NEED FOR LIGHTING ON OLD GLENN HIGHWAY TOLD TO GOVERNOR

NAME PICKED FOR EAGLE RIVER VALLEY SCHOOL

ANCHORAGE: The GAAB School Board, at their meeting last night, picked the name "Homestead Elementary School", for the new school which is to be built in the Eagle River Loop Area. This name was selected from a group of six suggestions which were brought to the school board meeting by Ken Bell, President of the Eagle River Elementary School PTA.

The School Board had asked Bell to take a poll among residents of the local area, and ask for suggestions of names for the new school.

SEWER SYSTEM IS DEDICATED

EAGLE RIVER: The first sewer system to be put into service in the Greater Anchorage Area, was dedicated in a brief ceremony at the Eagle River Sewage Treatment Lagoon last Friday.

Borough Officials, headed by John Asplund, Borough Chairman, along with State and Federal dignitaries, headed a caravan which followed the path of the effluent through the area served by

The letter pointed out to the Governor that while the intersections along the New Glenn Highway were in most instances adequately lighted, there were no lights at all where these connector roads joined the Old Glenn. The dangerous conditions at all of these intersections was pointed out.

Also listed as high on the list of highway needs for the Greater Chugiak Area, was the improving and paving of Birchwood Loop Road, the need for improvement of Eagle River Loop Road, the Re-alignment of Eagle River Road and the construction of a road connecting the Eagle River Road to Girdwood over Crow Pass.

There Chairman Asplund read a letter from Governor Egan, who had been invited to the dedication, but sent his regrets. Ed Willis, Assemblyman from the Greater Chugiak Area, was called on to speak, and compared the event with such community milestones as getting electric and phone service for the first time.

Following the ceremony at the Treatment Lagoon, the party retired to the Sportsman's Hall, at Mile 15, where refreshments were served.

Built at a cost of \$773,409., the system is financed by a FHA (Farmers Home Administration) loan of \$266,213, a grant of \$183,645 from the Environmental Protection Agency, \$193,352 from State and \$130,199 from local funds, through GAAB sewer bonds in the amount of \$370,000.

The lagoon method of sewer treatment is being used here for the first time in Alaska in a civilian community.

There are only three other treatment lagoons in the State all on military reservations, at Ft. Greely, Ft. Richardson and at Elmendorf.

The lagoon consists of two cells, with a capacity of 2.6 million gallons. The raw sewage flows into these lagoons, where compressed air which is forced through porous pipes at the bottom of the lagoon causes a bacterial action which completely decomposes the sewage. From the lagoon, the treated sewage flows into two holding tanks, where it is treated with chlorine before it is discharged.

LOCAL MAN ESCAPES WHEN VEHICLE BREAKS THROUGH ICE

BIRCHWOOD: Chuck Preg, of Jayhawk Drive in Birchwood was one of three men who narrowly escaped drowning when the tracked vehicle in which they were riding broke through the ice of Knik River last Thursday.

Preg, along with a friend, Neil Swenson of Anchorage, and a third man who was not had been hunting, and were returning with two moose they had shot. They were riding in a "Snow-Track", an all terrain tracked vehicle. They were proceeding along the shore of the Knik River until they came to Jim Creek, where they were forced to drive out onto the river ice to get around the mouth of the creek.

In the few days during which they had been hunting, the weather had warmed enough to thaw the river ice, and the Snow Track broke through the ice. A flotation constructed trailer, which they were towing kept the Snow-Track from sinking immediately, and the three were able to climb out through a modified escape hatch in the roof of the vehicle.

Preg said that they got out just in time, before the Snow-Track disappeared into about

ten foot deep water.

They were able to crawl across the ice to the shore and then walk the six miles back to where they had parked their car.

Preg said that they managed to return to the scene and managed to salvage the Snow-

Track and the rest of their equipment from the river.

He said the moose meat they had been transporting on the trailer had dumped onto the river ice when the trailer flipped. He said there was about of four inches of water running over the top of the ice at the time, and the meat had spoiled.

