CHARGES AGAINST WINDOW BREAKERS DROPPED

EAGLE RIVER: Charges against two teen-agers accused of smashing the plate glass window at the public library have been dropped upon the promise that the damage would be paid for.

The breakage took place last Thursday evening under the eyes of a member of the Chugiak Security Patrol, who was attempting to settle an agru ment between the two.

One of the juveniles, a girl, reportedly smashed her fist through the glass, and then the other youth, a boy; reportedly kicked the rest of the glass out.

The pair were arrested by the Security Patrolman, and held for the Alaska State Troopers.

REGISTER FOR BORO ELECTION AT LIBRARY

EAGLE RIVER: Local residents who failed to register in time to vote in last month's primary, are advised that they are eligible to vote in the October 6th Borough elect ion if they register on or before September 22nd,

There will be registrars at the local ublic library on Sat urday, September 19th, Monday, September 21st, and Tuesday, September 22nd, during regular library hours. The library hours are Satwiday, 10:00am until 5:00mm

The library hours are Saturday, 10:00am until 5:00pm, Ond Monday and Tuesday, 2:00pm until 8:00pm.

Eighteen year olds may reglater, but will not be eligible to vote in the Borough election.

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EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River area may be the location of a State Penitentiary, according to Dave Webb, Supervisor for the State Department of Correction, Anchorage office.

Eagle River is one of two locations being considered in the immediate Anchorage area, Webb said.

The survey to determine the best location is being made under a Federal Planning grant. Funds for the construction of the institution were made available by the last legislature.

The local site under consideration is a 216 acre tract, on the South side of the Eagle River bridge, adjacent to the Eagle River Campground.

When completed, the institution will be a medium security prison for housing sentanced prisoners. Total capacity will be 120 inmates. Webb sald the survey should be completed in about two months, with construction to start in Jane of 1971.

The other site under consideration is located in Anchorage near the Alaska Psychiaatric Institute.

Webb said that the Eagle River site appears to be the more desirable of the two.

LOCAL SCHOOL ENROLLMENT TOPS 2,000

CHUGIAK: Enrollment at all three local elementary schcons, and at Chugiak High Schcol is at an all time high, a fact which surprises almost no one.

Total enrollment for all of the schools, including kindergarten, is 2,315 students. This figure is as of the third day of school, with late enrollments expected to boost the figures even higher.

PALMER: Word has been received that several local residents came away with prizes for exhibits at the recent Pal-







A new course in automotive technology now offered at Anchorage Community College prepares trainees to enter the automotive industry as journeyman mechanics in 18 months.

The course, Auto 20, is held from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday in Building F at the campus, located at 2533 Providence Ave.

Cost of the course is \$1,200 or \$400 for each 24-week semester.

According to Earl M. Bennett, coordinator of the automotive department at the college, the course is the only one in Alaska which prepares a journeyman in 18 months.

Although official registration at the college ended Thursday, late registration is permitted. Instruction begins Sept. 14.

The college offers several other automotive courses including one in turne-ups and engine repair for light planes, pumps, outboard motors, chain saws and other small engines.

The Charter Commission Wednesday approved publication of an informational brochure to publication of acquaint voters in the Anchorage area with the charter.

Margaret Schmidt, Mrs. commission executive secretary, said some 30,000 informational brochures would be printed and

Some of the brochures would also be made available to the recently formed Congress of Organizations for Unification, she said.

The brochures will outline major points in the charter, which has undergone extensive redrafting since the second round of public hearings in July.

A similar effort to make information available on the charter was undertaken by the commission prior to the second round of public hearings.

Additionally, some 2,500 copies of the charter will be printed in booklet form for free distribution to the public. These booklet copies of the charter will be available at the Charter Commission office ocated above the Book Cache on Fifth Ave.

The brochures and pamphlets are distributed solely for the purpose of information and do not represent an attempt to ampaign for adoption of the harter, Mrs. Schmidt said.

King said a number of students who later plan to ride the buses are presently either driving their own cars, or are riding with friends.


King said that the bus contractor must know no later than September 15th, just how many students will be needing school bus transportation this winter.


