CHUGIAK STILL AGAINST UNIFICATION



NEW "NORTH EAGLE RIVER ACCESS ROAD" OPENS TO TRAFFIC THIS WEEK.

BIRCHWOOD: Unification is no more acceptable to the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area today than it was at the last October's election. This was the emphatic feeling evidenced by almost all of those who attended the public hearing of the Anchorage Charter Commission at Chugiak High School last Wednesday.

The feelings of most local residents were put into words by the first person to testify, Ed Willis, of Eagle River, who from the outset has been an opponent of unification.

Although Charter Commission Chairman, Clifford Groh introduced Willis as President of the GAAB Assembly, Willis corrected him and stated that he was there that night not in capacity of an Assemblyman, but as a private citizen and resident of the area.

He then outlined his major objections to the Charter as it was proposed, Willis first of all felt that the Commission had not allowed the public enough time to study the proposed charter before calling the Public Hearings. He felt that voter rights were being surrendered for the sake of a unified government. He pointed out that rural and suburban areas would have a reduced voice in the proposed unified municipality, and that taxes would go up with the acquiring of additional debts.

In the unified government, he stated, only 4 items could be referred to the people for vote. In the present 2nd class borough all items are referred to the voters.

He objected to the "at large" representation. He also objected that the Charter made no provision by which an area could legally withdraw from the unified municipality if the residents of that area wished to.

In reference to the last item, Groh stated that it was not within the powers of the Charter Commission to make such a provision, and that only the Local Boundary Commission could do this.

Speakers who followed Willis had much the same objections. With only one exception they stated that they were opposed to the principal of unification, and then went on to point out specific parts of the Charter which they opposed.

The "at large" representation was the main beef, with fears that the bonded indebtedness of the City of Anchorage would be palmed off on the rest of the area following a

NEW CONNECTOR ROAD OPEN

EAGLE RIVER: The new connector road between the old and new Glenn Highways at mile 15 1/2 was opened to traffic this week.

The new connector is designated as simply "North Eagle River Access Road", by the Department of Highways.

The intersection at the New Glenn Highway end of the connector is almost identical in design to that at the Artillery Road connector.

A project which calls for illumination of that intersection, along with four other intersections on the new highway is scheduled for completion by next November.

This new connector is expected to relieve the pressure on the Artillery Road access.

LOCAL HIGHWAY BIDS OPENED

CHUGIAK: The Alaska Department of Highways has opened bids for two projects to be started this summer in the Greater Chugiak Area.

Project Nos. RF-042-1(36), and RS-0559(3), involves putting seal coat on 8.3 miles of the Old Glenn Highway from Eagle River to Peters Creek.

Two bids were received, with Rogers & Babler Inc., being the apparent low bidder at the time of opening. The engineer's estimate was \$102,787.50.

The unchecked results of the bids were as follows: Rogers & Babler Inc. of Anchorage, \$107,589.00. Anchorage Asphalt Paving Company Inc. \$127,219.40.

The contract calls for a completion date of September 1,

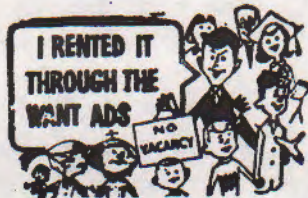
Mark Miller, son of the Director, says "Thank You", to

THE COMMUNITY QUESTION BOX

QUESTION: If the proposed Charter is accepted by the voters, and the Greater Chugiak Area becomes a part of the Unified Municipality of Anchorage, will our local Post Offices become a part of the Anchorage Post Office, or will they maintain their own identity?

ANSWER: Mr. Jones of the office of the Supervisor of the

Anchorage Post Office state that this would depend on if the Department decided that the local Post Offices could be operated more economically as branches of the Anchorage Post Office.

He said that it was entirely possible that both would be incorporated into the Anchorage Post Office, as was done in the case of Mt. View.

