CAR WRECKED IN HIGH SPEED CHASE

AARP PRESIDENT TO VISIT HERE

ANCHORAGE: Chugiak area members of the AARP (American Association of Retired Persons) are advised of the arrival of Mr. Foster J. Pratt National President elect, who is presently touring Alaska.

PETERS CREEK: An Anchorage driver and his young wife miraculously escaped injury in an accident which followed a high speed chase by the Alaska State Troopers.

The chase took place during a routine patrol when a State Trooper tried to stop a traffic violator.

The driver of the 1969 Ford attempted to outrun the trooper, and at times the speeds exceeded 125 miles per hours.

The chase ended when the car left the road at high speed at approximately Mile 23, skidded 300 feet and rolled over.

The driver, Wesley W. Hood of Anchorage, was arrested for reckless driving and transported to the State jail.

The chase took place at 2am on Tuesday morning.

The Military Police from Fort Richardson and the State Troopers from Palmer were all called in and responded.

NOMINATIONS ASKED FOR CHUGIAK BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

CHUGIAK: Nominations are now open for the Board of Supervisors for the Chugiak Fire Service Area.

Petitions must be filed no later than 5:00pm on September 4, 1970 in the Clerk's office.

Candidates must be qualified voters residing within the service area.

BIRCHWOOD MAN FILES FOR SCHOOL BOARD

BIRCHWOOD: A Chugiak area resident has filed a petition for election to the Anchorage Borough School Board.

Gary Earl Redmond, who is a resident of Jayhawk Drive in Birchwood is the candidate. Voters will elect two school board members at the October 6th election.

Candidate petitions must be filed with the borough clerk by September 4th.

AMBULANCE WASTES DAY CHASING FALSE ALARM

EKLUTNA: The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance spent the better part of Sunday afternoon chasing around the Eklutna area in what appeared to be a response to a false alarm.

The Ambulance crew was contacted by the Alaska State Troopers and told that a report of an accident with injuries had taken place on the Eklutna Flats.

The ambulance driver found no sign of any accident at that point, and continued driving around the area and up some side roads but still no sign of any accident was found.

The State Troopers also attempted to determine if the directions might have been faulty, but finally decided that report had been a false alarm and the call was cancelled.

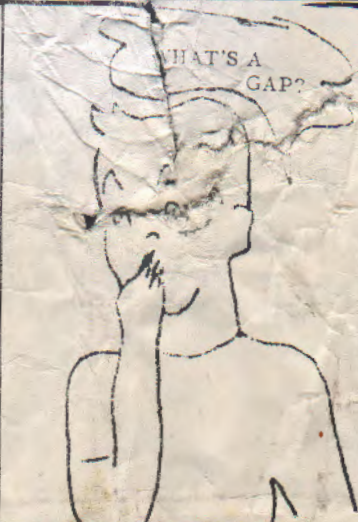

He worked for seven years with Ford in automotive parts in Seattle, and for the past 4 years has worked for Automotive Parts and Equipment in Anchorage.

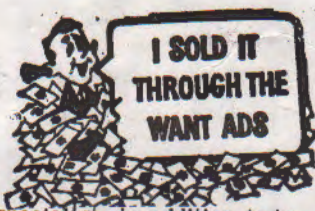

NONE CITED IN ACCIDENT

EAGLE RIVER: No citations were given following a two car accident which took place last Saturday evening at Mile 14 1/2 on the Old Glenn Highway.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, a 1964 Ford pick-up driven by John P. Opera Jr., of Anchorage has slowed and was starting to make a left hand turn. A SURE WAY TO RUIN A TIRE

Surveys have shown that many as two out of three standard tires, run even short distances while flat, are damaged beyond repair.

"Punctures, nail holes, or cuts up to one-quarter of an inch confined to the tread, may be repaired permanently only from the inside of the tire," advised Kent Stoner, regional manager of the Allstate Insurance Companies.

Stoner warns motorists against using temporary repairs such as "blowout" patches or other repairs made from the outside of the tire, except in emergencies. "Such stop-gap devices as plugs and aerosol-type sealants are only good for up to 100 miles of driving speeds not over 60 hours per hour," he said.

"When temporary repairs are used, permanent vulcanized repairs, plug and patch applied from the inside of the tire, should be made as soon as possible," the Allstate manager said.

Stoner also warned, "Don't let the fear of ruining a tire cause you a serious crash on the road. When changing a flat tire, pull your car off the road as far as possible. Many tire changes risk their lives because they don't drive a few extra feet on a flat. A tire can be repaired, your life can't."

U OF A TO HOLD NUTRITION CONFERENCE

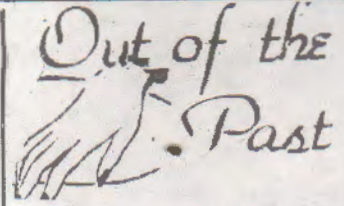
The Cooperative Extension Service of the University of Alaska is sponsoring a Nutrition Education Conference at UAF from September 14 through 18, 1970.

The increased concern about nutrition highlights a need for up-dating knowledge and for an assessment of the pertinent roles of each agency and of each professional working in the field of nutrition education. James W. Matthews, Associate Director of Cooperative Extension indicated in announcing the conference.

