FIRE DESTROYS UNITED BUILDING SUPPLY

**FAIRBANKS
NEWSPAPER REPORTS
POSSIBLE SIGHTING
OF MISSING YOUTHS**

ANCHORAGE: The Alaska State Troopers are investigating an unconfirmed report that missing John Stockhausen and Scott Bowerman have been seen in the Fairbanks area.

This report was published in the Fairbanks News Miner, and was quoting persons who claimed to be acquainted with the pair and who reportedly had seen them.

Stockhausen age 19 and Bowerman, 11, have been missing since October 3rd, when they had gone to the Polar Dragway near Palmer with friends and other members of the

Investigation by the Alaska State Troopers to date have failed to turn up any leads as to what might have happened to the pair and the car in which they were riding.

A full time investigator has been assigned to the case by the Alaska State Troopers and he has requested assistance from the Civil Air Patrol in making a search by air for the car.

With the exception of several reports that a car of that description had been seen in the Palmer area, the report in the Fairbanks newspaper is the only hopeful lead to date.



EAGLE RIVER: The biggest turn out of fire fighting equipment in the history of the community responded to the early morning blaze which completely destroyed United Builders Supply in Eagle River on Tuesday.

According to Eagle River Fire Chief Tom Take, a total of 20 vehicles which included 14 pieces of fire fighting apparatus were on hand. Responding under a mutual aid agreement were the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, Ft. Richardson Fire Company, the GAAB Fire Department and the Kulis Air National Guard Fire Department.

The call was turned into the Eagle River Fire Company at approximately 4:50am. The fire was spotted by the two sons of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Edwards of Eagle River. The boys are carriers for the Anchorage Daily News and were on their way to pick up their newspapers when they saw the fire. Take said that the fire was apparently pretty far al-

The car which Stockhausen was driving and in which young Bowerman was a passenger failed to join the remainder of the party after they left Del Roi's drive in on the Old Palmer Highway with the understanding that they would all meet in Palmer.

AFTER SCHOOL ACTIVITY BUS BEGINS RUN NEXT MON.

BIRCHWOOD: Students who remain for after school activities at Chugiak Junior-Senior High School will have the opportunity to ride home on buses, it was announced this week, starting on Monday October 25th.

The Chugiak Jur.-Sr. High FTSA (Parent-Student Teach-

ers Association) is sponsoring this after school bussing program.

There will be two busses, one northbound and the other southbound which will depart from Chugiak High every day at approximately 5:00pm.

Students wishing to ride the bus must purchase their tickets in advance. These tickets will be on sale at Chugiak High starting this Thursday, October 21st. The cost of the tickets are \$3.00 for a five ride ticket, or \$10.00 for a 20 ride ticket. The driver will punch the ticket each time the student rides the bus. Each

POSSIBLE CHANGE IN LOCAL GOVERNMENT TO BE STUDIED BY COMMITTEE

BIRCHWOOD: A group of 21 local citizens met last night at Chugiak High School to discuss the possibility of a change in local government which would give residents of the area a stronger voice in their own affairs.

Alternatives were suggested which ranged from incorporation as a fourth class city to seceding from the Greater Anchorage Area Borough and merging with the Mat Su or even forming a separate borough.

There were those present who felt that none of these routes was the answer, and that what should be strived for was more representation on the present Borough Assembly.

It was decided that in the absence of any hard facts to back up any of these plans, those present would form a study committee to look into all of the proposed plans and bring all facts and figures to the next meeting, to be held in approximately three weeks.

From these facts, it was believed some plan could emerge which could be presented to the residents of the area for their consideration.

Lee Jordan was appointed Chairman of the study committee and Joyce O'Conner is Secretary.

BOROUGH TO CHECK FOR LOCAL VIOLATIONS

CHUGIAK: Two full time employees from the Borough Department of Environmental Quality have been assigned to cover the Greater Chugiak Area, from Eagle River through Eklutna.

They will be concerned with

the enforcement of Borough Ordinance covering public nuisances.

Primarily they will be investigating all complaints as well as conducting random spot checks of homes and businesses in the area looking for violations.

Hugh Bruner, of the Department of Environmental Quality said that mostly they will be zeroing in on such violations illegal burning, danger excavations, unsightly accumulations of junk, garbage etc.

Junk is defined as any worn-out, wrecked, scrapped, partially or fully dismantled, discarded, tangled material, combinations of materials or items, including motor vehicles that are inoperable or not currently registered for operation upon the public roads of Alaska. Also machinery, metal, rags, rubber, paper, plastics, chemicals and building materials which cannot without further alteration and reconditioning be used for their original purposes.