If that should happen, then local residents would receive their mail addressed to Anchorage.

close second. Many felt that the office of Mayor gave too much power to that official. One person commented that as it was written in the Charter, the Mayor of the Unified Municipality would be the most powerful public official in the State of Alaska.

Reese Tatro, of Peters Creek won a round of applause from those present when he spoke. Tatro told the Commission that he could remember when he homesteaded on Mirror Lake there were only two people between him and Anchorage. He called the proposed charter a dictatorship, and suggested, "Let's throw the whole thing out!"

Til Wallace, of Old Chugiak, put into words the thought that many there hesitated to. He said that his main objection was the loss of identity of the community, not so much the concern as to whether the new government would cost more in taxes or be more or less

efficient. He said that he felt that efficiency was overrated when compared with other considerations. He reminded those present that Hitler had operated one of the most efficient governments in history.

Even Harvey Pullen, of Eagle River, who had favored unification from the outset, spoke out against the proposed charter. He also objected to the "at large" representation, and said that he felt that debt distribution should be plainly spelled out in the charter.

Many others asked to be heard and all referred to points in the charter which they felt should be changed, leading Chairman Groh to remark that he felt that more people seated in that building had read the charter than had in the entire City of Anchorage.

Areas will be assigned for the census currently being taken for the Community Directory. All members are urged to attend.

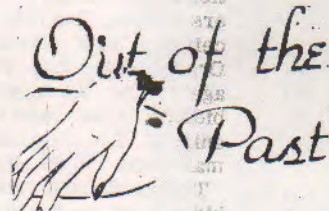
MYSTERY WRECK CAUSES TWO FALSE ALARMS

MIRROR LAKE FIRE IS OUT

PETERS CREEK: The Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company was called Monday afternoon to extinguish a peat fire at the Mirror Lake Wayside.

The fire was in the vicinity of the State Trooper's house trailer.

It was the opinion of a spokesman for the Fire Company that the fire had been started by a someone sometime over the July 4th weekend. They had apparently built a cookfire on the ground when they discovered all of the fireplace units were in use.

MEA ACCEPTS LOW BID

W. R. Grasl Co. of Anchorage is the apparent low bidder on MEA construction projects for the 1970 season, general manager Willard Johnson said today. Bids were opened yesterday afternoon.

The Grasl bid was \$338,447.40. Gustav Hirsch of Anchorage was the second low bidder with a figure of \$346,448.10; this was Rogers Electric Corp. with \$363,095.10, and fourth was Tye Construction with \$404,811.61. The engineer's estimate was \$373,000. Award of the contract is expected to be made at a special meeting of the board of directors on July 6.

The work to be done under terms of the contract includes construction of the new Walter Pippel substation at Eagle River, the rebuild of the Palmer substation, rebuild of the Palmer-Lucas transmission line construction of a new 115 kv transmission tie line at Eagle River, and miscellaneous work in the Eagle River, Lucas (Palmer) and Herning (Wasilla) substations, Johnson said.

Work is expected to get under way by mid-August, the manager said. Several short outages and one prolonged one will have to be scheduled in Palmer when the new 10,000 kva transformer is moved in to replace the 5,000 kva transformer in the Palmer substation, he added.

