REFLECTOR TO IMPROVE PHONE SERVICE HERE

EAGLE RIVER: A 12x22 foot metal surfaced panel will improve phone service between Anchorage and the Greater Chugiak Area 100%, according to a statement by Max Clements, manager for the Matanuska Telephone Association.

This reflector is to be located on land purchased by MTA, approximately 2 miles off the Birchwood Loop Road at the 1300 foot level. It is a part of the new micro-wave system which MTA is installing.

The panel will act like a huge mirror and reflect the signals down to the low areas in the community.

Missing since Sunday, October 3rd, are John Stockhausen, age 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Stockhausen of Mile 22 1/4 Glenn Highway and his young companion, 11 year old Scott Allen Bowerman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Bowerman, who until just last month resided on 4 Wheel Drive in Peters Creek, and who now have an Anchorage Area address.

PAVING OF BIRCHWOOD AIRSTRIP DROPPED FROM CONTRACT

BIRCHWOOD: Plans for asphaltting surfacing of the runway at Birchwood Airstrip have been deleted from the program this year according to a spokesman for the Division of Aviation.

The reason given for this deletion was lack of funds. Instead, 2,500 feet of the 5,000 foot runway will be graded, with the placement of a crushed aggregate base course, 75 feet wide and 4 inches thick.

The cost of this project, including rehabilitation of the lighting system is \$64,500.00 with Stephan and Sons Inc. of Anchorage having been awarded the contract, and given notice to proceed on October 11th, 1971.

Completion date for the project is November 1, 1971. The Division of Aviation has served notice that the airstrip will be closed for periods of two to four days at a

time during the month that the resurfacing project is in progress. Also all traffic will be restricted to VFR during this period.

PAUL SWANSON RE-ELECTED BY WRITE-IN

CHUGIAK: Paul Swanson was re-elected to the Board of Supervisors for the Chugiak Fire Service District by a write in vote.

A total of 153 voters wrote Swanson's name on a blank ballot which they were presented at the polling places.

A misunderstanding which resulted in no one filing a petition for candidacy by the deadline for filing had resulted in there being no candidate to fill Swanson's expiring post. When this was learned, Swanson indicated that he would accept a write in nomination.

Other names appeared as write in candidates, but none in any significant number.

Bowerman is described as four feet five inches, weighing 75 pounds, with brown hair and eyes. He was wearing a light blue quilted ski jacket, dark bell-bottom trousers with a white stripe and black rubber boots.

Stockhausen is 5 foot 10 inches tall, and weighs 165 pounds. It is not known how he was dressed.

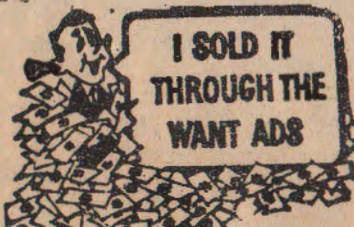

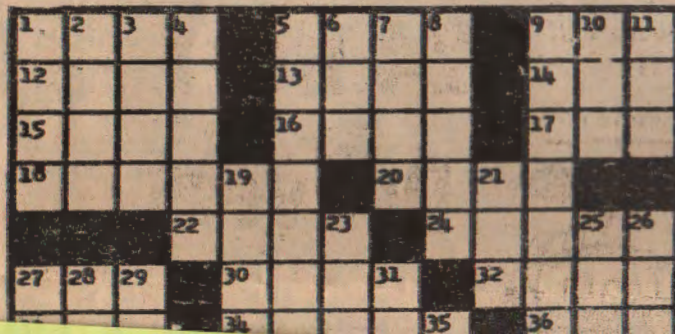

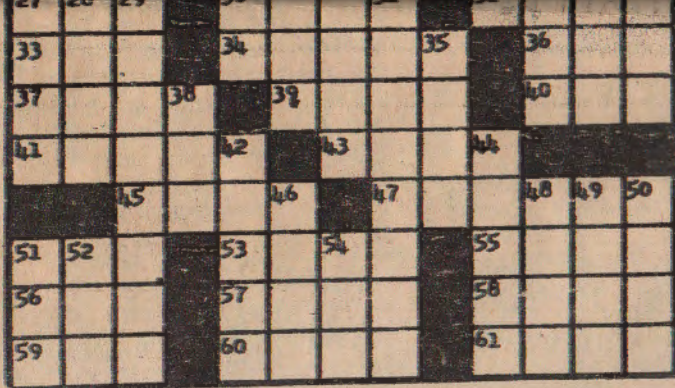

Dear Sir:

As a concerned supporter of Preventive Medicine, I would like to strongly urge mandatory immunization laws for Alaskan children. Anchorage being a port of entry with individuals coming from all parts of the world, the epidemic potential is alarming. In interviewing parents of children being examined for sports, kindergarten, high school, college and various school physicals I have found

three dismaying facts: (1) parents either "don't have" "shot" records, (2) they are unable to locate "shot" records, or (3) they simply don't care about the "shots".

This is particularly evident in the Eagle River-Chugiak area where people are apparently lax about immunizations and if our area is typical of the rest of Alaska, it would seem strongly indicated that more protective measures be taken.

I have nursed polio patients where vast numbers of teenagers and youngsters have been left paralyzed or crippled and I've seen a great many of these polio patients die. I've nursed a young woman with tetanus who suffered greatly before finally dying. Many of my medical cohorts have nursed diphtheria, whooping cough and smallpox, witnessing the terrible toll these diseases take. The tragic complications that can arise from Rubella (Ger-

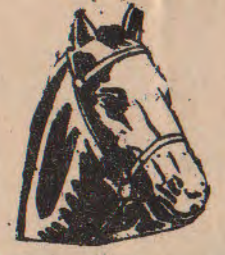

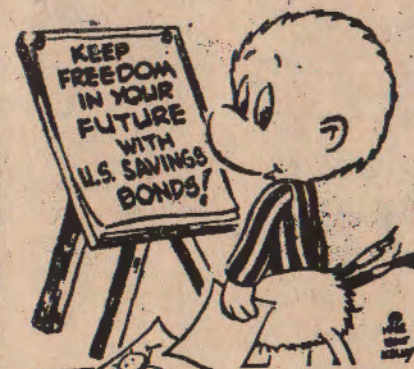
