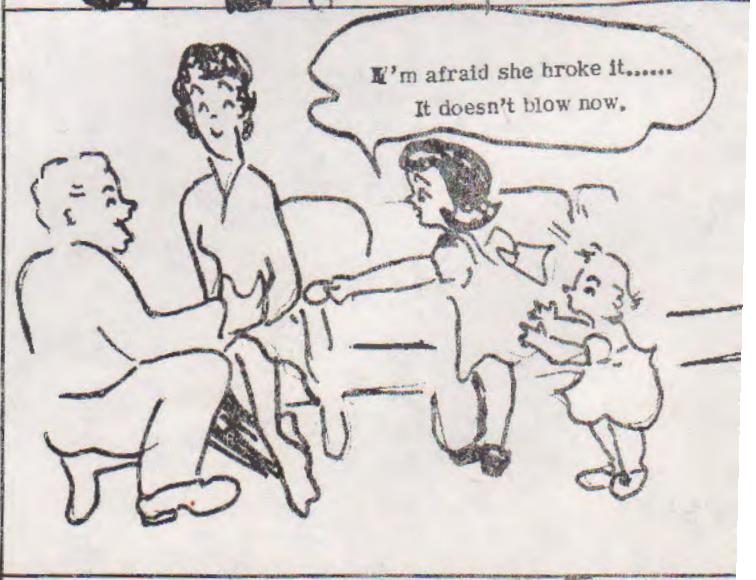

incident as reported by the parties who claimed to be the victims is inaccurate.

The man, a newcomer to the area, who asked that his name and address be withheld, said that while he heard the trail bikes quite a way down the road, he personally never saw them.

He said "If they saw us, they should have had enough sense to someone was intending to target practice, and should have made an effort to get out of the area, because they did not know how we handled our guns."

"Incidentally", he added, safety has always been a major factor in our shooting. Our two rifles, and one pistol were indeed high powered, as anyone could tell at a glance, and one of them was scoped."

In reference to a statement published which was credited to one of the cyclists saying, "They apparently made no effort to pause in their practice....", he countered, "We did not pause, because at that time we were walking around the dump to see what we could find. We weren't even shooting our guns. It was at least 30 minutes after we got out of the truck before even one shot was fired. When we finally did begin shooting about 25 rounds were fired in two bursts about 10 minutes apart. All shots were fired in rapid succession against a dirt back stop. How a bullet could hurt anyone when it was buried in dirt is beyond me."

In reference to the claim of one of the cyclists that she had been struck in the hip by one of the bullets, he said, "If the bullets from our guns had

hit this woman as claimed, she would have had a hell of a lot more than a bruised hip. It is my private opinion that she merely fell off her motor-bike".

SECURITY PATROL GETS SCHOOL CONTRACTS

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Security Patrol announced that they have been awarded the contract for patrolling the three elementary schools in the Greater Chugiak Area, and at Chugiak High School.

They also have the contract for patrolling the Fairgrounds at Palmer.

Dick Smerdon, head of the Security Patrol stated that he has hired three local young adults to act in the capacity of Auxiliary Patrolmen. They are Jerry and John Vanover, and Ralph Jones. They will be authorized badges and uniforms and to make arrests.

ANCHORAGE DRIVER HURT IN WRECK

EKLUTNA: The Chugiak ambulance responded to a call on Saturday, July 25th 1/2 mile north of Eklutna Flats on

the old Palmer Highway, and transported an injured Anchorage driver to Community Hospital.

FOUNDATION FUNDS SURVEY

A \$55,000 Ford Foundation grant for a survey of environmental and land-use policy issues in Alaska has been awarded the University of Alaska's Institute of Social, Economic and Government Research (ISEGR).

The purpose of the survey, to be conducted by a team of economic and ecological specialists, will be to identify and define major policy issues concerning the state's physical environment and its use of its natural resources. Among the specific areas to be examined are the division of public lands between state, federal, and private holdings; leasing versus sale of public lands; and competing resource allocations.

"Alaska is in a period of dramatic and basic economic and social change," Victor Fischer, ISEGR director, explained in announcing the award of the grant.