Alaska is especially privileged to have Professor George Barta, Foods and Nutrition, Oregon State University conduct this non-credit conference on nutrition education. Professor Barta has an international background of experience and is admirably prepared to broaden knowledge toward strengthening continuing nutrition education in Alaska, Matthews added.

The conference is intended for persons involved in administering nutrition educational programs or interested in areas of related subject matter. A registration fee of 30 dollars is scheduled to cover instructional costs. Living arrangements are the responsibility of participants but assistance in locating facilities will be given if requested.

Dr. Charles Lafferty of the Division of the Statewide Services of the University of Alaska is coordinating arrangements and will answer requests for further information, according to Matthews.

The census is to secure information for the latest edition of the Community Directory which the Ladies Club is going to publish.

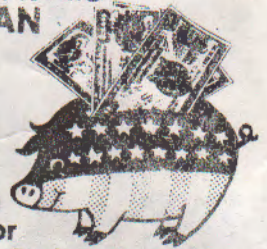

DON OLSON TO HEAD NEW SCHOOL PROGRAM

ANCHORAGE: Mr. Don Olson former principal of the Eagle River Elementary School, and a resident of the Chugiak Area has been appointed by the Anchorage school district as Project Director for a new program, according to Mr. Joe Montgomery, Acting Superintendent.

Mr. Olson will assume the duties of his new post immediately. An Educational Analyst for the program is yet to be named. Mr. Olson joined the Anchorage Borough School District in 1958 and has served since as principal in various schools. He began his educational career in 1950. He holds a Master's degree in Education from the University of Oregon.

Principals of various schools will soon be making announcements to parents of the children attending those schools for preliminary selection to participate in the new program.

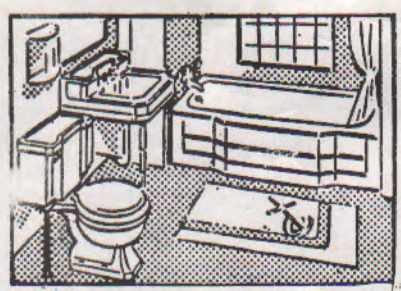

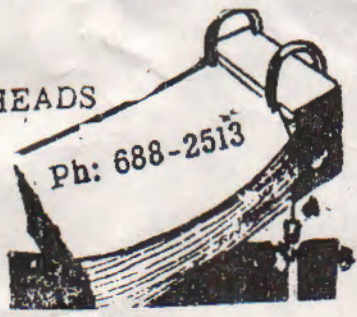

FOOD STAMP SAFEGUARDS ARE SOUGHT

Alaska Senator Ted Stevens recently introduced legislation creating important safeguards against abuse of the Food Stamp program.

There have been a number of instances in Alaska where young, able-bodied people from the South 48 have been purchasing food with government-issued food stamps. Some of these young people are perfectly healthy and able to work, but they have decided to take a vacation, partly at the expense of the American and Alaskan taxpayer.

Stevens' bill would require all able-bodied adults between 18 and 65 to register with local state employment offices and to accept available employment. The work requirement would not apply to mothers with dependent children and no one would be required to work for less than the federal minimum wage or for a company which is involved in a labor dispute.

This requirement should restrict food stamps to those who really need them — the unemployed who cannot get work — and will stop some people on a perpetual vacation from living on the taxpayers.

BILL TO INCREASE VETS COMPENSATION

A bill signed by President Nixon recently will provide additional compensation for thousands of Northwest veterans disabled during military service, John B. Kirsch, Director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office here, said today.

Director Kirsch said the 8 to 12 percent increases will be retroactive to July 1.

He said veterans will receive their regular monthly checks for August on September 1, computed at the old rate. Later, in early September, most veterans will receive another check which will reflect the retroactive increases for July and August. The following month — on October 1 — regular monthly checks will include the increases.

Kirsch stressed that since the increased payments are automatic, veterans need not contact the VA to receive them.

He said the 12 percent increase goes to totally disabled veterans, including those who also receive additional compensation for such disabilities as deafness, blindness, and the loss of — or loss of use of — arms and feet.

Under the new rates, compensation to veterans with a 100 percent disability rating will be raised from \$400 to \$450 a month.

Those with a 90 percent rating will be increased from \$226 to \$250 a month; 80 percent disability, \$201 to \$223; 70 percent, \$174 to \$193; 60 percent, \$147 to \$163, and 50 percent, \$122 to \$135.

The additional allowances for dependents of veterans rated 50 percent or more, also are being increased, Kirsch said.

Other increases are as follows: 40 percent, \$89 to \$96; 30 percent, \$65 to \$70; 20 percent, \$43 to \$46; and 10 percent, \$23

to \$25 a month.

The new law also permits retrogression to compensation for the remarried widows of veterans whose remarriages end in death or divorce. This provision becomes effective next January 1.

Kirsch said another provision which would affect comparatively few veterans, would presume certain illnesses of former prisoners of war during World War II, the Korean Conflict, and the Vietnam era to be service-connected for purposes of compensation payments.

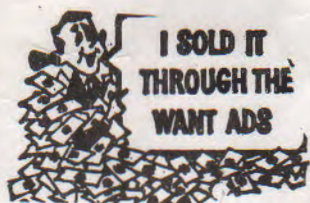
