LOCAL VOTERS GET THE WORD

CHUGIAK: Chugiak Area voters will go to the polls next Tuesday, August 25th, along with the rest of the state to cast their ballots in the State Primary election.

Following are the polling places for the five local precincts.

Precincts 147 and 148 (Eagle River and Eagle River Valley) will both vote at the Eagle River Elementary School.

Precinct 149 (Chugiak) will vote at the Chugiak Elementary School.

Precinct No. 150, (Birchwood) will vote at the Chuglak High School.

Precinct 151 (Peters Creek) will vote at the Peters Creek Service Station.

Polls open at 8:00am and will close at 8:00pm.

Voters are reminded that only those who pre-registered prior to August 11th, will be permitted to vote in this election. Registration acknowledgement cards were sent to all who pre-registered, but the voter does not have to present these cards at the polls in order to be allowed to vote.

In addition to selecting candidates for State and Federal office, voters will be asked to vote on five propositions.

Proposition 1, concerns lowering the minimum voting age to 18. Proposition 2, concerns eliminating the speaking of English as a qualification to vote. Proposition 3, asks to change the designation of Secretary of State, "to Lieutenant Governor. Proposition 4, deals with the election of Chief Justice by Superior Court. Proposition 5, concerns the term of office of Judicial system administrator.

All candidates on the ballot will be listed in alphabetical order, with the party they represent following each one. Voters may choose candidates from either party providing they do not exceed the total number of candidates allowed.

LOCAL LIBRARY ENLARGED

EAGLE RIVER: The public library, located in the Eagle River Shopping Center recently underwent re-modeling which has enlarged the facilities by one third, and added room for approximately 5,000 books (pending arrival of the shelves.)

The library has moved five times since it opened in 1965. At the present time there are 1850 family cards in circulation.

In addition to adding many new books to the shelves, the collection of phonograph records which may be checked out has been increased.

The Library which, started originally under a Federal grant, is now supported by the taxpayers of the area under the borough area-wide library program.

Library cards are issued free to all residents of the Greater Chugiak Area upon request.

DOG BITES BIRCHWOOD CHILD

BIRCHWOOD: A ten year old Birchwood boy was taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital last Saturday, after being bitten in the leg by a neighbor's dog.

The child, James L. Chevert, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Hedden, of Helluva Rd.

According to Mr. Earl Young Chief Animal Control Officer for the Greater Anchorage Area Borough, the dog which bit the boy was a Huskey and Shepard mix, was unlicensed and unvaccinated. Young said the dog belonged to a Mr. Pepsinger, who lives in that area.

Young personally investigated the incident, and stated it had taken six hours of investigation before the identity of the dog was established and the animal located.

The dog has been impounded by Chugiak area dog catcher, Worth Trent, and is presently

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HIGHWAY FENCES...NOT A DEAD ISSUE

It is almost a year since the old Glenn Highway was fenced off by the Highway Department, but there is reason to believe that residents of the Greater Chugiak Area have not learned to live happily with the situation.

The prediction that highway businesses would be hurt by the fences has been proven to be true. Most any merchant who depended upon highway trade for a part of his income can quote just how much their business has fallen off during the past year.

Loss of trade is only a part of the reason for the continued discontent where the new highway is concerned.

During the year that it has been in use, many shortcomings in design have come to light; some of them constituting out and out traffic hazards.

Visibility at the approaches of intersections are very poor, and even the lighting systems which were promised, but still have not been installed will do little to change a situation where a built in hump in the road keeps cars at the intersection from seeing oncoming traffic until it is almost upon them.

Many voices have been raised wondering why the State has failed to do anything about the death trap north of the old Peters Creek bridge. Despite the fact that there have been at least four serious accidents where unwary motorists have crashed their cars into the earthen barrier which was thrown up across the road just south of the chain link fence, there are still insufficient warning signs, no lights nor anything to prevent further such accidents. It appears it

may be only a matter of time before there is a fatal accident at that location.

