CHUGIAK ELEMENTARY PRIME CHOICE FOR COMMUNITY CENTER

LOCAL RESIDENTS ASKED TO HELP NAME NEW SCHOOL

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Area Borough School Board has asked residents of the local area to help in selecting a name for the new elementary school which will be constructed in the Eagle River area.

This 20 classroom building to be constructed at a cost of \$1,557,840.00, is to be funded by bonds approved at the last election.

It is to be located in the vicinity of the Eagle River Loop Area, on Baranoff Street in Eagle River Heights.

Several names were suggested at a recent meeting of the School Board. These include such as, Glacier Elementary School, Valley, Canyon, Baranoff, Eagle River Heights, and Valley View.

EAGLE RIVER FAVORED FOR PARK HQS.

EAGLE RIVER: Local residents appearing at the Public Hearing last night at the Eagle River Elementary School put in their bid for Eagle River as the location for the headquarters for the Chugach State Park.

This location was requested rather than one in the O'Malley Road area which was also being considered.

The hearing, which presented plans for the Chugach State Park, as well as recreational areas elsewhere in the State was held at the local school as one of a series to be con-



BIRCHWOOD: The soon to be replaced Chugiak Elementary School was the unanimous choice as the location of a proposed community center by those attending a public hearing last Thursday at Chugiak High School.

The hearing, called by the GAAB Administration and the Finance and Planning Departments, was for the purpose of hearing the opinions of the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area on which of three proposed sites was favored for the construction of a community center which would house, among other facilities offices of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough.

The three sites suggested were a parcel of land located across from the Eagle River Shopping Center (Pippel's field), property belonging to the Birchwood Community Club on Birchwood Loop Road and the present Chugiak Elementary School Building, which is scheduled to be replaced by a new school during the next year.

School, Valley, Canyon, Baranoff, Eagle River Heights, and Valley View.

Mrs. Thomas, of the School Board stated that she was cool to any of these names, and felt that the school should bear a name which would reflect the romantic history of the area, such as "Knik", or "Eklutna". Elementary schools are traditionally given names which reflect the geographic location of the school.

Mr. Kenneth Bell, President of the Eagle River Elementary PTA was in attendance at this meeting, and was asked to act as liaison between the school board and the community in an attempt to come up with an appropriate name.

Mr. Bell has asked that any local residents who wish to suggest a name for the new school either call him at his home (694-9138) or contact the Knik Arm Courier at 688-2513 with their suggestion.

The school board is very anxious to have an official designation for the new school, as it is necessary to identify the project on paper.

The firm of W. J. Wallenstein, architects has been contracted to use their design for Tundra Elementary School for the facility in Eagle River.

The Tundra Elementary School has not yet been constructed due to lack of a suitable site.



park, as well as recreational areas elsewhere in the State was held at the local school as one of a series to be conducted in the areas concerned.

The hearing was conducted by the Alaskan Environmental Group, which is under contract with the Department of Parks and Recreation to draw up master plans for these areas.

The public was given an oral as well as a picture slide presentation of park plans.

One of the main points brought out by those attending the hearing was the feeling that there be some hunting restrictions within the park to insure visitors being able to view wildlife.

Present plans indicate that the existing road would be extended several miles into the park, but the possibility of extending it all the way through to Girdwood is not being immediately considered.

It was brought out that three excellent ski areas are located within the park. Two are already developed, Arctic Valley and Ptarmigan Valley, while the third area (not yet developed) is in the South Fork area of Eagle River.

NEXT ADDITION TO CHS TO INCLUDE SWIMMING POOL

BIRCHWOOD: A swimming pool for Chugiak High School will be included in the next addition to that facility it was learned following the November meeting of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough School Board.

The architectural firm of John Graham and Co. have been contracted to draw up the plans for this addition which will include 23 more classrooms in addition to the pool.

This addition, which will be built at the cost of \$3,156,240, will be funded by the school bonds approved at the last borough election.

This will be the third addition to the school since its completion in 1964. The most recent addition is still under construction, and will not be ready for occupancy until December of this year.

LOCAL SEWER SYSTEM TO BE DEDICATED

EAGLE RIVER: The Borough's first comprehensive pollution abatement project to go into operation -- the Eagle River sewer system and treatment lagoon -- will be dedicated on Friday, November 19th.

Borough Chairman John Asplund said state, federal and military officials and the entire community of Eagle River have been invited to take part.

A brief tour of the lagoon area is scheduled to begin at 2:30 at the Eagle River Shopping Center, followed by a caravan through the areas to be served by the sewer system. Cars will be decorated with toilet paper, plumbers friends etc. It was suggested to set a light mood for the celebration.

The caravan will terminate at the Sportsman's Game Preservation Clubhouse at

Mile 15 on the Old Glenn Highway for a community get-together.

Built at a cost of \$573,000, the system consists of a two-pone aeration lagoon and trunk and lateral sewer lines.

BB and S Construction Co. of Anchorage is the builder.

VANDALS DEFACE CHS

BIRCHWOOD: Last Saturday night vandals, using approximately 4 cans of spray paint defaced the south and east exterior wall of Chugiak High writing numerous four letter words and other obscenities.

Although the addition of the letters "PHS" was written in an attempt to point the finger of guilt to Palmer, it was thought it more likely to be the work of local juveniles trying to start a feud between the two schools.

The incident is under investigation by the security police.

Elementary School building, which is scheduled to be replaced by a new school during the next year.

Although the number of persons attending the hearing was small (approximately 20 in all) they were representative of all areas of the community from Eagle River through Peters Creek.