Bruner said that anyone

newspapers when they saw the fire. Take said that the fire was apparently pretty far along at that time. He said that the heavy fog that morning apparently had prevented anyone from noticing the smoke earlier.

The fire had apparently started in the back shed a recent addition to the building. Take said that when he arrived there was fire burning in both the shed and in a trash dumpster nearby. The drive-through passage at the back of the building was also completely involved by that time.

Damage to the building and contents has been roughly estimated at around \$180,000. A company truck and a forklift which were parked in the drive-through passage were also completely destroyed.

Ed Scott, manager of the store said that the loss was covered by insurance, and that United Lumber was prepared to reopen at that location in a temporary building as soon as the insurance adjusters had completed their investigation. The building was owned by United Lumber and Scott said that they plan to start rebuilding immediately.

Chief Take reported that there were only two minor injuries, both to members of the GAAB Fire Department who suffered nail punctures.

The fire is presently under investigation by the State Fire Marshall. Take said that from the location of the two points of fire at the beginning he felt it might have been deliberately set. Scott also indicated that there was no possible way that fire could have accidentally started in the unheated shed.

The lumber which was stored outside of the building was undamaged by the fire.

ticket will bear the students name, and are not transferable. However, the student may, if he or she wishes, "treat" a friend to a bus ride provided the student whose name appears on the ticket presents the ticket to the driver to be punched.

A spokesman for the PSTA stated that the price has been set high initially, but if the program gains popularity and sufficient students sign up to ride the bus, the price of the tickets will be reduced considerably. The PSTA will pay any difference between the cost of operating the buses and the amount collected in fares.

The route for the Northbound bus is around the Birchwood Loop, and north on the Glenn Highway to the gravel pit beyond Mirror Lake. It will turn around there and return along the Old Glenn Highway.

The Southbound bus will go along the old Glenn Highway and turn on Eagle River Road to Mile 9. It will return and turn on to Eagle River Loop and back along the Old Glenn Highway.

It is hoped that this will enable more students to take part in after school activities as well as providing relief for the parents who have had in the past to drive to the school to pick their children up. It was hoped that the bus is

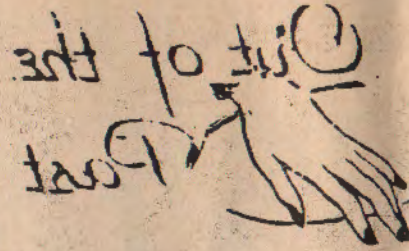

LOCAL WOMAN ESCAPES ASSAILANT: An Eagle River woman succeeded in tearing herself from the grasp of a strange man who had entered her home and was able to escape through the back door.

The woman had been sitting in her living room when this man forced his way into the house and grabbed her by the upper arms. She managed to pull away and ran out through the back door.

INJURED MAN TAKEN TO HOSPITAL

BIRCHWOOD: A faulty oil heater was blamed for a fire which completely destroyed a trailer and lean-to located on Bowery Lane in Birchwood. NEW FIRE TRUCK SEES IMMEDIATE SERVICE

EAGLE RIVER: The new Eagle River truck, just arrived in Alaska last Sunday saw immediate service when it was used to help fight the disastrous United Lumber yard fire.

Fire Chief Take and Fireman Tom Keene had just returned with the truck, having flown to Seattle to take delivery. They had put the vehicle on the ferry to Haines and then driven it the remainder of the way up the highway.

The truck is a Ford L99, with a 750 Darley front mount pump. The tank will hold 1650 gallons of water. This is the first line engine for the Fire Company.

LADIES CLUB HEARS ABOUT CHILD CARE CENTER

PETERS CREEK: Mrs. Janet Lindeman, Director of the Chugiak Child Care Center, was a guest speaker at the last meeting of the Chugiak Ladies Club, held at the home of Rusty Islinger in Peters Creek.

Mrs. Lindeman told the club of the program at the Child Care Center, and invited them and any other interested members of the community to drop in at any time and visit. The Center is located at the Chugiak Methodist Church at Mile 18 on the Old Glenn Highway.

Mrs. Lindeman explained that the Center was supported for the first year by state funds, but thereafter they must look to the local community for financial support.

She told that Federal funds were available matching 1 for 1 for local contributions, either cash or "in-kind" which could be volunteer time, donations of materials etc. She said their operating budget for a year is \$20,000, which would mean that \$5,000 must be raised on the local level in order to qualify for the balance in matching Federal Funds. She said that she would be contacting other community service groups to attempt to enlist their support also.
