HENRY.....AN UNUSUAL SIXTH GRADER

OLD CHUGIAK: Without any doubt, Henry is the laziest individual in Mr. Heath's sixth grade class at the Chugiak Elementary School, however to date, he is probably the best behaved one.

Henry is a five foot five inch boa constrictor, one of the many pets who occupy the assortment of cages in Mr. Heath's classroom.

Henry was donated to the class by Mrs. Kuentzel, of Lower Fire Lake, the mother of one of the students.

Mr. Heath's classroom resembles a cross between a pet store and a museum. Cages of white mice, hamsters and gerbils occupy every spare corner. A wild squirrel keeps house in a nest on a shelf shared by an assortment of bird and hornet nests. Children are encouraged to bring pets from home to share with their classmates, and there is usually a bird, a fish or a guinea pig visiting the class.

OLD CHUGIAK: Thursday night will be battle stations for the Committee for the Preservation of the Second Class Borough, in their final meeting before the October 6th election.

Bill Lowe, Chairman of the CFPSCB is sounding general quarters, and asking everyone who is interested in helping to defeat the charter to show up at the meeting.

CFPSCB will meet at 8:00pm at the United Methodist Church at mile 18 on the Old Glenn Highway.

Lowe said there is a need for volunteer drivers in the Eagle River Valley area. This is for the purpose of driving people without transportation to the polls. He also stressed a need for volunteers to pass out leaflets.

Anyone who would like to offer their services in either of these capacities is asked to call Lowe at 688-2212.

TWO KILLED IN HIGHWAY WRECK

BIRCHWOOD: Two drivers were killed instantly following a grinding head-on collision at Mile 16.2 on the New Glenn Highway early last Sunday morning.

The accident took place around 4:45am, according to the Alaska State Troopers. There were no passengers in either car and apparently no witnesses to the accident.

Dead is Duane Anderson, 28 of Palmer, driver of a 1968 Camiro and Harry H. Fish of San Francisco California, who was driving a rented 1969 Plymouth.

The accident was reported to the Alaska State Troopers by a passing motorist, Larry Thomas. A heavy fog condition existed on the highway at that hour.

The accident is still under investigation by the State Troopers, but they are of the opinion that Anderson appeared to be in the wrong lane of traffic.

CHUGIAK: Voters in the Greater Chugiak Area will go to the polls next Tuesday, October 6th, to cast their ballots in the borough election.

The most important items on the ballot will be the much disputed Charter for the Unified Municipality of Anchorage.

Along with the proposition which asks the ratification of the rejection of the Charter, will be two other propositions which will be valid only if the Charter is accepted.

These deal with areawide police power and areawide parks under the charter. If the Charter fails to pass, these will have no meaning, other than as public opinion polls.

In addition to voting on the Charter, voters in this area will be asked to select two members to serve on the GAAB School Board.

Mary Nettleton, Borough Clerk asked that all voters be informed that this ballot will be printed on both sides, and that they be sure to turn the ballot over and mark both of the sides. The school board candidates will be on one side and the Charter issues on the other.

Residents of the Chugiak, Birchwood and Peters Creek voting precincts will get another ballot on which they will vote for three members to the Board of Supervisors to the Fire Service District. There are only three candidates for these posts. They are Robert Kallenberg, (incumbent) William (Buck) Ramsey (incumbent) and Paul Swanson.

Polling places will be at the Eagle River Elementary School for precincts Number 14' and 148, (Eagle River Valley and Eagle River), Chugiak Elementary School for Precinct Number 149 (Chugiak), Chugiak High School for Precinct Number 150 (Birchwood) and the Peters Creek Service Station for Precinct Number 151, (Peters Creek).

The polls will open at 8:00am and close at 8:00pm. Only those who pre registered for the State Election prior to September 22nd will be eligible to vote.

The borough will once again use the school district computer to tabulate the votes, and the totals should be complete by 10:30pm, according to the Borough Clerk.

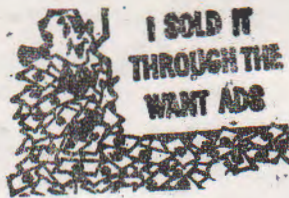

TWO LOCAL MEN TRY FOR SCHOOL BOARD SEATS

CHUGIAK: There will be two candidates in the Anchorage Borough School Board on the ballot next Tuesday, who are residents of the Greater Chugiak Area.