After reviewing the pros and cons of all three locations, the consensus of opinion was that the Chugiak Elementary School, with the free land and a suitable building already built was more practical than the purchasing of expensive land and the cost of construction of a new building.

Figures submitted by those present showed that even the most minimum building, with no auditorium and only 1,820 square feet would cost an estimated \$72,800 to build.

The school building has more area square foot wise than the largest of the present buildings, and is already equipped with an auditorium. All that would be required would be that the classrooms be remodeled for office space.

It was pointed out by Dale Briggs, President of the Chugiak Benefit Association, that CBA has been negotiating with the School District to exchange acre for acre, land at the Chugiak Carnival grounds at Mile 21 for the present Chugiak Elementary School property. Adequate water supply has always been a problem at the school, in spite of the three wells which have been drilled on the property.

The Carnival grounds does not have a water problem, and by relocating the school there this one difficulty would be overcome. If the land exchange is okayed, then the fourteen acres on which the present Chugiak Elementary

School stands would become the property of the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area (through CBA) and the school buildings would become available for the community center.

Funds for the proposed community center were to have come from a grant through HUD (Housing and Urban Development). The Borough had planned applying for a \$50,000 HUD Grant. It was determined that these funds could be used to remodel existing buildings.

Those testifying at the hearing pointed out that the Chugiak Elementary site was geographically centrally located, and that the population trend for the community was moving in a northerly direction, and that in not many years it would be centrally located populationwise also.

One of the organizations which would be using the new Community Center would be the GOAL offices, which process over 5,000 contacts within a six month period.

Rav Estess, of the Borough

Administration and Dean Blount, planning coordinator for the Borough who conducted the meeting, both agreed that this would be only the first in a series of hearings on the subject.

They will review all evidence presented at the hearing, and present their findings to the local residents at a later date.

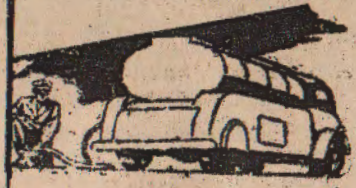

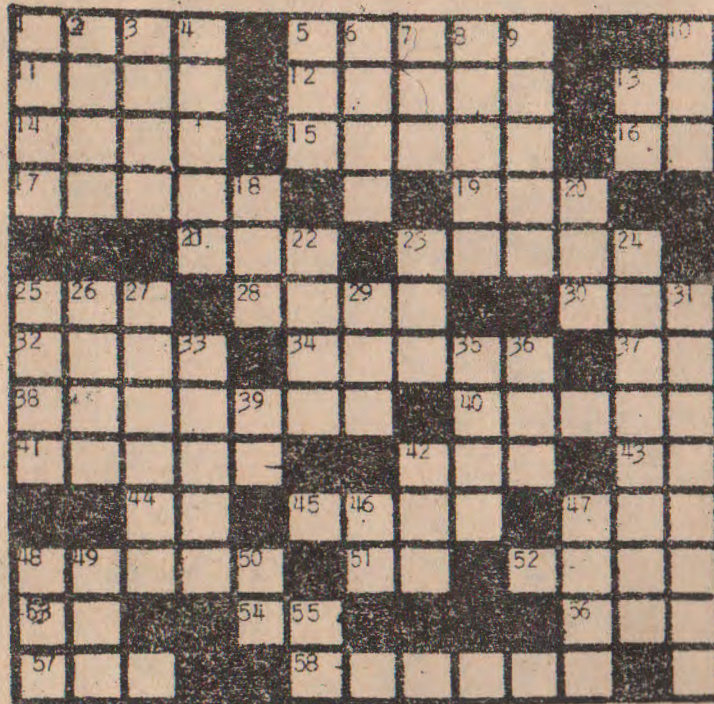
ANCHORAGE: The Homemaker's Council Holiday Bazaar will be held next Saturday, November 20th at the YMCA in Anchorage.

DESTROYED BY FIRE

PETERS CREEK: A faulty furnace was blamed for the fire which completely destroyed the Ellis Yates home in Peters Creek last week. The fire broke out in the semi-daylight basement of the home, at approximately 1:50pm, November 10th.

A quantity of combustible material which had been stored in the basement caused increased problems for the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, and kept the equipment on the scene until around 8pm that night.

Snow machines, motor cycles and other equipment had been stored in the basement.

Three fire trucks, including the new truck from the Eagle River Fire Company (responding under mutual aid) were required to fight the fire and keep it from spreading to nearby homes.

The Yates home is located off the Glenn Highway at Mile 23. None of the family were in the house at the time the fire broke out, but two of the Yates children were at the neighbors in the next house.

According to the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, the building was insured, but the contents were not covered by the insurance.

There has no value been set at present on the loss of the contents of the home.

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company has asked that their thanks be extended to all the people who brought hot coffee for the firemen during the long hours when they stood by at the fire.

HOW TO LIVE FOREVER TOLD AT FAIRBANKS

FAIRBANKS: About thirty local people were in the crowd of 1,190 persons at Hering Auditorium in Fairbanks last Sunday, who listened to F.G. Ronco talk about the definite prospects of living forever. Ronco, who is branch manager of Jehovah's Witnesses in Alaska and the Yukon, delivered the feature discourse on the last day of the witnesses three day convention.

Ronco commented, "It is strange that man, the highest form of earthly life, lives a shorter span than some plants and animals," He continued, "While some persons may laugh at the prospect of living forever on earth, anyone who has read the Bible carefully will be forced to agree that the subject is mentioned many times. The capacity of the human brain, as well as the amazing process of cell renewal for the entire body, is evidence that man was designed to live forever."

Ronco also discussed the requirements for everlasting life.

"It is necessary," he em-