There are many questions which are being asked by local residents. "When will the Highway Department make the changes at the Artillery Road intersection which they admitted were necessary?"

"When is the new lighting system going to be installed?" "When the first rain showed that the new Mile 15 connector would not drain water, why did five pieces of Department of Highway equipment show up to install culverts to drain them. Was this an engineering error, or the fault of the contractor; and who stood the expense of the repair?"

"When the Highway Department admits that the traffic at the intersection of the old Glenn Highway north of the old Peters Creek bridge could be merged into existing highway with no major problem, why do they refuse to remove that dirt berm and fence which already have sent five people to the hospital with serious injuries?"

The conclusion which many have reached, is that the present administration, having taken their stand, now are afraid to lose face by admitting that in a few instances they may have been wrong.

The only hope for any help for area residents appears to be with a new administration who are not bound to perpetuate the mistakes of the present one.

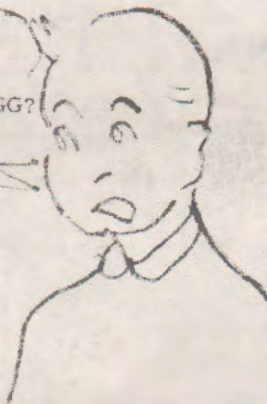

NEW BUILDING AT PALMER FAIR

A new building now being erected on the Alaska State Fair grounds will house exhibits and additional restrooms, manager Carly Sutton said this week.

The building is expected to be ready for occupancy by fair time, Sutton said.

A new water well has been drilled on the grounds to supply the building and restrooms, Sutton said.

The midway this year will feature all new rides for the fair, many of them first-timers in Alaska as well, the manager noted.

He called attention to the season ticket books, an eleven-day bargain for only \$5, and added that daily prizes will be awarded on the basis of drawings from these tickets from the season book. All the tickets will go back into a central pot for the grand prize at the close of the fair—a piano.

A Pepsi-Cola promotion is also providing discount gate tickets and ride tickets, Sutton said.

SENATE FORMS YOUTH CORPS

The Senate has adopted legislation creating the Youth Conservation Corps, which will give youths an opportunity to work in the great outdoors during the summer months, Alaska Senator

Ted Stevens has announced.

Stevens said the abandoned military sites in Alaska can be used to house the Corps, thus allowing implementation of the program in Alaska without the need to build additional housing facilities for the Corps.

The bill, which was introduced by Stevens and Senator Henry M. Jackson of Washington, authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture and the Secretary of the Interior to hire young people between the ages of 15 and 19 for periods up to 90 days to work in national parks, national forests, and other recreational and conservation facilities.



SEPTEMBER 1 BISON HUNT DEADLINE

The deadline for mailing applications for the permit bison hunt at Delta Junction is midnight, Sept. 1, the Fish and Game Department reminded hunters this week.

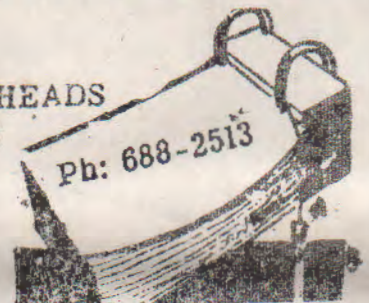
Applications are available at Fish and Game offices in Fairbanks, Delta Junction, Anchorage, Glennallen, McGrath and Tok.

Each of the 20 persons drawn for the hunt must pass a weapon handling and marksmanship test which will be administered by the department at Delta Junction on the morning of each day of the hunt.

Fathers who plan on submitting applications for younger inexperienced members of their families should keep this new requirement in mind, the department said.

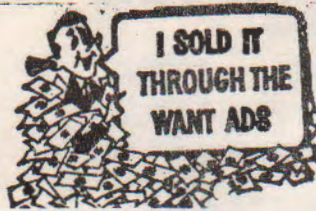

Young has asked that residents of the Greater Chugiak Area be reminded that although they live in the "country", they are still subject to the Borough Animal Control laws, which state that dogs must not only have rabies immunization shots and be licensed, but must be under the control of the owner at all times, and not permitted to run loose.