They are Kenneth Bell, of Eagle River; and Gary E. Redmond, of Birchwood.

Bell, although he is a newcomer to the Chugiak Area, was born in Fairbanks, and has lived in Alaska all of his life.

He moved to his home on Borealis Street in Eagle River from the Muldoon Area 3 months ago.

Bell is very familiar with the problems confronting educators. He is a teacher of the 4th grade at Ursa Major Elementary School on Fort Richardson.

He feels that the number one priority in borough schools is the need for more vocational education programs. He also would like to see a committee formed to investigate the full extent of Federal Aid to which this area is eligible. He also feels the need for an Educational Research Committee to look into all the advantages of programs which have been tried in schools all over the nation.

Bell is married, he and his wife Marilyn have two children, Kenny age 7 and Karen, age 4.

Redmond, who lives on Jayhawk Drive in Birchwood is a 7 year resident of the area.

He came to Alaska in 1960 from Michigan. He is employed in the service department of the Adressograph Multi-graph Corporation of Anchorage.

Redmond is concerned with the need to double shift in many of the borough schools. He favors adopting the 12 month school year as a means to utilize existing facilities to their fullest. He also favors the design of multiple story school buildings as a means of conserving heat and reducing the tax load.

Redmond and his wife Marcella have two children, Dawn age 4 and Brent, 1 year old.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

CONCERNING PROJECT F-042-1 (7) A PROPOSED IMPROVEMENT OF GLENN HIGHWAY BETWEEN PETERS CREEK AND EKLUTNA FLATS

The State of Alaska, Department of Highways will conduct a design public hearing to present the proposed realignment and improvement of the portion of Federal Aid Route F-042 1, between Peters Creek and the junction with the Old Glenn Highway near the Knik River Crossing.

TIME: 8:00 P.M., Wednesday, October 28, 1970
PLACE: Chugiak High School, Multi-Purpose Room

As proposed, the project will involve the construction of a controlled access 2 lane high-type highway with paved shoulders similar to the recently completed Eagle River to Peters Creek project. Right of way acquisition for the project is to be sufficient to permit the future construction of an additional 2 lanes to provide a 4 lane divided highway.

Plans and exhibits showing details of the project as well as written views received from public agencies are available for inspection and copying at the design section office located at the Highway Department's compound at 1306 E. 4th Avenue, Anchorage (2nd floor, 1st building on the right).

A complete explanation of the proposed project will be presented at the public hearing including the tentative schedules for right of way acquisition and for construction. The Highway Department's right of way policies and details of the relocation assistance program will also be discussed at the hearing.

**EGG THROWERS
BACK OUT
ON WORK DEAL**

BIRCHWOOD: The four youths who last week agreed to work at clean up at the Chugiak High School rather than be charged with vandalism, have apparently reneged on the agreement.

The four had thrown approximately 60 dozen eggs against the building and littered the school grounds with the cartons.

Mr. Eldon King Chugiak High Principal had offered the boys the opportunity to work off the damage and had placed them on their honor. When they failed to show up for the work details, the Chugiak Security Patrol decided the only action they could take was to file the charges of vandalism.

A spokesman for the Security Patrol said that they were then approached by the parents of one of the boys, and told that he had met with the parents of the other boys involved and all had agreed that the punishment was too harsh. They appeared to regard the incident as a harmless boyish prank, and agreed to share the expense of clean up among themselves. This came to a total of \$114.16.

The Security Patrol has given them two week's grace to pay the charges before filing the vandalism report.

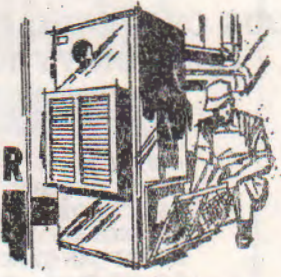

A license check with the Al-

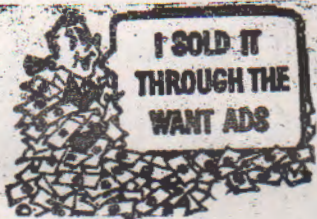
