ANTI-CHARTER FORCES JOIN FOR BATTLE

OLD CHUGIAK: Leonard Peck, Anchorage City Councilman and opponent of the proposed Charter, spoke to a large group at the Chugiak Methodist Church last Thursday night.

Peck outlined his reasons for opposing the Charter, and expressed optimism that the Chugiak Area vote could be strong enough to bring about its defeat. He said that a big turnout at the Chugiak poll with most voting against the Charter could possibly count as a reason for this area to ask exclusion, even if the Charter should pass.

The Committee for the Preservation of the Second Class Borough, who sponsored the meeting, reported that they are launching an all out campaign to urge the charter's defeat.

In addition to placing a number of large plywood signs in the rural as well as in some downtown areas, they have a large number of leaflets and cards and bumper stickers to be distributed. Newspaper advertising and numerous TV appearances are also planned.

Representatives from rural areas elsewhere in the Borough, such as Muldoon and Spenard, attended the meeting and pledged their support to the campaign.

Getting the voters to the polls appeared to be the primary concern in the local area, and a telephone campaign to urge every registered voter "get out and vote", will be a main project for the CFPSC during the final days before the October 6th election.

There will be a meeting of CFPSCB on Thursday, October 1st, to map this final effort.

The meeting will be held at the Chugiak Methodist Church starting at 8:00pm. All persons who want to help in any way are urged to come to the meeting.

OLD CHUGIAK: Local Rodeo fans will have the opportunity to see the last event of the season, with the Alaska State Finals to be held at the Chugiak Rodeo Arena this coming weekend, September 26th and 27th.

The show starts at 2:00pm on each day. Admission is \$2.00 for adults, \$1.00 for children under 12, and pre schoolers admitted free.

CHS VANDALS METED UNIQUE PUNISHMENT

BIRCHWOOD: The old song about "Making the punishment fit the crime", was very appropriate in the case of the vandalism at Chugiak High School last Friday night.

A spokesman for the Chugiak Security Patrol stated that sometime after the school dance vandals had plastered the outside of the building with approximately 60 dozen eggs. Also the grounds were littered with the egg shells and egg cartons.

The Security Patrolman said that this apparently took place within a short period between his patrols. The Security Patrol has the contract for patrolling the grounds and buildings of all three local elementary schools and Chugiak High School.

time of the burglary as happening between 3:30pm and 5:00pm. A neighbor had the window in his sight up until 3:30. Mr. and Mrs. Burns returned home from work at 5pm.

The items taken included a sheath knife in a scabbard, a revolver, a watch, a turquoise ring, and a carved head and a figurine, both of obsidian, which had been purchased in Mexico. The knife was described as having a reddish brown handle.

Mrs. Burns stated that they called the Alaska State Troopers, but were told by the dispatcher that it would not be investigated. They were told, "it isn't any use to investigate we've already had one out in that area today."

Major Dankworth, of the Alaska State Troopers, stated

when he was informed of the dispatcher's reply. "I feel sure there must have been some misunderstanding". He said the report of the Burns burglary had been written up and had been turned over to Investigator Roger Benson. He said that Investigator Benson had been tied up at the State Crime Conference all last week, and had been unable to get out to talk to the Burns, but that he was planning to conduct an investigation of the burglary at his earliest convenience.

Dankworth said that the dispatcher whom the Burns had spoken to was not on duty at the time, but he stated that no employee at the State Trooper's office was authorized to give any such reply to a citizen reporting a crime. He said that he intended to check the matter out.

Mrs. Burns said that their prime concern was that the revolver which had been taken was a very old weapon, and the ammunition in it was very old.

She and her husband felt that the burglary was the work of juveniles, as many valuable items had been passed up. She was afraid that some child might attempt to fire the gun and be seriously injured if the outdated ammunition should misfire. She hoped that whoever had taken the gun would see this item in the Courier and be forewarned.



DEADLINE FOR SCHOLARSHIPS PROGRAM TOLD

The Chief of Naval Personnel has set Dec. 1, as the application deadline date for the NROTC College Scholarship Program. Parents and high school officials should remind eligible high school seniors and graduates to submit their applications before the deadline date.

The NROTC College Scholarship Program offers an outstanding opportunity for a young man to gain a regular commission while studying at one of the many NROTC colleges and universities. The Navy furnishes tuition, fees, books, and uniforms, plus a subsistence allowance of \$50 per month to NROTC midshipmen. Each summer NROTC midshipmen go on interesting and rewarding at-sea training periods. After completing his college course and all military requirements, an NROTC midshipman is commissioned as a regular officer in the U.S. Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty with the operating forces.

Applicants for this program will be considered based on scores obtained on either the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) of the College Entrance Examination Board (CEEB), Princeton, New Jersey or the American College Test (ACT) of the American College Testing Program, Iowa City, Iowa, in lieu of the Navy College Aptitude Test (NCAT) previously utilized. Applicants for the 1971 NROTC College Scholarship Program must:

Apply for and take either test specified above at their own expense prior to Dec. 31, 1970.

