CHARTER VOTE DATE IS SET

ANCHORAGE: The date for the election for adoption of the Charter for the Unified Municipality of Anchorage has been set for October 6th, according to Ed Willis, Assemblyman from the Greater Chugiak Area, and President of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough, Assembly,

Willis sald the date was set Tuesday afternoon at a con-tinuation of the Assembly meeting of Monday night.

HEARING ON BOROUGH BUILDING CODE CALLED

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Area Borough has scheduled a public hearing on August 17, on a Boroughwide building code.

Some opposition to the Borough's adopting building regulations is expected.

The City of Anchorage, which has operated under an effective building code for many years, is loath to surrender any authority in this area. At the other end of the scale are some rural residents who feel building codes are an unnecessary refinement.





NEW MEA POLICY TOLD

Matanuska Electric Association has made a change to selfread cards to eliminate the extensive manual handling which was necessary with the old selfbilling accounts. Member response has been good, the association reports but there have been some who have missed sending in readings month.

The present policy of MEA is to estimate KWH usage for first month if no reading is sent to the office by the 5th of the month. If no reading is sent for the second month in succession, a serviceman is to be sent to the member's home to read the meter and there is a \$5 charge for this special trip. This policy. will be put into effect with the August 1 reading.

Since the change to the meter reading cards is relatively new the association has been sending letters, to those members from whom no reading was received, in an effort to remind them to send their meter readings in each month and avoid the extra expense of a meterman's trip to their home to read the meter.





FIGHT AGAINST CRIME PROPOSED

A program for "a renewed national commitment a ainst crime," has been proposed by Senate candidate Joe U.S. Josephson.

In a statement issued Monday, the Democratic candidate called for tax incentives to employers in the private sector to encourage employment of ex-prisoners; federal construction aid for state jails and prisons, modeled after the federal hospital assistance program; creation of a higher education facility for public safety careers; and additional probation workers to give adequate supervision of ex-prisoners and detailed advice to judges at the time of sentencing.

Josephson also cited need for better vocational and educational opportunities for young men and women, stying that "almost 80 per cent of federal felony inmates failed to complete high school, and that over 50 per cent of such inmates had no high school attendance at


In an earlier position paper. Josephson had advocared more judges to shorten the interval between arrest and trial, research into crime detection and prevention, a reassment of criminal codes and more research into penal




I advise never to bring up the subject of that unfortunate experiment again, Idoubt if he will ever ask a hostess to share her recipies with you