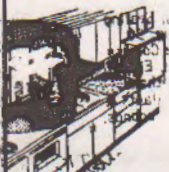

ANCHORAGE: Their largest

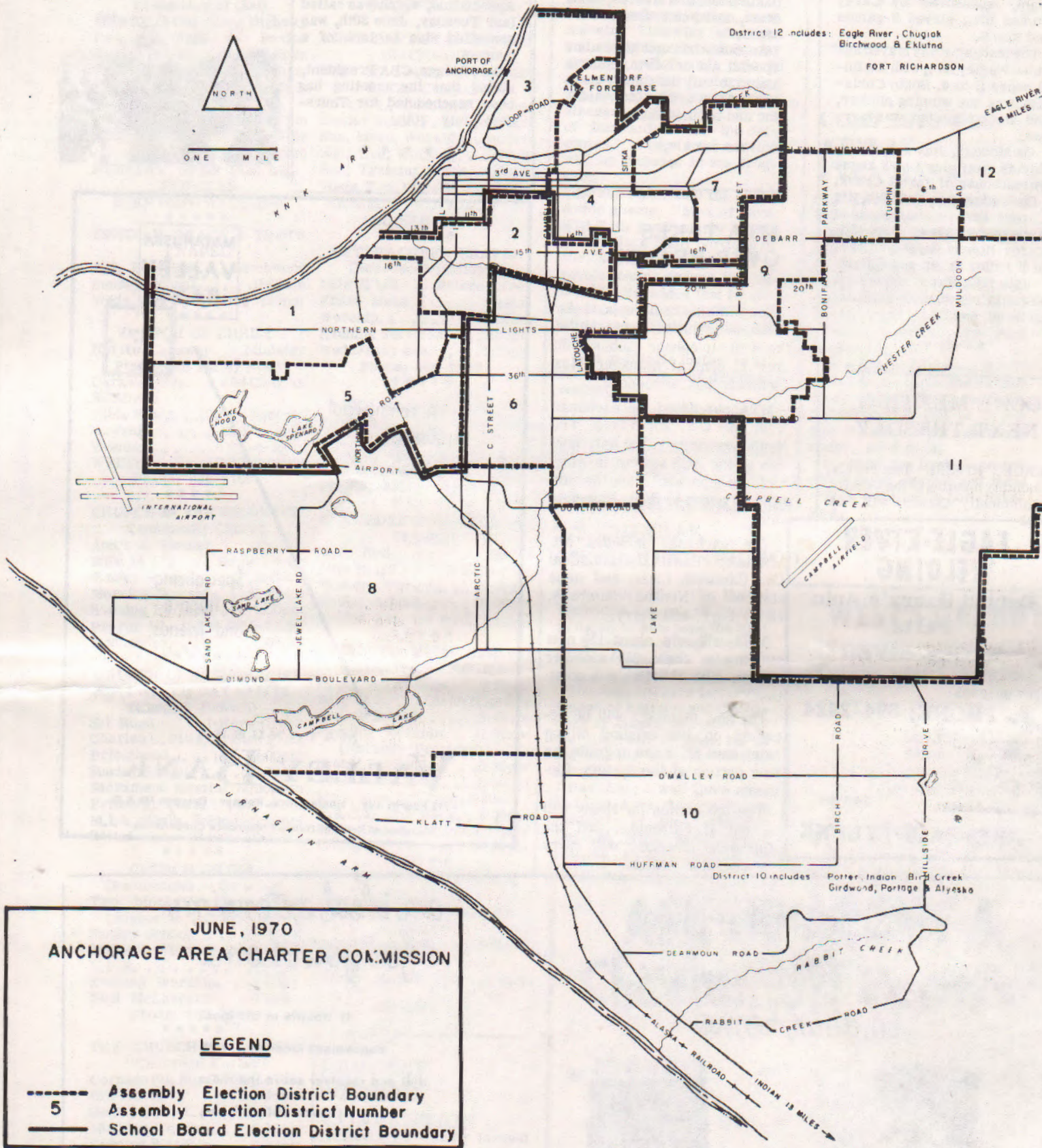

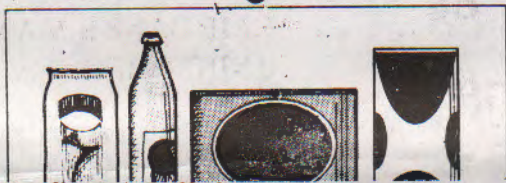

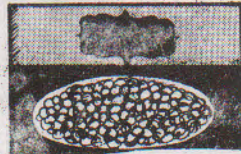
