EAGLE RIVER: The body of the pilot of a Piper J3 airplane which apparently crashed and burned near Pippen Lake at Mile 82, on the Richardson Highway has been identified as that of George Calvery, registered guide, of Eagle River. Both Calvery, and a client,

Ned Crain, of Grand Center Louisiana, apparently both died in the crash.

Calvery, who came to Alaska in 1960, had worked for the U.S. Post Office in Anchorage for 5 years before becoming a registered guide. He maintained a base camp at Lucy Lake, near Talkeetna.

Funeral arrangements are being handled by Forest Lawn Memorial Chapel. Visitation will be from 5pm until 8pm on Thursday, August 13th, with a Rosary said at 8:00pm. Services will be at St. Andrew's Catholic Church in Eagle River on Friday, August 14th, at 10:00am. Rev. Joseph Shirey SJ, will officiate.

Calvery, age 32, is survived by his wife Mary, a son James K., of Eagle River, and a sister Katherin Rich of Spokane, Washington.

Burial will be at the Valley Memory Gardens at Palmer.

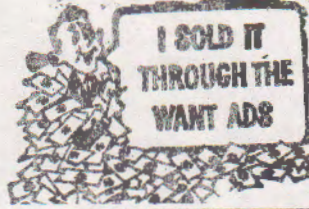

NEW MEA POLICY TOLD

Matanuska Electric Association has made a change to self-read cards to eliminate the extensive manual handling which was necessary with the old self-billing accounts. Member response has been good, the association reports but there have been some who have missed sending in readings every month.

The present policy of MEA is to estimate KWH usage for first month if no reading is sent to the office by the 5th of the month. If no reading is sent for the second month in succession, a serviceman is to be sent to the member's home to read the meter and there is a \$5 charge for this special trip. This policy will be put into effect with the August 1 reading.

Since the change to the meter reading cards is relatively new, the association has been sending letters, to those members from whom no reading was received, in an effort to remind them to send their meter readings in each month and avoid the extra expense of a meterman's trip to their home to read the meter.

MEA asks that if any member has not yet received the meter cards, please contact the office and a supply of cards will be mailed to them.

MEA announces that they do not want to send out a meter reader and cause this extra expense to the member as well as the Association. Members are requested to send their readings in promptly each month.

LOCAL HEAD START PROGRAM TO BEGIN

OLD CHUGIAK: The Chugiak area Head Start program will open September 8th, in the Chugiak Methodist Church.

Applications are now being taken at the GOAL Center in Eagle River, (694-2200)

The Head Start program is a pre-school program for four year olds who will be eligible for kindergarten the next school year. Classes are held from 9:00am to 12:30pm, including a hot lunch at the Church. There is no cost for this program.

Head Start is a federal program administered through the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The program is designed to expose the pre-school child to a variety of experiences that will stimulate his growth, mentally, as well as physically and emotionally.

This year for the first time, the Chugiak Area program will be administered locally, independently from Anchorage as a GOAL project. The Head Start office will be in the Chugiak Methodist Church and the phone number is 688-2660. As of August 24th, Mrs. Betty McCormick, the Program Director, and Mrs. Jan Lindeman, the Family Program Coordinator, will be av-

liable to meet interested parents on appointment. The whole community is encouraged to take interest in this new local program.

REGISTRATION INFO. FOR CHS

CHUGIAK: All students who are in grades 7 through 12 who are new to the Greater Chugiak Area should register for classes at Chugiak High School on August 17th and 18th from 9:00am to 4:00pm, or from 7:00pm to 9:00pm.

Any student not registering at those times will be required to register when school opens and many courses will not be available at that late date due to full enrollment.

Students are requested to bring report cards from their former school to enable the counselors to schedule them into proper classes.

Fees may be paid at this time which may include; Towel Fee - \$5.00, Art Fee - \$5.00, Shop Fee - \$5.00.

Students will also be able to pay for the Student Activity Card if they wish to purchase one and the cost this year will be \$10.00. A student will be able to realize a savings of approximately \$30.00 by purchasing an activity card, which entitles him to all home games, musical and dramatic events. This includes hockey games at the Arena and football games at the Stadium when CHS is the home team.

A \$2.00 may be made for the 1971 yearbook, the "Mustang Roundup", for students wishing to purchase one. The cost of the book this year will be \$7.00.

Dates for Schedule pick-up for all students will be announced at a later date, at which time returning students may then pay their fees, purchase an Activity Card and put a deposit on their Yearbook.

FIGHT AGAINST CRIME PROPOSED

A program for "a renewed national commitment against crime," has been proposed by U.S. Senate candidate Joe Josephson.


In a statement issued Monday, the Democratic candidate called for tax incentives to employers in the private sector to encourage employment of ex-prisoners; federal construction aid for state jails and prisons, modeled after the federal hospital assistance program; creation of a higher education facility for public safety careers; and additional probation workers to give adequate supervision of ex-prisoners and detailed advice to judges at the time of sentencing.

Josephson also cited need for better vocational and educational opportunities for young men and women, saying that "almost 80 per cent of federal felony inmates failed to complete high school, and that over 50 per cent of such inmates had no high school attendance at all."

In an earlier position paper, Josephson had advocated more judges to shorten the interval between arrest and trial, research into crime detection and prevention, a reassessment of criminal codes and more research into penal institution management.

"The solutions I propose," the candidate said, "are not easy. Some are expensive. But they are practical and realistic - not simplistic appeals to emotion and prejudice.

"A real commitment against crime does not involve shortcuts from the traditional rights guaranteed all Americans, or simplistic solutions."



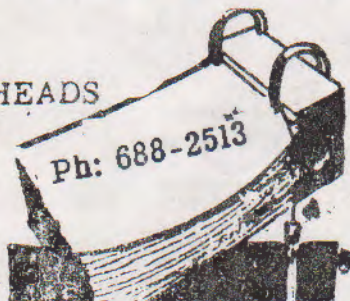

HUNTING SEASON OPENS

Hunting season for sheep and caribou opened Monday in several game management units in the state.

Sheep season opened in units six, nine, 11 through 17 and 19 and 20. An experimental ewe sheep hunt also opened on Crescent Mountain in game management unit seven on the Kenai Peninsula at Cooper Landing. Hunting there is allowed by permit only.

Caribou season also opened in units eight, nine and ten.

Sheep season, Department of Fish and Game personnel said, should be good with no extreme herd fluctuations reported this year. All herds, a Department spokesman said, are reported increased over past years.

Caribou season, the spokesman said, should also be good in all units with herd populations high.

First week hunters, the spokesman said, should look for the animals in the higher areas of the Talkeetna Mountain range and the Alaska Mountain ranges. The animals will remain in higher areas, the spokesman said, until forced to move lower by snow.

Few caribou are reported along the Denali Highway, the spokesman said, although some are in the area of the Taylor Highway.

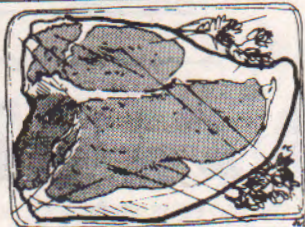

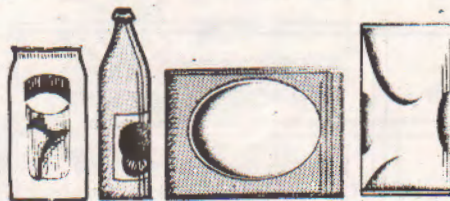