Arrange with the appropriate testing agency for the submission of their scores to the NROTC College Scholarship Program.

Apply for the NROTC Scholar-

ship Program no later than Dec. 1, 1970 in accordance with the 1971 Bulletin of Information.

The 1971 NROTC Bulletins of Information and application forms are available from local high school counselors, the Navy Recruiting Office, Lathrop Building, Fairbanks.

PLAN WOULD FUND WATER & SEWER SURVEYS

Governor Keith H. Miller announced today that the application for Phase I of a two-part statewide comprehensive plan for water and sewer has been submitted to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Farmers Home Administration, in Portland, Ore.

Governor Miller said that the planning program will involve comprehensive water and sewer planning studies for all communities and villages in the State, ranging in size from at least five occupied dwelling units to those with a population of 5,500 or less.

The Governor added that the program administration will be provided by the state Planning and Research Division with technical support coming from a number of Alaskan-based planning and engineering consulting firms as well as affected state and federal governmental agencies.

The basic objective of the plan will be to provide the information necessary to avoid overlapping, duplication, underdesign or overdesign of water and sewer facilities. To accomplish this, studies will be conducted on the population and economic characteristics of each community or village and an analysis made of its growth potential. An inventory will then be made of existing water and sewer facilities, or lack of, and recommendations will be made for needed improvements, the Governor said.

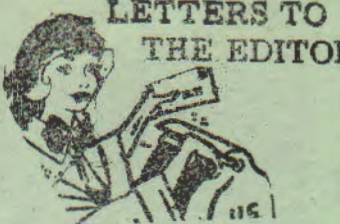

An investment has been laid aside by this community would be foolish at this time, especially since the area is already known to be marginal as to even an adequate water supply.

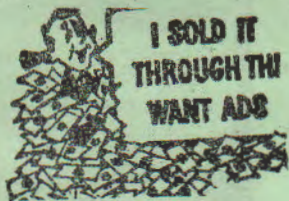

LOAN HELP IS ASKED FOR ALASKANS

Governor Keith H. Miller this week called upon the Bureau of the Budget to assist the Farmers Home Administration by making an administrative change that would allow more Alaskans to qualify for housing loans.

He made the request in a telegram to Robert P. Mayo, director of the Bureau of the Budget.

"This fiscal year the Farmers Home Administration is limited to approving housing loans only in the low to moderate income level and at present your Bureau has set a limit of \$12,000 or under that a person can earn in one year before he can qualify for a low-interest rate loan to build a home," the Governor said.

"I urge you to consider raising the limit to \$16,000 so that more Alaskans would become eligible for the much-needed loans to build homes in towns under 5,500 population or in rural areas of Alaska," Miller said.

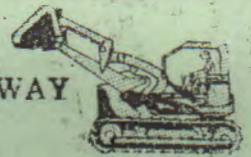

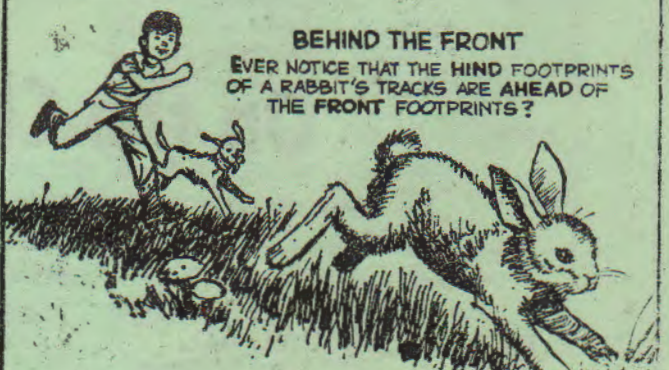

**POSTAL BOX
RATES TO
GO UP**

Postmaster General Winton M. Blount has announced plans for a 20 percent increase in postal box rental fees.

The proposal, with an effective date set for Nov. 1, calls for increases ranging from 5 cents to \$2.40 for quarterly rental periods. All postal boxes are included with the exception of rural lockboxes at non-personnel post offices.

The proposed increases are expected to yield additional revenue of about \$8 million.

In accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, notice of the proposal has been entered in the Federal Register giving the general public 30 days to respond to the plan. After the 30 day period, the proposal will be re-evaluated by the Postal Service.

Pending final decision, advance payment of box rentals will be limited to the quarter ending Dec. 31, 1970.

The last time basic rental fees for postal boxes were increased was in 1958.

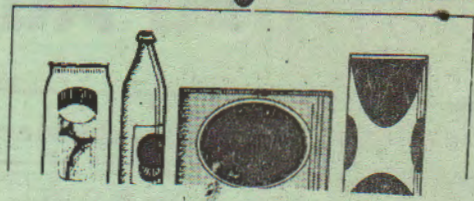
