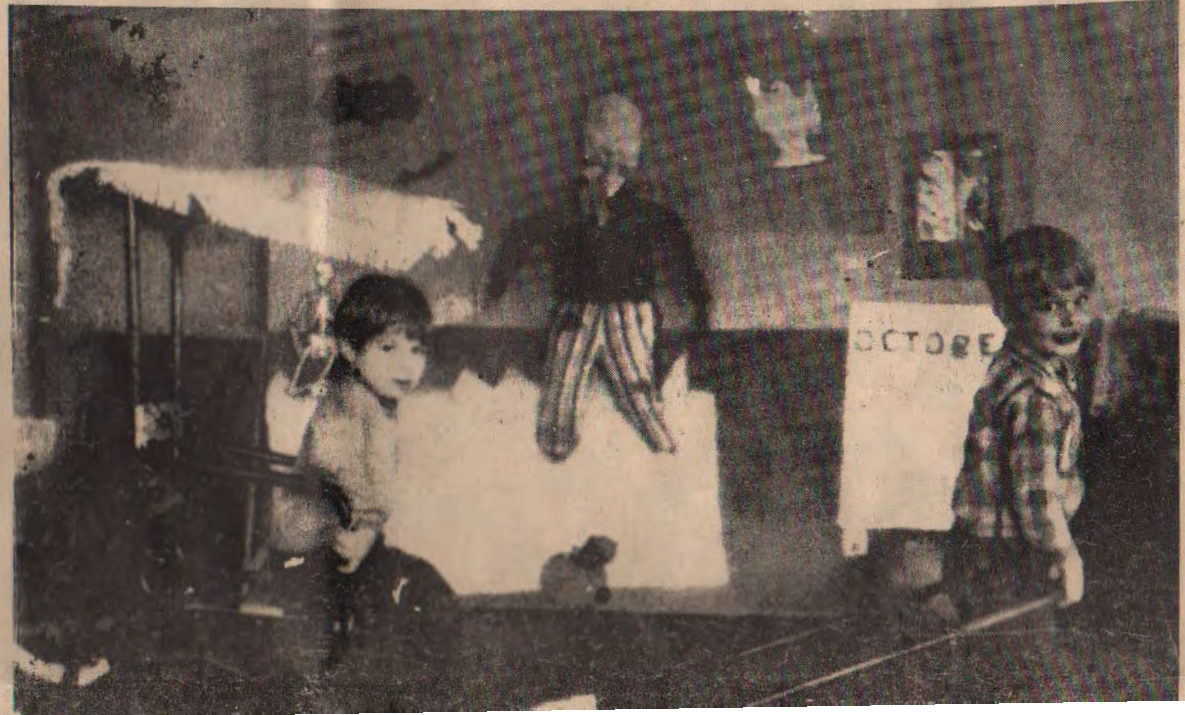
Investigator Benson of the Alaska State Troopers said that the investigation would continue until the fate of the youths is learned.

CHS STUDENTS TO GET COMPUTER REPORT CARDS

Swimming at the Elmendorf pool is also a new attraction on Thursday mornings for the four and five year olds.

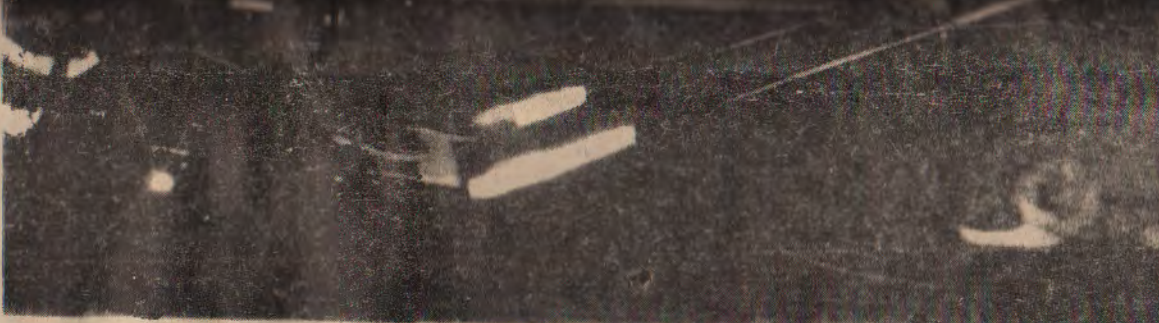
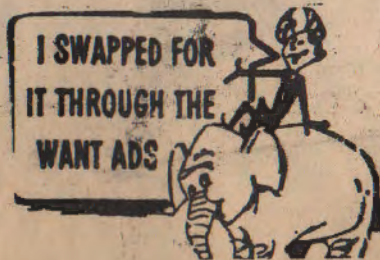
The children learn water acclimatization and safety, and are reassured by the presence of supervising adults, including some parents.

FIRE GUTS BROADWATER BUILDING

EAGLE RIVER: A major fire (the second in the Eagle River area in a three day period) extensively damaged the building which houses Broadwater Industries.

The fire was discovered at approximately 6:30pm last Thursday, shortly after the second shift at the plant had started.

The blaze apparently broke out in the back of the building in a storage area. Bob Broadwater, owner of the building, said that it has been determined that static electricity ignited a layer of pentane gas which was on the floor. Pentane is used as an expanding agent for the pellets from which the foam products are manufactured.

Three employees were in the building at the time. Broadwater said they got out just in time, and none of them were injured.

The Eagle River Fire Company responded along with the Chugiak Fire Co., Ft. Richardson and the GAAB Fire Department. The latter three

under a mutual aid agreement.

