TWO KILLED IN HIGHWAY WRECK

BIRCHWOOD: Two drivers were killed instantly following a grinding head-on collis ion at Mile 16.2 on the New Glenn Highway early last Sunday morning. The accident took place ar

ound 4:45am, according to the Alaska State Troopers, There were no passengers in either car and apparently no wit-COT nesses to the accident.

Dead is Duane Anderson, 28 of Palmer, driver of a 1968 Camiro and Harry H. Fish of San Francisco California, who was driving a rented 1969 Plymouth.

The accident was reported to the Alaska State Troopers by a passing motorist, Larry Thomas. A heavy fog condit ion existed on the highway at that hour.

The accident is still under investigation by the State Tropers, but they are of the opinion that Anderson ap peared to be in the wrong lane of traffic.

CHUGIAK: Voters in the Greater Chuglak Area will go to the polls next Tuesday, October 6th, to cast their ballots in the borough election.

The most important items on the ballot will be the much disputed Charter for the Uuifled Municipality of Anchor-

age. Along with the proposition which asks the ratification of the rejection of the Charter, will be two propositions which will velid only if velid only if is repted. Charter 15 the

These deal with areasias po lice power and areawide parks under the charter. If the Charter fails to pass, these will have no meaning, other than as public opinion polls.

In addition to voting on the Charter, voters in this area will be asked to select two members to serve on the GAAB School Board.

Mary Nettleton, Borough Clerk asked that all voters be Borough informed that this ballot will be printed on both sides, and that they be sure to turn the ballot over and mark both of the sides. The school board candidates will be on one side and the Charter issues on the other.

Residents of the Chuglak, Birchwood and Peters Creek voting precincts will get an-other ballot on which they will yote for three members to the Board of Supervisors to the Fire Service District. There are only thre candidates for these posts. They are Robert Kallenberg, (incumbent) Wil-liam (Buck) Ramsey (incum bent) and Paul Swanson,

Polling places will be at th Eagle River Elementary Sch ool for precincts Number 14' and 148, (Eagle River Valle and Eagle River), Chugiak El-ementary School for Precinc Number 149 (Chugiak), Chug iak Fich School for Drecinc lak High School for Precinc Number 150 (Birchwood) and the Peters Creek Service Station for Precinct Number 151, (Peters Creek).

The polls will open at 8:00am and close at 8:00pm. Only those who pre registered for ohe State Election prior to September 22nd will be eligible to vote.

The borough will once again use the school district comp utor to tabulate the votes, and the totals should be complete by 10:30pm, according to the Borough Clerk.



He also feels the need for a Educational Research Committee to look into all the advantages of programs which have been tried in schools all over the nation.


Bell is married, he and his wife Marilyn have two children, Kenny age 7 and Karen, age 4.

The State of Alaska, Department of Highways will conduct a design public hearing to present the proposed realignment and improvement of the portion of Federal Ald Route F-042 1, between Peters Creek and the junction with the Old Glenn Highway near the Knik River Crossing.

> TIME: 8:00P.M., Wednesday, October 28, 1970 PLACE: Chugiak High School, Multi-Purpose Room

As proposed, the project will involve the construction of a controlled access 2 lane high-type highway with paved shoulders similar to the recently completed Eagle River to Peters Creek project. Right of way acquisition for the project is to be sufficient to permit the future construction of an additional 2 lanes to provide a 4 lane divided highway.

Plans and exhibits showing details of the project as well as written views received from public agencies are available for inspection and copying at the design section office located at the Highway Department's compound at 1306 E. 4th Avenue, Anchorage (2nd floor, 1st building on the right).

A complete explanation of the proposed project will be presented at the public hearing including the tentative schedules for right of way acquisition and for construction. The Highway Department's right of way policies and details of the relocation assistance program will also be discussed at the hearing.



EGG THROWERS BACK OUT ON WORK DEAL

BIRCHWOOD: The four youths who last week agreed to work at clean up at the Chugiak High School rather than be charged with vandalism, have apparently, reneged on the agree-

The four had thrown approximately 60 dozen eggs against the building and littered the school grounds with the cartons.

Mr. Eldon King Chugiah High Principal had offered the boys the opportunity to work off the damage and had placed them on their honor. When they failed to show up for the work details, the Chugiak Security Patrol decided the only ac-tion they could take was to file the charges of vandalism.

A spokesman for the Secur-ity Patrol said that they were then approached by the parents of one of the boys, and told that he had met with the parents of the other boys in volved and all had agreed that the purishment was too harsh. They appeared to regard the incident as a harmless boyish prank, and agreed to share the expense of clean up among themselves. This came to a total of \$114.16.

The Security Patrol has giv en them two week's grace to pay the charges before filing the vandalism report.