"The rapidity of change and the limited factual knowledge of the various development impacts upon and implications for the environment give this program a high urgency and importance to the future of Alaska."

HARVEST REPORT FORMS NOW AVAILABLE

Game harvest report tickets are now available at all license vendors and must be obtained prior to hunting for deer, moose, sheep, brown-grizzly bear and caribou, the Fish and Game Department reminded hunters last week.

The harvest report tickets replace the former tag system. The tickets are not attached to the animal but must be mailed to the Fish and Game Department within 15 days after the taken. Persons not taking the bag limit for the species is taken. Persons not taking the bag limit must mail the tickets within 15 days after the close of the season.

There is no charge for the harvest reports but non-residents still must purchase big game tags. The caribou harvest reports are necessary only in game management units 9, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 20.

Sport fishing and hunting and guiding regulations for 1970-71 are now available at license vendors and Fish and Game Department offices. Tapping regulations are printed in a separate booklet this year and will be available soon.

driven by an employee, Fred Baldwin of Palmer was unable to stop in time, and rammed into the VW driving it into the rear of the Lowe car.

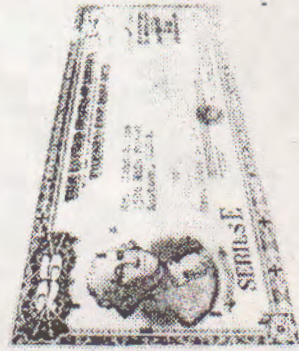
Damage to the Valiant was estimated at \$300, the pick-up at \$750 and the VW sustained an estimated \$800 damage.

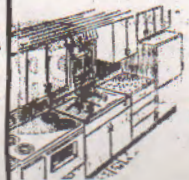

Following the service there will be a coffee hour where everyone will be able to meet and speak to Mr. Searby in the Fellowship Hall of the Church.

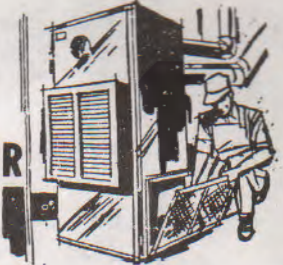

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



Dear Editor,

What has happened to the Community Spirit that it used to be able to ignite in our area? I don't know what the population increase has been in the Greater Chugiak Area since the earthquake, but it seems like it is at least triple what it was and is growing all the time. Yet when a call for a community project is made today it brings six or eight people where it used to bring sixty or eighty.

Right now I am thinking mainly of the sports programs and the facilities available for these programs to the young people of our area. A few years ago we had a good start with Little League diamonds, Babe Ruth diamonds and plans for expansion. Instead of improving and expanding these programs, the baseball diamonds have deteriorated to the point where they are practically useless and the expansion just isn't going on.

The Ladies Club has made land available for the construction of a new Babe Ruth diamond (which would also accommodate a local American Legion League team) but it has been impossible to get a group together to plan and work to-

ward the construction. The Little League District Tournament is held in Palmer every year because we don't have a field that is adequate for tournament play. Our Babe Ruth team plays ninety percent of their games in Anchorage because their field is sub-standard. We don't have a field for the American Legion and therefore our boys are split up and assigned to different teams in Anchorage.

A good well rounded athletic program has proved over and over to be the best answer to the juvenile delinquency problem. Mother's don't want their boys getting hurt and so keep them away from such programs. In Eagle River we even had a teacher who told the boys they were to young to participate in an athletic program (Many boys stayed away because of their respect for this teacher). You hear about injuries to boys who are in athletic programs, but I think it would be very interesting to have a list of the serious injuries and even deaths that occur to the boys who are not in athletic programs... JUST DURING THE HOURS THAT THE ATHLETES ARE AT PRACTICE OR PLAYING THE GAME. How many boys are injured just fooling around on motor bikes, snow machines, a rough game of tag, or in cars just during the hours that they would have been at practice or competing in a well supervised sport. I don't believe that there is any sport as dangerous to our youth as the time to "just fool around".

I believe that it is time that this community (an it's Service Clubs) took a good hard look at whether it wants to be a community or just an area where a lot of people have a place to eat and sleep.