None of the three men suffered any injuries from the accident, nor any after effects from the exposure.

BIRCHWOOD: A 13 year old Birchwood boy was seriously injured in a sledding accident last Thursday.

Leroy Hayden, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Johnson, of Birchwood Loop Road.

He and another boy were riding a toboggan down "Killers Hill", behind the Johnson residence. The toboggan apparently struck a tree limb.

The other child was thrown clear, but the Hayden youth was pinned between the toboggan and the tree. He was taken to the Anchorage Community Hospital, where he underwent emergency surgery for the removal of an injured kidney. He also suffered other internal injuries, including a damaged spleen.

He has been removed from the intensive care unit at the Hospital and is listed in fair condition.

d into Eagle River.

This lagoon method of sewage treatment is held to be one of the most effective for a small community. There is no unpleasant odor detected in the vicinity of the lagoon, and the discharge is so pure that it in no way will pollute the stream.

The site on which the lagoon is located is a part of the Ft. Richardson military reservation. It is on a 40 year lease to the borough. There are approximately 40 acres of land under lease, with enough room to construct a total of 6 lagoons as the need arises.

The present lagoon has the capacity of serving from 12,500 to 1,500 people.

At present it was learned, local residents are slow to sign up for sewer service.

All those living within the sewer service district will be charged an assessment for sewers, but only those who actually hook up to the sewers will pay the \$6.00 per month service charge. This is to cover the cost of operating and maintaining the sewage lagoon. It was said that unless more people sign up, the service charges will not be enough to cover these expenses. Approximately 200 people are presently using the sewers. The borough brings the sewer lines right up to the property lines, and the householder must connect his home to these lines at his own expense. The cost of connecting was quoted by one local contractor at \$4.00 per foot. At present, those living within the sewer district are not required to utilize the service.

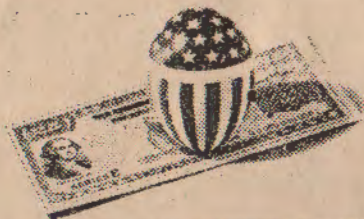

KIDS ENJOY ART LESSONS AT LIBRARY

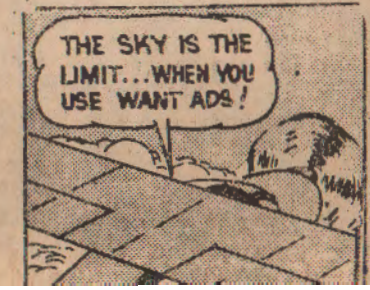

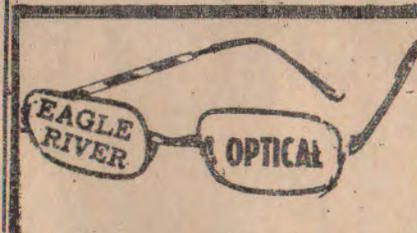

DRUG SURVEY

BIRCHWOOD: Chugisk Junior-Senior High School was one of the schools throughout the Anchorage Area, Elmerdorf and Fort Richardson to participate in one of the largest surveys ever to be conducted in the United States. The survey took place last Wednesday, November 17th, with nearly 22,000 students including grades 6 through 12 participating in the study.

The survey was conducted so as it would not be possible to identify any individual students completing the form, nor the school which they attend.

The purpose of the study is to determine the extent and frequency of drug usage in the Anchorage area. Information obtained from the survey will be used to develop educational treatment and rehabilitation programs.

The survey is under the direction of the Community Drug Survey Committee composed of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough Health Department, The Alaska Native Health Service, Anchorage Borough School District, Arctic Health Research Center and Center for Disease Control, City of Anchorage Drug Information and Education Program, University of Alaska--Anchorage, Psychology Department, Anchorage Board of Education.

The survey was approved by the Anchorage Borough School Board on September 28, 1971, and has been in preparation for seven months. Information from psychologists, the school district students and