The blaze was brought under control within one hour and 15 minutes. Although the interior of the building and all of the contents were burned the steel frame structure is still sound, and can probably be repaired. Prompt action on the part of the fire fighters is credited with saving the building.

The Owl Cafe, located in a separate part of the building from the manufacturing plant was severely smoke damaged, but was not burned, and Broadwater said that he expects they will be able to open the Cafe in about three weeks.

The loss suffered by the fire including the building, machinery, inventory and outstanding contracts was estimated at around \$700,000 by Broadwater.

He said that he plans to open for business just as soon as the building can be repaired and he can replace the machinery. He said it would be approximately six months before the machinery could be replaced.

Broadwater said that in the short time that he has been open he has found the poten-

tial of his products to be even greater than he had anticipated. He pointed out that the foam form blocks which were in the building melted under the heat, but did not burn.

He said that nineteen persons (including cafe workers) were temporarily unemployed because of the fire.

He has also asked that his thanks be expressed to all his employees for their help in getting the business started and since the fire in helping mop up. He said he would try to keep them working as long as possible.

CHILD DEAD ON ARRIVAL AT HOSPITAL

EAGLE RIVER: The two year old son of an Eagle River family was pronounced dead on arrival at the 5040th Air Force Hospital where he had been rushed by the local ambulance.

Planning and Zoning Commissioner Robert Kallenberg was present at the Monday meeting. The Chamber discussed with him certain restrictive sections of the new sub-dividing ordinance which is being drafted by the Commission.

This ordinance if adopted as presently written would place highly restrictive requirements on subdividers in the Eagle River Service Area.

The call for the ambulance came from the office of Dr. Thomas F. Green at 9:30am on Monday, October 25th.

The child was Richard L. Sheehan Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard L. Sheehan Sr. of Mile 15.

He was believed to have been suffering from pneumonia.

Anyone wishing to nominate an individual or organization for either of the two awards for outstanding public service may do so. The nomination should be mailed to the Awards Committee, Chugiak-Eagle River Chamber of Commerce, Box 530, Chugiak Alaska.

The nominations should include a brief but detailed resume telling why this individual or organization was nam-

ed.

The awards are made on the basis of outstanding service to this community. The service may have been rendered during the past year, but is not limited to it.

Business establishments are eligible for consideration for the award to an organization.

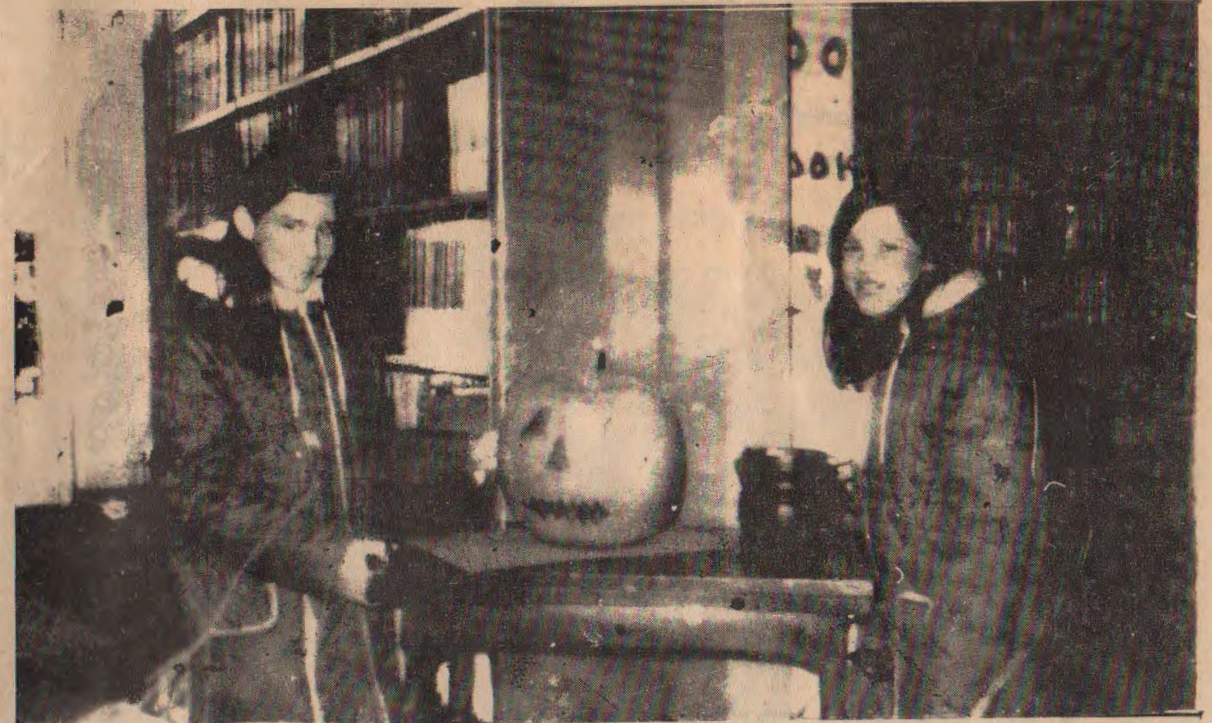

OLD CHUGIAK: Parents are invited to come and watch a "Circle 8" Halloween Parade at Chugiak Elementary School on Friday October 29th.

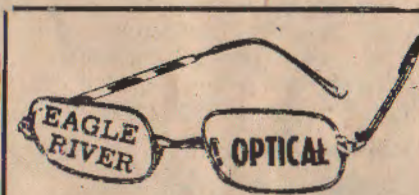
The parade will be held on the school grounds during the last fifteen minutes of school that day.