STILL NOT TO LATE TO REGISTER FOR CHARTER ELECTION

CHUGIAK: While the deadline has passed for registration for those who would vote in the August 25th, State Primary Election, those who failed to meet that deadline are not ruled out of voting at the October 6th Charter Election.

According to State Law, a voter must be pre-registered not less than fourteen days from the election in which he wishes to vote. A spokesman for the Committee for the Preservation of the Second Class Borough pointed out that voters still have until September 22nd to register for voting against the Charter.

LOCAL HEAD START PROGRAM TO BEGIN

OLD CHUGIAK: The Chugiak area Head Start program will open September 8th, in the Chugiak Methodist Church.

Applications are now being taken at the GOAL Center in Eagle River, (694-2200)

The Head Start program is a pre-school program for four year olds who will be eligible for kindergarten the next school year. Classes are held from 9:00am to 12:30pm, including a hot lunch at the Church. There is no cost for this program.

Head Start is a federal program administered through the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The program is designed to expose the pre-school child to a variety of experiences that will stimulate his growth, mentally, as well as physically and emotionally.

This year for the first time, the Chugiak Area program will be administered locally, independently from Anchorage as a GOAL project. The Head Start office will be in the Chugiak Methodist Church and the phone number is 688-2660. As of August 24th, Mrs. Betty McCormick, the Program Director, and Mrs. Jan Lindeman, the Family Program Coordinator, will be available to meet interested parents on appointment.

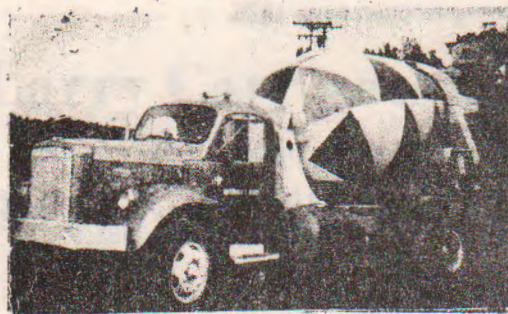

Sample Primary Election Ballot

AUGUST 25, 1970

- Mark only by use of cross marks, "X" marks, checks, or plus signs. Place marks at the left of the names of candidates for whom you desire to vote.
- Mark must be inside or touching the square so as to indicate the intent of the voter. Erasures and corrections will invalidate only that part of the ballot in which they appear.
- Do not vote for more than the indicated number of names for each office.

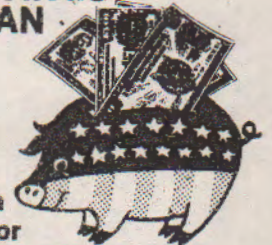
A campaign to register any voters who failed to register by the August 11th primary deadline is planned.

CHUGIAK: Success of the recent Girls Slow-Pitch Softball season has led to plans for a team next year for older girls and women.

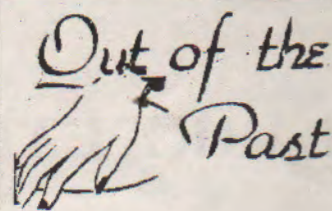
This will be for girls who will be age 14 prior to August 15th, of 1971.

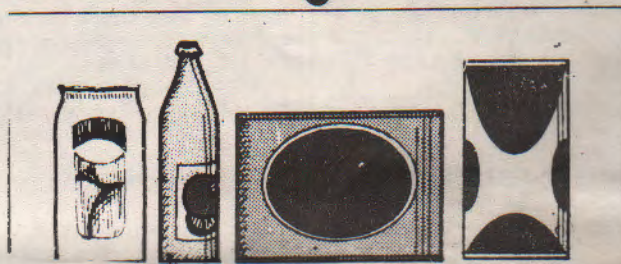
